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PREFACE

At the beginning of the search of my Berry family, I had no idea it would lead me down the pathway that it did. I only knew the names of my grandfather, Wiley P. Berry, and great-grandfather, John Robert Berry, and that was it. I had just learned about the software available to help in researching family trees. A family friend amazed me by displaying my paternal family tree on his computer. I had no idea that the information about my Henderson family was out there for the world to see. Shortly after that, one of my first cousin's wife died and my wife and I attended the funeral and burial ceremonies. Another first cousin, Harold Bernard Berry, suggested that somebody needed to work up a Berry family tree. I thought this sounded like a good idea. I started searching the internet and after about a year I made contact with a distant cousin who was related to Hannah Cate Berry. We were struggling with how things fit together in the family and slowly we started making some progress. From these humble beginnings our knowledge of the family has almost exceeded my capacity to manage it.

As time went by, I gradually became acquainted with some more Berry researchers. I discovered that there was a wealth of information in my State Genealogy Library and the internet. From these three sources, things just started to grow. I cannot begin tell you how valuable the internet, Family Tree Maker, Ancestry.com, and my new found cousins are. With the easy access of email and the help of other researchers, we started filling in the gaps and making some giant leaps in our Berry family history. The next Berry cousin I met was Martha Mangum from Georgia. For many years, she had been researching the David J. Berry line, whose family located just north of Atlanta around 1828. Martha and I had determined that David J. Berry was part of the Robert Berry family from Orange County, North Carolina. A few years later this fact was verified by Y-DNA. Martha's family, along with some of her local cousins (Jo Patterson and her son, Lois White and her husband, Martha Mangum and her daughter and grandson) attended our W. P. Berry reunion in 2002 in Orange County, North Carolina. These cousins were the second group of extended Berry cousins I met in person. Several years before, Elizabeth Merckle and her husband came to North Carolina for a day. My wife and I met them in Hillsborough, N.C., and we escorted them around the property of our Berry family in the Little River community of Orange County, North Carolina.

A short time later we became involved in the Berry Y-DNA project and this validated much of our archival research. Many other doors opened as more and more Y-DNA tests were completed. As it turned out, one of our own Berry cousins, Cookie Paulson, actually started the Berry Y-DNA project. She had been searching many years for John Berry, who was born in North Carolina in 1815. In desperation, she decided to start a Berry Y-DNA project.

Although we had no paper trail to link her John Berry to my Berry family, Cookie and I had corresponded several times over the years. I remember telling her that we had a John Berry in our Orange County family. At one point she even told me in an email that she was about willing to accept any John Berry from North Carolina as her John Berry who was found in the 1860 Rusk County, Texas, Census. We have done a huge amount of research together since that time and I have learned she would never, ever, claim a relationship between two people in her research without the proper documentation. She convinced one of her Berry cousins to take the simple Y-DNA test. He was number 8 in the project. I asked my mother's youngest brother (Wiley Person Berry Jr.) if he would take the Y-DNA test. He became number 18 in July. It was on the same day in July that we were having our local family reunion when I got an email from Cookie telling me that we had a positive Y-DNA match between her cousin and my uncle. This

was one of the most exciting events in my entire Genealogical experience and I made the announcement at our local Wiley P. & Ida Ann Wilson Berry reunion in Orange County, North Carolina, that day.

There are so many other Berry cousins who have contributed to our research and the Y-DNA project. I am indebted to every one of them and without them this book would never have become a reality.

I slowly began to learn how to create a web page, with a lot of study and an enormous amount of help from my son, Aaron Henderson. I was able to setup berrytree.org in late 2007. This effort was done in order to share my research with our expanding circle of cousins and the world. The dividends of that effort continue to increase our knowledge of the Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry family from Orange County, North Carolina.

On July 21st, 2007, many of Robert Berry's descendants visited the land that Robert Berry Sr. chose to homestead in 1751. We saw the chimney he built for his Fiddleton plantation house in 1766 and visited the Robert Berry Fiddleton Cemetery. It was located in a beautiful wooded property covered with huge trees. It certainly must have been a beautiful site to Robert Berry as he first viewed his new property two hundred and fifty six years ago. It was still a beautiful environment on our special 250th Robert Berry Fiddleton reunion day. The virgin trees are gone but the forest must have looked in 2007 somewhat as it did in 1751.

We stood there at the cemetery in silence with a feeling of tranquility, pride, and reflection. The tall hardwoods shaded out the sun from the earth below. This shade was so complete that small vegetation scarcely grew. It was as if someone had cleared out all the underbrush and left a carpet of leaves. As we read the inscriptions on the headstones and stared at the field stones that mark most of the 23 graves where our departed heroic pioneer ancestors now rest, everybody seemed to withdraw into their own private thoughts. Reverend John Allen Berry said a prayer over our ancestor's graves and then we observed a moment of silence. There seemed to be a hush over the forest during this time of respect and reverence.

The grief and sorrow that has been felt at those 23 sad occasions has long past into oblivion but somehow there was a special feeling that still seems to linger there for me.

Two of the descendants who were at the cemetery died a short time after the reunion. My uncle, Wiley Person Berry Jr., was one of those who died a month later, but he was there and I asked him to say the blessing at our lunch. We were all in a circle and holding hands when he began the blessing by saying "Feel the Love, Feel the Love", and you definitely could. This moment seemed to describe the purpose of the entire reunion. This may well be the greatest thing I could ever have done for my mother's youngest brother or him for me.

Fred Anderson was the other family member who attended the 2007 Fiddleton reunion and passed away shortly afterward. They both will forever be loved and missed.

Robert Berry Sr. (OC) died in 1814 and was probably the first person buried in the Fiddleton Cemetery. This funeral was probably attended by many members of his family and neighbors. Some family members who were likely at his funeral would have been: Elizabeth Cate; Henry Berry; Isaac Berry; Robert's wife, Elizabeth Cate Berry; Joshua & Nancy Berry & their family; David J. Berry & his family; Robert Berry Jr. & his family; Jacob & Catherine Pickle; Hannah Cate Berry and her two children, Thomas Person Berry age 6 and Elizabeth Berry age 2; Robert's daughter Elizabeth Berry and her daughter Mary and her son in-law Thomas Berry from Person County.

Some of Robert's neighbors who may have attended his funeral in 1814 could have been the William Stagg family, the Thomas Rountree family, Ruth Holeman, the Samuel Wilson

family, the William Armstrong family, the William Robinson family, and the John Dickey family, . Most of these families lived their entire lives as neighbors. They built the roads in the wilderness, they served on the juries, they raised their children, they built their homes, they formed their community, they built their plantations, and they served in the revolutionary war.

Those early pioneer settlers could never have imagined that their children, grandchildren, cousins, nieces, nephews, and many of their descendants would intermarry and spread across this great country like Kudzu for the next 250 years. The idea that so many of us would return so many years later could never have occurred to any of them. Back to the future was such a wonderful concept; I wish it were possible, at least temporarily.

At the 2007 reunion, I did have a strong feeling that someone above was taking a very special interest in this event because it was such a beautiful, bright, sunny, and perfect day. The humidity was very low and the temperature was in the 70's. This never happens during the month of July in Orange County, North Carolina, and yet it did on the day that the Robert Berry descendants returned home to their roots. I will be eternally grateful to all my many cousins for traveling so far and participating in this remarkable event. For many reasons, it can never happen the exact same way again, but there are equally just as many wonderful reasons to be happy that once it did.

I am also extremely blessed by getting to know so many of my wonderful cousins first hand. I sincerely appreciate all that they have contributed to our Robert Berry Genealogy. Without their efforts, hard work, and contributions this story would have never been known.

I also want to thank my dear wife for being extremely helpful in the 2007 reunion, so patient, so involved, and so supportive of my incurable affliction with the Genealogy Bug.

CHAPTER 1

WILLIAMSONS, FOSTERS, BERRYS & KEMPS

I have been researching the Robert Berry family from Orange County for fourteen years. When I first started researching, I soon found some things I needed to look at very carefully. In the Census forms from 1790 to 1840, the head of household given and surnames were the only names listed on the forms. Sometimes they would be listed alphabetically, which was not totally useless but not very helpful either. When the families were listed in the order of where they lived it became much more valuable. I would search the census forms from the very early years and become familiar with as many of the surnames in the county as possible. The cluster of surnames in one county often varies greatly from the surnames listed in the very next county. The clusters of surnames in a close community were often related to each other. This seemed to be a pattern throughout other states as well. I always paid particular attention to the very close neighbors' surnames in the area that I was searching, and where they lived in respect to each other. This is a very important tool. Since there were really not very many people in the early settlements, many of them migrated there together. Many of them were friends but a lot of them were related by blood and many by marriage.

As the children of the original settlers found it necessary to migrate to other areas, many of them would form wagon trains and travel together. When you find a group of familiar family surnames living close to each other in a new location, it is almost a sure bet that they are the relatives you are searching for. The 1850 census added three great features. In the 1850 census wives' names, children's names, ages, and the state where they were born were enumerated.

Grouping of surnames also works in reverse. As the settlers were immigrating to the Colonies in America from England and establishing the first settlements along the coastal waters, many of them formed close relationships through marriage and religion. In our Robert Berry family, a concentration of surnames that are related to each other were found in Princess Anne County, Virginia,² and many of these same surnames are known to be related to each other in our Orange County Robert Berry family as well.

This is not really surprising. When pioneers relocated from one area to another, they needed to go with family and friends for safety and support. Warring Indians were frequently a threat as the white settlers headed to the West and also as they settled their new homesteads. They had to help each other while traveling or when they started building their homes in the new settlement. When they reached a suitable location to settle, they already had a readymade community of people who had known each other for a long time. Many of them were related and wanted to stay together. The logical thing to do was to build a new community together. If they located in established settlements, they merely expanded the size of the hamlet or town.

From my own research and the information from many other sources, I know without a doubt that our Robert Berry family was in the American colonies long before it became a Nation. The newest information we have indicates that our Robert Berry family has been here since some of the very earliest settlements were established on the shores of Virginia.

The earliest members of our family to arrive in America currently known to us are Roger Williamson³ and John Carraway. John Carraway⁴ and Roger Williamson were good friends and came to America on the ship Constance⁵ in that year 1642. They were headrights of Christopher Boyce.

In 1645, Roger Williamson married Ann Foster, who was born in England in 1620.

This union produced three children by the year 1650.

Children: of Ann Foster and Roger Williamson:

Richard Williamson married Mary Kemp. Bartholomew Williamson. Sarah Williamson married Matthew Mathias

Robert Berry's (OC) Maternal Line to Roger Williamson

Roger Williamson married Ann Foster about 1640 in England or in Norfolk County, Va.

Richard Williamson married Mary Kemp about 1670 in Norfolk County, Va. Mary Williamson Married Robert Berry around 1690 in Norfolk County, Va. Robert Berry married Elizabeth Cate around 1758 in Orange County, North Carolina.

George Kemp married Mary Hutchinson and homesteaded at Kemps Landing. This community just south of Virginia Beach is currently known as Kempsville.

I think George and Mary Kemp are Robert Berry's (OC) great- grandparents. All of the documentation listed above has been well documented. The only documentation that is missing is documenting that Robert Berry Jr. in Princess Anne County, Virginia, is the same Robert Berry who settled in Orange County, North Carolina. I will attempt to prove they are the same person in this book. The best way to accomplish this is to look at known family surnames where our known ancestors lived.

Robert Berry⁸ is first found in Norfolk Rent Rolls in 1704. Very little is known about him or his origin. Most of the information we have on him comes from his wife's family. We know for sure that he married Mary Williamson and that he had more than two children. Robert¹⁰ lists the name of his first son Richard, his youngest son Robert,¹¹ his wife Mary, and all my other children in his 1730 will. Robert's son, Robert Berry Jr., was only about one year old when his father died.

Since Mary Williamson's entire family came to America from England and lived in an English colony, I think it is reasonable to believe that Robert Berry also came to America from England.

Richard Williamson married Mary Kemp¹² about 1670. Mary Kemp was the daughter of George¹³ and Mary Hutchinson Kemp.

Richard and Mary's daughter, Mary Williamson, ¹⁴ married Robert Berry in Norfolk County, Virginia, around 1690.

I have no idea how long Robert Berry (PAC)¹⁵ had been in America, where he came from, or who his parents are.

Robert Berry and Mary Williamson had a son, Robert Berry Jr., born in 1729.

Robert Berry's mother and grandmother were both named Mary. His mother was Mary Williamson and his grandmother was Mary Kemp.

Robert Berry (OC) named his first daughter Mary Berry. Because of the traditional

English naming pattern, I have thought for many years that when I found Robert Berry's (OC) mother her name would be Mary.

Roger Williamson died before 1650 and Ann Foster Williamson married her husband's good friend, John Carraway.

Ann and John Caraway also had three children. They were John, Mary, and Elizabeth.

Their son, John Caraway, married Ann Kemp, who was Mary Kemp's sister.

Richard Williamson and John Carraway were half-brothers and when John Carraway married Ann Kemp, they became brothers- in-law as well. Ann Foster Carraway died in Princess Anne County, Virginia, in 1692.

Children of Ann Foster and John Caraway:

Mary Caraway married Lancaster Lovett.

Elizabeth Caraway married Nicholas or Nichols.

John Caraway married **Ann Kemp**.

Searching for where Robert Berry (OC) was born;

I will refer to Robert Berry from Princess Anne County, Virginia, as Robert Berry (PAC). I will refer to his son, Robert Berry from Orange County, NC, as Robert Berry (OC).

Ann Kemp, who married John Caraway, and Mary Kemp, who married Richard Williamson, were sisters. Ann and Mary's parents were George and Mary Hutchinson Kemp of Kemp's Landing in Princess Anne County, Virginia. Kempsville, Virginia, is named for George Kemp. Many sources support the Williamson and Kemp family relationship. There is a great deal of information about these families in the Genealogy Library in Virginia Beach, Virginia. You will see that many other Surnames found in the early Virginia Colony are clustered around Robert Berry (OC) and his family many years later.

Tully Robinson is found in 1704 Virginia Tax Roll living in Norfolk County and Princess Anne County, Virginia.

William Robinson is found in the 1755 Orange County Tax Roll on page 25.

William Robinson signed Robert Berry's will as a witness in 1812 on page 68.

Nancy Robinson and Alex Robinson were living three farms away from Henry Berry in the 1820 Orange County Census.

Henry Robinson was granted land in Fayette County, Alabama, on May 18th, 1824.

Robert Berry Jr and his son, George Berry, were granted land in Fayette County, Alabama on the 26th of April, 1824.

John Robinson was living on one side of Robert Berry Jr. and David Middleton Berry was living on the other side of his father in the 1830 Fayette County, Alabama, census.

Robert Berry's aunt, Sarah Williamson, married Mathew Mathias in Princess Anne County, Virginia.

Mathew Mathias was living very close to Robert Berry (OC) in the 1755 Orange County Tax List and is listed on the same page. (See page 26)

I will point out many more examples like this in this book.




Figure 2: Robert Berry (PAC) Will 1730




Figure 3: Robert Berry (PAC) Estate Sale 1730

Transcription of Robert Berry's Will, Princess Anne County

WILL OF ROBERT BERRY September 20" 1730

In the name of God Amen: The twentieth day of September in the year of our Lord one thousand and in hundred and thirty. I Robt Berry of Prencess Ann County in Virginia being of perfect mind 5 memory

vis I also and be questly to my logina wife Mary Berry must lantation I now live on

vis I give and bequeath to my loving wife Mary Berry my plantation I now live on with

houses cleared ground orchard sharing her gift after her decease to my son Richard Berry and the heirs lawfully begot of his body for ever. I give unto my son Richard my gun cupboard. Vis I give to my son Robt Berry the plantation I had by my wife farming upon bought this Land of George Williamsons land being about one hundred acres of land to himself and the heirs of his body lawfully begot for ever vis I give to my loving wife Mary Berry all the rest of any Estate both within 5 Without assessing his —— one young mare my desire is she may be sold 5 of his proceeds to be divided among all my children in the estate I so hereby nominate, appoint 5 ordain my loving wife Mary Berry to be My whole 5 sole executor of this my last will 5 testament disposing all former Wills by me made establishing confirming 5 allowing this to be my last will and Testament 5 none other——— Testimony whereof I now hereunto to Set my hand and seal.

Signed 5 sealed In presence of us Bartho Williamson Sarah S Mathyas Robert-I Berry Seal

Presented at court held the 7th October 1730
named then the above last will and testament
Robt Berry died in Princess Ann County
His Executor made oath that she is Mary Berry
Proved by the oath of both his witnesses
Hereunito is ordered to be recorded.

Seeking Information about Robert Berry's (PAC) Origin

Most of Robert Berry's maternal family was located in South Norfolk County, Virginia, in the 1700's. I decided it might be a good idea to search for Berry family surnames in Norfolk County, England. I searched the British Chancery Records 1836–1558 on Ancestry.com. I did this by typing in the surname and looking at where they resided in England. Nearly all of the Robert Berry (PAC) family surnames can be found there. Here are a few family surnames that were found in Norfolk County, England.

Ann Foster married Roger Williamson and they named their first son Richard Williamson. Ann's father was Robert Foster and she was born in England in 1620.

It seems that whoever named Norfolk and Suffolk in the American colony of Virginia may have had some connection to these two counties in England. Both have about the same physical relationship to each other in America and England. It is a well known fact that many of

the early settlers in Virginia did come from England. Jamestown in America was the first successful English Colony and this is where South Norfolk County was located.

Known Naming Patterns Used In My Berry Family.

The English naming pattern:

First male child was named for his paternal grandfather

Second male child was named for his maternal grandfather.

Third son would be named for his father.

First daughter was usually named for the paternal grandmother.

Second daughter would be named for the maternal grandmother.

Third daughter was named for her mother.

Robert and Mary Williamson Berry seemed not to follow the conventional English naming pattern if you assume that Richard Berry was their first son. This may not be the case at all. Their first son may have been named for his paternal grandfather and the second son, Richard Berry, named for his maternal grandfather, Richard Williamson. The first son may have died after Richard Berry was born and the third son would be named for his father, Robert Berry Senior, or grandfather. This would fit the correct order for naming sons by the English pattern.

A variation of this naming order was used in my line of the Berry family. My grandmother, Ida Ann Wilson Berry, named her first daughter after her paternal grandmother and their second daughter (my mother) for her maternal great-grandmother. This is still naming the first daughter for the paternal side of the family and second daughter after the maternal side.

My third great-grandfather was Thomas Person Berry and his father was **William Berry**. Thomas P. Berry's wife was Sarah Lunsford and her father was named **William Lunsford**. Thomas and Sarah named their first son, William H. Berry, for his paternal grandfather and their second son, Willie Berry, for his maternal grandfather. My Berry family was still following the English pattern in 1836 and 1838.

My mother told me that she was German, Scot-Irish, and English. Her maternal grandparents were Coleman and Wilson (English and Scot-Irish), her Paternal grandparents were Berry and Bowling (English and English). I do not know where the German ancestry came into the mix. Mother did have a maternal great-great-grandmother named Elizabeth Rux Garrett who may have been of German descent, or it might the Waggoner connections.

Robert Berry (OC) and Elizabeth Cate named their first daughter Mary (paternal mother, Mary Williamson, or paternal grandmother, Mary Kemp,) and their first son Robert Berry Junior (for his father or the paternal grandfather Robert). Their second son was named John Berry for his maternal grandfather, John Cate. Their third son was named Joshua Berry for Elizabeth's older brother, Joshua Cate.

Roger Williamson and Ann Foster married about 1640.

Richard Williamson and Mary Kemp married about 1670.

Mary Williamson and Robert Berry (PAC) married about 1690.

Robert Berry Jr. was born in Princess Anne County, Virginia, in 1729.

Robert Berry Jr. was only about 1 year old when Robert Berry (PAC) died.

Robert Berry (OC) was born about 1729 and died in 1814 at the age of 85.

Robert Berry (OC) and Elizabeth Cate married about 1758. We have not located the father of Robert Berry (PAC) who lived in Princess Anne County, Virginia.





Figure 5: Richard Williamson (PAC) Will 1723

Many of Robert Berry's (PAC) family surnames are his in-laws. They are related to his wife, Mary Williamson. Many of these family surnames seen in these early 1704 Virginia Rent Rolls also appear in the 1755 Orange County, North Carolina, Tax List (Pages. 25 & 26).

Since there are so many family surnames appearing in both lists, the odds are that many of them may be related in both locations. You will see many other documents in many areas of America connecting the family relationships of the Kemp, Williamson, Carraway, and Berry families. At this time, all evidence suggests that Robert Berry (OC) is the son of Robert and Mary Williamson Berry from Princess Anne County, Virginia.

NOTE: Robert Berry (OC) was even named Robert Berry Jr. in his Granville Land Survey of 1753. (See Pg. 47)

The year Robert Berry (OC) was born, 1729/1730, is exactly the time I had deduced from my earlier research many years ago. Since Robert Berry (OC) died in 1814, he would have been 84 or 85 years old at the time of his death. We know that Robert Berry (OC) died before January 14th, 1815, because this is the date that Mary Berry Camp's children drafted their power of attorney to claim their mother's inheritance (See Pg. 87).

David Edgar Berry tried to connect Robert Berry (OC) to Scotland but I have serious doubts about his research. One major error made in David's work states that Elizabeth Cate Berry died in Tennessee. This is absolutely not true and can be proven. She died in Orange County, North Carolina, about 1815 or1816. Her husband, Robert Berry (OC), named her in his will that he wrote in 1812 (See Pg. 68). The will was probated in 1814 in Orange County, North Carolina. Elizabeth and her son, Henry Berry, were administrators of that will. There are many other misstatements in his research that can be proven incorrect. Many electronic family tree files quote David's information verbatim, but my research brings out many serious questions about its validity. Martha Mangum and I made attempts to work with David soon after he had published his tree. David died before our views could be reconciled. I only mention this to caution you not to be too quick to believe that Robert Berry (OC) was of Scottish descent.

I have only two sources of information that list a Robert Berry who was born about 1730. This is the appropriate age for our ancestor Robert Berry (OC). Robert Berry appears to be originally from England in both or them.

In Peter Wilson Coldham's book¹⁹ recorded on a CD:

"The record states that in 1744" Robert Berry of Devon, England, 14 years of age is shown as indicted, convicted and sentenced to 14 years in gaol (jail). He is reprieved and transported to Kent County, Maryland. He arrives there on 15 April 1744 where he is indentured.

Place: Maryland Year: 1744

Primary Individual: Berry, Robert

I do not think the above record is our Robert Berry (OC).

One reason I do not think this is our Robert Berry (OC) is because he would not have had very much money in 1751. After having been indentured as a virtual slave for 7 years, it is likely he would have had very limited means. If this Robert Berry served his full 7 year indenture, he would have been a free man in 1751. The general rule was that after an indentured man completed his obligation, the Master only had to provide the indentured person with a gun, shot, powder, and a new suit of clothes.

Robert Berry (OC) had funds when he made entry for his Granville Land Grant on February 6th, 1752. There is also no evidence that he ever had any problems making his quitrent payments or taxes, either. Robert Berry Jr., who was born in Princess Anne County, Va., inherited property from his father and would have had money.

Here is a record that is more likely to be our Robert Berry (OC).

The fact that Robert Berry (OC) indentured himself to Samuel Hollowell²⁰ in Virginia leads me to believe that he is our North Carolina ancestor. Samuel Hollowell is thought to have been married to Robert Berry's (OC) sister. After Mary Williamson Berry died, Robert Berry

(OC) apprenticed himself to learn the carpentry trade in 1746, and 5 years later he was in Granville County, North Carolina.

A person over 15 years old could bind himself to servitude from 2 to 7 years. The Court indentured Robert Berry during his minor years in 1746 to Samuel Hollowell. Robert Berry would have been 21 years old in 1751 and would have been free from that indenture because of his age. This is the exact same year that our Robert Berry came to North Carolina.

In both of these records Robert Berry's birth year is very close to what we know about Robert Berry's (OC) age. They were both free of their indenture by 1751, also. As far as I can tell, there is no other evidence that the 14 year old Robert Berry from Devon, England,

.. is Robert Berry (OC) and even if he was, he would still be from England and not Scotland.

Some Early Family Surnames In England

Here is a source of English surnames that appear in Norfolk County, England, Norfolk County, Virginia, and Orange County, NC. These same names show up in many other places in this country where the descendants of our Robert Berry (OC) lived.

The Norfolk Ancestor is a journal of the NFHS (Norfolk Historical Society). In the March 2008 issue they published surnames of many of their residents. I have selected a few of our family surnames who resided in Norfolk County, England.


Henry Waggoner is George Waggoner's father, and Patrick Rutherford owned the property adjoining Robert Berry's (OC) Fiddleton Plantation in 1780. The rest of these surnames can be found in PAC, VA. It is a fact that Robert Berry (OC) was in North Caronia in 1751. He had already built a small cabin in the northeast corner of his property near Thomas Bradford's southeast corner before he made entry for his land grant on Feb. 6th, 1752, in Granville County.

Transcription of John Kemp's 1723 Will

"In the name of God Amen I John Kemp and Elder of the parish of Linhavon & county of Princess Anne and Colony of Virginia being sick in body but sound of mind & memory blessed by God do make this My last Will & testament in manner flowering Vis: First I bequeath my soul into the hands of my merciful creator my body to the earth to be decently buried according to the decision of my executor. In hopes of a joyful resurrection through the merits & by the meditations of Jesus Christ.

Second I give and bequeath to my cousin **John Williamson** the said plantation which I now live to him and his heirs forever.

Third I give and bequeath to my cousins George Kemp & Roger Williamson & John Williamson the remaining part of that tract of land sold to Matthew Mathias. And my will is that my cousin George Kemp to have the North and or share where my hogg pens are, the other part to be divided between said Roger and John Williamson I give the said parcel of land to them my two cousins & their heirs forever. I give and bequeath unto my sister Elizabeth Smith & cousin Mary Wishard & cousin Roger Williamson pewter and earthenware Except two basins I give to my cousin John Williamson to be first chosen & (unreadable word) and remaining to be equally divided between my sister and the two cousins before mentioned to whom I give the same. I give and bequeath the bed whereon I now lay .to my cousin **John** Williamson with the covering that belonging it. I give and bequeath to my cousin Mary Wishard my new bed & furniture that is with it. I give to my cousin Roger Williamson my old bed. I give unto my sister Eliz Smith eleven and a quarter Brown Holland, Eight yards fine linen now in house. I give and bequeath to my cousin Ann Cooper wife of Thomas Cooper. Four ewes & four lambs' young ewes. I give the remainder of the sheep to be divided between my cousins Roger & John Williamson & cousin Mary Wishard equally. I give my cattle & hogs only excepted which give my cousin **James Kemp** at my hog pens to be equally divided between my three cousins Roger & John Williamson & cousin Mary Wishard I give my sister Eliz Smith the benefit. I give unto my cousin Roger Williamson my NegroWoman, Nany to him & his heirs forever. give unto my cousin **Thom Wishard** the older my riding Saddle & bridle. I give and bequeath unto my cousin Mary Kemp daughter of George Kemp my crab spice Mortar & pestle & great Bible & wicker basket on mantle piece, to her & her heirs. I give unto my cos: Jhn Williamson My new curb bridle & my broad Cloth: riding Coat & new coat & vest now made. I give unto my brother-In-law Will Smith my circuit cutter riding coat. viz I give unto my Cus: Roger Williamson all of remaining part of my cloths: Vis I give unto my sister Eliz Smith my cousin Mary Wishard & cousins Roger & JhnWilliamson all the remaining part of my estate Except only the Great Bible which do give my cousin MaryKemp.to them & their heirs. Lastly I do hereby nominate, appoint, & empower **Thoms Wishard** & GeoWilliamson my executors to do & perform this my last will and Testament according to the aforementioned & in witness of & confirmation whereas have set my hand & seal4th day of March 1723...



Some Norfolk County Court and Land Records

"Indenture 5 Aug 1735 **Roger Williamson** leased to Edward Thurston of Norfolk, Va. For 5 schillings 50 acres land given by **John Kemp, Sr.** to his cousin **George Kemp** and **Roger Williamson** bound to **James Kemp, John Williamson**, **Henry Mathias** and **William Robinson** Aug 6 1735."

William Robinson was listed in the 1755 Orange County Tax list (Page 25). William Robinson is five dwellings away from Thomas Berrey in the 1755 Orange County Tax list.

William Robinson witnessed Robert Berry's (OC) will in 1812 in N.C. (See Pg. 68)

"P 155Release of land from Wm. **Craford** to George Williamson dated 6 Dec.1727" James Craford is on the 1755 Orange County Tax list **(Page 243).**

"August 1751 On motion of **William Martin**²³ it is ordered that he have the Labor of two Negro boys named Hercules and Ceasar as an apprentice for taking George Askis an apprentice and its further ordered that the said **Martin** have leave to carry said Negro into North Carolina with him provided he give bond and security in the sum of 200 lbs current money of Virginia to see he said Negroes fourth coming when lawful remanded."

These men are listed on pages 25 & 26 in the 1755 Orange County Tax List. William Hartin? (Martin. H was transcribed in place of M) was living next door to Mathew Mathias in the 1755 Orange County Tax list (Page 26).

Robert Berry (OC) is the nephew of **Sarah Williamson & Matthew Mathias** (page 14).

Henry Gould (Gold) was living two dwellings away from William Hartin (Martin?) in the 1755 Orange County Tax list (Page 26.).

Henry Gold was the sworn chain carrier in Robert Berry's (OC) 1753 survey for the Granville Land grant. (*Gould family is in the 1704 Rent Rolls from PAC, VA.*)

David Bradford was listed three dwellings away from Robert Berry in the 1755 Orange County tax list. Thomas Bradford's property joined Robert Berry's Granville Land Grant on the north boundary in 1753.

James Nickleson is in 1755 Orange County Tax list (Page 25).

Richard Camp is six dwellings from William Robinson and can be seen on the 1755 Orange County tax list (**Page 25**). **Wm. Robinson** is also a witness to Robert Berry's will. (**See Pg. 68**).

It is very likely that this group of young men came to North Carolina with Robert Berry (OC) from Princess Anne County, Virginia. Some were relatives, others were neighbors and friends. **John Cate** and his brother, **Thomas Cate**, may have come to Orange County with this group, also. John was born in Prince George County, Va., which was created from Norfolk County, Virginia, as was Princess Anne County, Virginia.

All of these recently found facts indicate that Robert Berry (OC) was born in Princess Anne County, Virginia, in 1729. We know he lived about 65 years in Orange County, North Carolina, and is buried on his own plantation in the private Fiddleton cemetery. He died in 1814 at the approximate age of 85.

Many of Robert Berry's (OC) neighbors are buried in the Little River

Presbyterian Church Cemetery. The Presbyterian movement was brought to America by Scot-Irish settlers.

All of these surnames are also found in Orange County, North Carolina; Kemp, Mathias, Murray, Wood, Webb, Nichols/Nichols, and Hopkins. There are connections between the Berry family in Orange County, NC, and most of these names. There is a Hopkins Family living with Henry Berry in the 1850 Orange County, North Carolina, Census. (See Page 202)

George Kemp's Will




Figure 6: George Kemp's Will 1678

George Kemp names his daughter in this will as Mary Williamson. I have located a connection between the Shirley family and the Kemp family. We already know that many members of the Williamson family, including Robert Berry (PAC), owned property adjoining George Shirley in Princess Anne County, Virginia (See Pages 29 to 31). George and Mary Shirley were also witnesses on Richard Williamson's will (See Fig. 5, Pg. 20).

Some Information from the Shirley Family Association Web Page ²⁹ "In 1640, George Kemp is 28 years of age".

"Ann Kemp was the wife of Sir Thomas Shirley, the elder. Her brother, Sir Thomas Kemp, was the father of Mary Kemp who married Edward Digges, son of Sir Dudley Digges. Edward and Mary went to VA."

"A John and George Kemp appraised Rev. Josias Mackis estate in 1718 in Princess Anne Co. John Shirley, Sr. is mentioned." *I think that Josias Mackis may have been Josias M. Ackiss*.

Many surnames associated with our Robert Berry (OC) family are listed in Norfolk County, England; South Norfolk County, Virginia; the 1704 Virginia Rent Rolls, and the 1755 Orange County Tax List. ³⁰ Starting at the top of page 29 and continuing to page 31 you see George Shirley owns property adjoining Robert Berry, the Kemps, Williamson, Mathias, Nichlos, Wood, Hopkins, and Whitehurst families. It also connects the Kemp family to the Shirley family by a marriage. The Williamson family married into the Kemp, Whitehurst, Mathias, Nichlos, and Berry families. See John Kemp's will (See Page 27) and Richard Williamsons will (See Fig. 5, Pg. 20).

Two of Robert Berry's (OC) children married descendants of the Kemp family in Orange County, North Carolina. Mary Berry first married George Waggoner, who died from wounds received at the battle of Guilford Courthouse in 1781, and then she married **James Kemp** around December, 1781.

Robert Berry Jr. married James Kemp's sister, **Mary Kemp**. Robert Jr. and Mary Kemp Berry's first child was a little girl they named Catherine. Catherine Berry was born in 1785. Their first son was named **George** Berry who was born about 1786. All of their children were born in Orange County, NC. Robert Berry Jr. is the only son of Robert (OC) and Elizabeth Cate Berry to use the name **George** as a given name. **George Kemp** in Princess Anne County, Virginia, is most likely Mary Kemp Berry's ancestor. My guess is that **George Berry** was named for **George Kemp**. This exact relationship remains to be proven.

I have the wills of: Richard Williamson (Fig. 5, Pg. 20) John Kemp's will transcription. (Pg: 27) Robert Berry (PAC) (Fig. 3, Pg. 16) George Kemp (PAC) (Fig. 6, Pg. 32) Robert Berry (OC) (Page 68)

A Court Record that states: Robert Berry indentured himself to Samuel Hollowell.

Princess Anne County, Virginia, to Orange County, North Carolina.

This Berry/Kemp family connection in Princess Anne County, Virginia, continued into North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, and Alabama for many years. Mary Berry married James Kemp/Camp and Robert Berry Jr. married Mary Kemp/Camp in Orange County, N.C. Both of these families migrated directly from North Carolina at different times and homesteaded in South Carolina and Alabama.

In the 1755 Orange County Tax List, most of the men who may have come to North Carolina together were young single men. Some of them may have been married and left their wives and families back home. Richard Camp, William Robinson, James Nicholson, Thomas Berry, James Craford, William Martin, Mathew Mathias, and Robert Berry all listed as single men with no slaves and this usually meant that these men were staking out property to establish a homestead. Henry Gould and Richard Gibbs both listed 2 in their household. A listing of 2 would usually mean that the head of household was married. When 2 men shared a dwelling, both names were enumerated. Since John Cate was born in Prince George County, Virginia, and that county lay west of Princess Anne County and on the route to Granville County, North Carolina, I think it is possible that John Cate and his brothers may have joined the group of young explorers traveling to North Carolina. The distance from Princess Anne County to Hillsborough, North Carolina is 238 miles today. This could be done on horseback in about 12 to 14 days. There is always a possibility that the Cate and Berry families may have had other connections in Virginia or even in England that we have yet to discover. All the evidence indicates that they had a very close relationship after arriving in North Carolina.

The part of Orange County where Robert Berry (OC) and John Cate homesteaded was in Granville County when they arrived in North Carolina. A short time later that part of Granville County became Orange County. By settling near the Flat River and moving south to stake their

claims, these young men obviously arrived there together. If they had gone into the area that is now Hillsborough, they would have been moving north to claim available land there. There was a gap of unclaimed land between the Flat River settlement and the Hillsborough settlement. When the 1755 Tax List was compiled, clusters of names in the two areas clearly pointed out this fact. I think most all of the settlers in the Flat River area were second or third generation Americans. In an article quoted below written about Francis Nash, the author very clearly described conditions in Orange County when our ancestors first arrived there.

"FRANCIS NASH, fourth son of John and Ann Owen Nash, was born at Templeton Manor, the homestead of his father in Prince Edward County, Virginia, about 1742. I have given some account of his ancestry in the sketch of his brother, Governor Abner Nash. His father was a well-to-do planter and gave his sons such an education as befitted their condition. Francis Nash certainly had a good English education and some acquaintance with the classics.

The two brothers, Abner and Francis, seem to have come to Childsburg, now Hillsborough, in late 1762 or early 1763. Francis located there, while Abner in a few months went elsewhere. Childsburg had then all the roughness and rawness and raggedness of a back country settlement. It had been the county seat about nine years of a county that was great in territory but small in population. At this time, there were about a dozen dwellings in it, and all of these except three or four were simple log cabins. Two at least of the frame buildings were taverns. Only two of the streets had been laid off, and these at their north and west ends were mere broad roads through a forest. The courthouse was built of logs, while the jail was a small log cabin surrounded by a high stockade. There was no resident minister of the gospel, no church and no schoolhouse. There were two or three small stores on the corners near the court-house. Edmund Fanning had come a few months before and, besides practicing law, was a partner in one of these mercantile establishments. Francis Nash brought some capital with him, and he also invested in a store."

Source: (Biographical History of North Carolina from Colonial Times to Present, By Samuel A. Ashe, Vol. III, published 1906)

After considering the routes to North Carolina that were available to the migrating settlers in 1750, I think I can explain why Robert Berry (OC) located where he did in North Carolina. I also think I can explain how Robert Berry (OC) first met John Cate and his family. It seems reasonable that a group of young men who were traveling into the wilderness would follow a river or stream when they could because this is where the wild game would come to drink water. Since wild game would be the major source of their food, it would make sense to use as little effort in securing their food as possible. The James River in Virginia can be followed from eastern Virginia to Richmond or to the Old Indian Trail. There was an old Indian trail that connected Richmond through Petersburg to the Eno River where the Occaneechi Indian village was located. The old Occaneechi Indian Village is in Hillsborough, N.C., today. As Robert Berry and his party of explorers left Princess Anne County, Virginia, westward along the south side of Chesapeake Bay, they had to pass through Norfolk, Nansemond, Isle of Wight, Surry, Prince George, Charles City, and Henrico Counties to reach Petersburg, Virginia.

Robert Berry and his party may have met the Cate family as they journeyed through Surry County. John Cate, his sons and brothers likely joined this group as they passed through

Surry County on their way to North Carolina. According to the research that I have seen, our Cate family lived in Surry County, Virginia, before coming to North Carolina. Unfortunately, I have never been able to find documentation substantiating this. I do think Robert Berry knew John Cate and his family before he entered North Carolina.

Shortly before the pioneers reached the Eno River on the Old Indian Trail, they had to cross the Flat River. Immediately after crossing the Flat River, they made a sharp turn to the north. As they traveled up the Flat River it gradually veered slowly to the west. It eventually led to the exact point where John Cate's Granville Land Grant was surveyed on **December 4**th, 1753. A statement that is in the description of John Cate's Grant reads: "land surveyed on both sides of Flat River."

After John Cate had located his land, Robert Berry (OC) headed south from that Flat River following a tributary known as Lick Creek. The first available unclaimed land that Robert Berry (OC) found was south of the Thomas Bradford property. Robert Berry (OC) claimed this land in1751. He made entry for this property on February 6th, 1752, and the survey for his Granville Land Grant was done on **December 3rd**, 1753. Thomas Cate was a sworn chain carrier on Robert Berry's (OC) and John Cate's surveys.

John Cate was granted two separate tracts of land in Orange County, North Carolina. This land was later included in Caswell County, and it eventually became part of Person County. The first tract was surveyed on December 4th, 1753, (**See Page 37**) and the second tract was surveyed on October 13th, 1758. (**See Page 39**) It was the second tract of land that has been located near Lick Creek in the Google maps on **page 40**. I am unsure where the earlier grant was located but I think it was very close to the second grant property.




Figure 7: Route from Virginia to North Carolina

This was a route used by many fur traders from the early 1700's as noted on page 36. In his book "A NEW VOYAGE TO CAROLINA", John Lawson describes part of the Old Indian Trail between Hillsborough and Haw River which became Orange County, North Carolina, in May of 1851.

This Old Indian Trail passed through Granville County, North Carolina, in February of

1851 when Robert Berry (OC) first came to the state.

For a very long time, I thought Robert Berry (OC) came down the Shenandoah Valley from Maryland. This was based on the first record I ever found about a Robert Berry, who was indentured in Maryland, and who was the right age to be our Robert Berry (OC). This was the reason I thought Robert Berry chose the land he did. There was an expansion from the North Carolina line toward the South and there was land being granted starting at Hillsborough in a northern direction. There was a gap of unclaimed land between the two expansions. There was obviously a path of some kind between Fiddleton and Hillsborough because that is where Robert's quit rent was paid and where he went to serve on jury duty many times.

If Robert Berry (OC) was born in Princess Anne County, Virginia, he would have entered North Carolina via the Old Indian Trail that leads from Petersburg, Virginia, to Hillsborough, North Carolina. Robert Berry's Granville Land Grant was 14 miles north of Hillsborough. Traveling at 20 miles per day, it would take about two weeks to go from Princess Anne County to Fiddleton.

John Lawson³¹ describes some land close to Hillsborough in his book. Even though Lawson was there in 1704 and Robert Berry (OC) arrived there about 47 years later, I doubt that much had changed in the Occaneechi Indian Village that John Lawson called the "Achonechi Town". John Lawson's book is the earliest known record of Native Americans and description of the natural virgin wilderness in North Carolina. His reason for being there was to catalog the plants and herbs that could be made into medicines of the day. In 1704 John Lawson wrote in his book, "A NEW VOYAGE TO CAROLINA", ³² as he was traveling from Haw River to the Indian Village on the Eno River. Lawson's party had spent the night near Haw River, which was about 20 miles west of Hillsborough:

"As soon as it was day, we set out for the *Achonechy* Town, it being, by Estimation, 20 Miles off. Which, I believe, is pretty exact, We got about half way, (meeting great Gangs of Turkeys) when we saw, at a Distance, 30 loaded Horses coming on the Road, with four or five Men, on other Jades, driving them. We charg'd our Piece, and went up to them: Enquiring, whence they came from? They told us *Virginia*. The leading Man's Name was *Massy, Who* was born about *Leeds* in *Yorkshire*."

There was some more conversation between the two parties and then:

"The Virginia Men asking our Opinion of the Country we were in? We told them, it was a very pleasant one. They were all of the same Opinion, and affirm'd, That they had never seen 20 Miles of such extraordinary rich Land, lying all together, like that betwixt *Hau-River* and the *Achonechi* Town."

It is very interesting that the party of men John Lawson met were headed south and coming from Virginia. This was 47 years before Robert Berry came south from Virginia to the community that would later be known as Hillsborough. Robert Berry (OC) would have been on the very same trail that was used by the men Lawson met and would have seen the same Indian village at Achonechy Town. (See trail on page 35)

JOHN CATE'S GRANVILLE LAND GRANTS.




Figure 8: John Cate's First Land Grant

John Cate's Land Grant Survey was done on December 4th, 1753; the very next day after Robert Berry's Land Grant Survey was done. This tract of land was granted to John Kate on May 9th, 1755. In the 1755 Orange County Tax document, we see that John Cate, his two sons, and Robert Berry (OC) list only males in their households. It is interesting that the Cate men listed on this document were John Kate and Thomas Kate. This may have been a mistake in spelling or an

attempt to get more land. Since land was plentiful, I tend to think it was a spelling error.

It is my opinion John Cate and his two sons staked out their property and built a cabin. After their land was granted to them, I think they returned to Virginia and brought the females in their family to North Carolina. This is when our grandmother, Elizabeth Cate (Berry), first came to North Carolina. I think Robert Berry (OC) and Elizabeth Cate were married very soon after Elizabeth came to Orange County, North Carolina.

We know from **page 63** that Margery Lawrence and John Cate witnessed in the trial of Robert Berry against Richard Gibbs in 1756. This time frame correlates very closely to the time Robert Berry (OC) was awarded his Granville Land Grant in 1757. I think this establishes approximately when Robert Berry and Elizabeth Cate were married. Robert and Elizabeth Berry's first child, Mary Berry, was born about 1758 -1759. The fact that Thomas Cate was a chain carrier for Robert Berry's survey on December 3rd, 1753, also tells me that Robert Berry (OC), John Cate, and his two sons were very close friends from the time Robert entered North Carolina. It also leads me to believe they came from Virginia together.

Three Transcribed Person County 1817 February Court Records:

"Page 273: Division of negroes of Richard **Holeman** on 27th November 1816 Richard Holeman: children of **Elizabeth Persons**: Joshua Cate."

"Page 275: Account Sales of property of John Cates decd; by Jesse Evans and J. Rountree."

"Page 277: Inv. Estate of Jane Holeman decd. taken 4th May 1816 by Rachel Cate adm."

Joshua Cate must have married one of Richard Holeman's daughters and Elizabeth Holeman must have married one of General Thomas Person's relatives. This may explain why Hannah Cate named her youngest son Thomas **Person** Berry. Elizabeth Cate Berry's older brother was named Joshua Cate, and this Joshua may be her brother or more likely his son. I always thought there was some type of family connection to **General Thomas Person**.

John Cate's daughter, Elizabeth Cate, has been found in four sources. In John Cate's will he named his daughter, Elizabeth Berry.

On 13th of June, 1777, George Smith of Caswell County sold to John Cate 76 acres of land for 105 pounds, lying on the Flat River, land that joins John Cate's own property. Witnesses: **Elizabeth C. Berry**, **Robert Smith**, John Cate Sr. (Deed Bk. A, Pg 43)

Elizabeth (Cate) Berry purchased 1 Keeler for 8 schillings at William Cate's estate sale in 1803. William Cate may have been Elizabeth Cate Berry's cousin. (See Page 164) William Cate was also the father of two of Elizabeth's daughters-in-law, Hannah and Sarah Cate.

Robert Berry named his wife, Elizabeth, in his 1812 will. **(See Page 68)**John Cate's second Land Grant Survey was done on the 13th of October, 1758, and was granted to John Cate on August 20th, 1759.

While I have not been able to locate John Cate's first land grant, his second grant was much easier to locate. On the following pages you can see where this property is located. You can tell by the shape of the property where the grant matches the present day Google Map of Flat River. On page **40** you can see that the property is located very close to where Lick Creek joins Flat River. The second grant may have been made to Elizabeth Cate Berry's brother, John Cate. The document does not say it was John Cate Jr. Thomas Cate was a chain carrier on this survey.




Figure 9: John Cate's Second Land Grant

The map below clearly shows the locations of Robert Berry's land on Lick Creek and John Cate's land on the Flat River.






Figure 10: Location of John Cate and Robert Berry's land Grants




Figure 11: John Cate will 1785

John Cate must have been living in Caswell County when he wrote his will. Person County was not formed until 1791, which was 6 years after John Cate wrote this will. If all of John and Margery Cate's children are named in this will then they had three daughters and two sons.

Richard Mathias Cate is reported to be John Cate's son. If this is true, then it is of extreme importance because Robert Berry's (OC) aunt, Sarah Williamson, married Matthew Mathias in Princess Anne County, Virginia. This may indicate that there is a family relationship between Robert Berry and John Cate's families in Virginia.

CHAPTER 2

ROBERT BERRY 1729-1814

Robert Berry came to a part of Granville County, North Carolina, which was soon to become Orange County, NC. We know that he built a small cabin in the northeast corner of his staked out land. This cabin was documented in Robert Berry's Entry for his Land Grant. Thomas Bradford owned the land just north of Robert Berry's claim.

On February 6th, 1752, Robert Berry (OC) made entry in Granville County, North Carolina, for the land he had homesteaded. **(See Pg.46)**

From the 1755 tax list, we know that Robert Berry (OC) was not alone in the wilderness. He had friends and relatives who came to North Carolina with him from Princess Anne County, Virginia. We know for sure Robert Berry (OC) was acquainted with the Cate family. This was proven by the fact that Thomas Cate acted as chain carrier on Robert Berry's Land Grant Survey in 1753. (See Fig: 12, Pg: 47). Thomas Cate was probably John Cate's brother.

Robert Berry (OC) married Elizabeth Cate, John and Margery Lawrence Cate's daughter, sometime between 1757 and 1759. Robert Berry's Land Grant Survey was done on December 3rd, 1753, and John Cate's Land Grant Survey was done the very next day on December 4th, 1753. No marriage records were kept during the early years in Orange County, North Carolina. Some time before 1757, John Cate was granted his land on the Flat River, which was part of Orange County at that time. This property is currently located in the southern part of Person County and lies very near the Orange County line. Thomas Cate, who was a chain carrier for Robert Berry's survey, ³³ was probably Elizabeth Cate's uncle.

Like Robert Berry (OC)), John Cate was living in Granville County, North Carolina, when he made Entry for his Grant. He then became a citizen of Orange County when that County was formed in 1752. In 1771, when Caswell County was formed from the northern part of Orange County, John Cate became a resident of Caswell County. Twenty years later in 1791, Person County was created from the eastern half of Caswell County. So John Cate was then a resident of Person County, NC. John Cate lived in four North Carolina counties, never having moved

John Cate wrote his will ³⁴ on January 6th, 1785. He willed property to his granddaughter, Ann Pryor, and his daughter, Margery Pryor. He gave a cow and a calf to his daughter <u>Elizabeth</u> <u>Berry.</u> John Cate also named his son, Joshua Cate, and his grandson, Joshua Cate Junior, in this will. He named Joshua Pryor as a grandson. Nancy Griffith was also named as his daughter. John Pryor must have been his son-in-law. The will was probated in the July court, 1785. The executors were his youngest son, Thomas Cate, and his son-in-law, John Pryor. Margery Lawrence Cate must have died before 1785, because John does not mention her in his will.

John and Margery Lawrence Cate's sons were Richard Mathias Cate (not mentioned in the will), Joshua Cate, John Cate, and Thomas Cate. Their daughters were Nancy Cate Griffin, Margery Cate Pryor, and Elizabeth Cate Berry.

John Cate was living in Caswell County when he wrote his will. In reality John Cate never moved from his Granville Land Grant Property. Orange County was very large when it was formed in 1752. The county was subdivided two more times. When I first read that John Cate wrote his will in Caswell County, I thought he had moved.

Our Robert Berry (OC) was granted his land grant on May 12th, 1757³⁵. He was identified on the document as Robert Berry Jnr. (See Pg. 68). The fact that he was a junior suggests that his father's name was Robert Berry. This is further proof to us that Robert Berry's (OC) parents were Robert and Mary Williamson Berry from Princess Anne County, Virginia. We also have some documentation that shows Robert Berry (OC) was indentured to Samuel Hollowell, who lived in Princess Anne County, Virginia. Many times in colonial America young men were indentured to a craftsman in order for them to learn a trade. We believe Samuel Hollowell was Robert Berry's (OC) brother-in-law. We think that Robert Berry (OC) was learning the carpenter trade. This was mentioned in court minutes.

Our Robert Berry (OC) must have had some money when he made entry for his grant. His quitrents seemed to have been paid regularly and he never had his property confiscated. This was happening a lot in Orange County around 1780 and was one of the main problems that led to the Regulator Movement. Money was very scarce because most business was done by the barter system. About the only cash available was obtained by selling farm products, furs etc., that were shipped back to England. It was very hard for local farmers to raise money as a result. Taxes and quitrent were a very real problem and many planters lost everything because of the lack of hard cash and a few crooked politicians. Robert Berry apparently had what it took to succeed because he continued to prosper throughout his entire life. More than likely, Robert raised hogs, cattle, sheep, tobacco, corn, wheat, and flax. The animals could free range and required very little feed or attention. Robert probably also did business with the fur traders. Deer skins and bear skins would bring in cash. Small animal skins would also be in demand. I know that in the 1930's my grandfather, Wiley P. Berry, sold small animal skins that he had trapped in Lick Creek and other streams around Fiddleton. It makes me wonder if the skill of trapping animals for their fur was passed down through the Berry family from Robert Berry (OC).

In 2006, Dane Berry, Bernard Berry, and I explored the original Granville Land Grant property and located a foundation of a cabin that measured about 20 by 30 feet. This site was located near the very center of his original Land Grant. It is thought that this was the plantation home from about 1758 until Robert built a much larger two story Plantation Home in 1766.

Public records show very clearly that Robert Berry (OC) was a valuable member of his local community. He served on several juries in Hillsborough, even though it was about a day's ride and 14 miles from Fiddleton. The first official record of Robert Berry (OC) was the entry date of February 6th, 1752 on the Warrant granted in Granville County, NC. (See Pg. 46) The warrant was issued in Granville County, and the survey and Granville Land Grant, were issued in Orange County, NC, which was finally granted five years later on May 12th, 1757. (See Fig. 15, Pg. 54)

When William Churton ran the survey in December of 1753, he started at the southeast corner of Thomas Bradford's property. Robert Berry's **small cabin** (See Pg. 46) was very close to that point in the northeast corner of his claim. This cabin site has not been located at this time, but we know about where it would be.

The instructions given to William Churton in the Warrant read: "Begin at red oak above a **little cabin**, Joining Thomas Bradford's line. Assemble lines on both sides of lick creek for temp Tennant". There is a lot of information connected to this document. The granting of land by a Granville Grant required several steps be followed. First there was the entry and then the Warrant. Then came the survey and the grant. The survey and the grant were located in the records of Orange County, North Carolina.

Many years went by before the Entry and the Warrant were found. This is because Orange County was split off from Granville County in the middle of Robert Berry's (OC) Lanf Grant procedure. My thanks go to Dane Berry, who was visiting North Carolina for the 2007 Fiddleton reunion. Dane and I were searching for records in The North Carolina Genealogy Library in Raleigh, NC. It was Dane who suggested that we look at the Granville County records. I had been searching for these records for many years and had overlooked the fact that Orange County was being formed at the same time Robert Berry (OC) was applying for his Land Grant. This is where we found the two missing records. Robert made his Entry in February 1751 and Orange County, NC, was formed in May of 1751. The Warrant was not issued until March 20th, 1753. (See Pg. 46). The actual survey was made 9 months later on December 3rd, 1753.




Figure 12: Robert Berry's Land Grant Survey in Orange County, N.C.

Cate was probably John Cate's brother. John Cate's survey was done the very next day on Dec.
4^{th;} 1753. You should note that Robert Berry (OC) was also called Robert Berry Jr. in the land survey document. This means that Robert Berry's (OC) father was named Robert Berry. Based

on the English naming patterns of that period, I always thought that Robert Berry's (OC) father would be named Robert and his mother would be named Mary. Locating Robert and Mary Williamson Berry with a son named Robert in Princess Anne County, Virginia, is very strong evidence that we had indeed found Robert Berry's (OC) parents. Further proof that we have located the right parents was the 1729 birth year of Robert Jr. in Princess Anne County, Virginia.

After Robert Berry (OC) married Elizabeth Cate and they named their first son Robert Berry Jr., two things happened: Robert Berry (OC) dropped the junior from his name and their first son was named for his paternal grandfather. This is also the reason it was necessary to devise a way to identify each of these three Roberts. Robert Berry (OC) should be for Orange County, Robert Berry (PAC) should be for the grandfather and Robert Berry Jr. should be Robert and Elizabeth Cate's baby son born about 1760 in North Carolina.

The name Robert Berry Jr. also appears in the Granville Land grant document, as further proof that Robert Berry's (OC) father's name was Robert Berry. (See: Fig. 15, Pg. 54),

It should be noted that William Churton signed the survey map. William Churton was the principal designer of the city of Hillsborough and chief surveyor for Lord John Carteret, Earl of Grandville. Henry Gould (Gold) was listed in the 1755 Orange County Tax List. (Pages 26) William Churton also listed in the 1755 Tax List. (Page 240)

It was a standard requirement that a homesteader must make an improvement on his land before making Entry for a grant. This improvement was usually a crude one-room cabin that would be used as the planter's first home. After the Land Grant was made, the planter had to pay quitrent, which was specified in the grant document. In Robert Berry's grant, he was obligated to make a quitrent payment in the spring and the fall. The number of acres granted to the pioneer, or planter as they were called, determined the size of the payment. This quitrent for Robert Berry's grant was set at three shillings for every hundred acres of land granted. This quitrent was to be paid yearly on the 25th day of March and the 29th day of September in equal portions. Robert Berry's yearly rent amounted to ten shillings, five pence. His quitrent was to be paid to John Earl Granville or his heirs.

In the 1790 Census, there were only four Robert Berrys in the entire 13 colonies. One Robert Berry was living in Orangeburg, South Carolina; one was living in Lincolnton County, North Carolina, and two were living in Orange County, NC. The two Robert Berrys who were living in Orange County were father and son, Robert Berry Senior and Robert Berry Junior. There was a 50% chance that any information about a Robert Berry living in America in 1790 was our Robert Berry or his son Robert Berry Jr.

Robert's Granville Grant Property Survey Description

"On both sides of lick creek beginning at a White Oak in Thomas Bradford line. Then running South 40 chains to a White Oak. Then West crossing Lick Creek 65 chains: to a Black Oak: Then North crossing a fork of lick creek 40 Chains on the said Bradford line to a Hickory: Then along the Bradford line crossing Lick Creek 65 chains: to the first station Containing two Hundred and Sixty Acres. This land was Surveyed 3rd day of December 1753." (**Fig: 12, Pg. 47**) If you read the description carefully you will notice that the only adjoining property that was already deeded at the time of this survey was only on the North boundary, which is land Thomas Bradford owned. It was normal for the description of property lines to name the adjoining property owners if there were any. From the 1755 tax list we find a group of people who came down from Princess Anne County, Va. They were listed on 2 adjoining pages in the list. (See: Pages 25, & 26,) Since this group of pioneers knew each other in Princess Anne County,

Virginia, it seems logical that they would locate close together in North Carolina. Since this 1755 Tax records support this, I think it strengthens my position that Robert Berry (OC) was born in Princess Anne County, Virginia, in 1729.

Even though Robert had no land owning neighbors in 1753 to his east, south, or west, his close neighbors may have been living on adjoining land that they were unable to own at the time.

Six years after Robert Berry (OC) was granted his Granville Land Grant, the first Earl of Granville, Lord John Carteret, ³⁶ died. Lord John Carteret died on January 22, 1763. The Granville Land Grant Office was then closed and no more grants were made until the State of North Carolina started making grants in 1780. This was done at that time to encourage enlistment in the North Carolina Continental Army. Because of this 17 year gap when no grants were made, we have no idea when the land west and south of Robert's land may have actually been homesteaded. During this period of 17 years, many of the eventual owners of land joining Robert Berry (OC) appeared with Robert on Jury duty and road building assignments.




Figure 13: Robert Berry and Neighbors property Orange Co., NC

In 1780, Robert Berry was granted 293 acres of land joining his own original grant on his east boundary. Patrick Rutherford and John Wilson were granted land on his South boundaries. (See Fig. 13, Pg. 50)

Thomas Rountree was appointed overseer of the road building in the 1777 November term of the Orange County Court. The men ordered to report to Thomas Rountree in the same session of court were: James Allison, William McKee, James Murdock, Moses Gwin, John Murdock, John Wilson, Archelias Wilson, William Wilson, William Robinson, William Armstrong, Robert Berry, Michael Robinson, and Daniel McMahan. Most of these men were also listed in the 1755 tax list, so they must have been living on land that was later granted to them. If this is the case, then Robert may have had more neighbors than first thought. Other important names on the 1755 Orange County NC Tax list:

John Cate and his 2 sons, & William Churton are listed on Page 240.

James Hopkins is listed on Page 247. William and John Hopkins are on Page 248.

Jacob Mosley and James Murray are seen on Page 245.

William Stutley Shurly listed on Page 248.

William Armstrong is found on Page 247.

Peter Martin is on Page: 246.

Peter Martin can also be found in Fayette County, Alabama. (See: Page 103.)

NOTE: William Martin can be found on page **99** with George Berry. There was a William Martin who got permission to bring slaves into North Carolina in 1751 on **page 28**.

Thomas Berry listed on **Page 25** in the 1755 tax list. Thomas Berry must have been an older man because he wrote his will in 1781. This will is very hard to read because it was faded and written in such small letters. Fortunately the names of his family members listed in his will are very clear. Thomas named his wife, Elizabeth Berry; his sons, James Berry, Thomas Berry, Benjamin Berry, William Berry deceased; his daughters, Nancy Berry, Margaret Berry Mason; his son-in-law John Mason; a grandson, William Berry; and a granddaughter, Luna Berry. Witnesses to his will were John Mason and William A. Nash

The Thomas Berrey family just seem to evaporate from Orange County after this will was probated. David Edgar Berry and others thought that Thomas Berrey was Robert Berry's (OC) father. I have never been able to connect the two men in any way. He may have been an older uncle or cousin but the family must have moved somewhere shortly after Thomas died.

On the map in fig 14, the corners of the original Granville Land Grant are marked with white arrows. The arrow with the C in it marks the chimney. This landmark is all that remains of the Fiddleton Plantation Home which was built in 1766. The white balloon with the square is the location of the original family cabin. The balloon with star marks the site of the Robert Berry Fiddleton family cemetery where 23 of our ancestors are buried. The tract of land with the white star was granted to Robert Berry (OC) in 1780. Robert sold most of this tract to William Armstrong on October 14th, 1800. (Deed bk13 Pg.330) The unmarked tract on this map was granted by North Carolina to the Wilson Brothers in 1780.

The State of North Carolina required an oath of allegiance when an application was made for the North Carolina Grants in 1779. Much of the land granted in 1780 had been confiscated from the Tories. This would have been considered treason only a few years earlier but North Carolina was no longer an English Colony after 1776.

The settlers who migrated into the central piedmont from Maryland came through the

Shenandoah Valley of Virginia. They were largely of Scottish descent. Many of these settlers lived very close to Fiddleton. They were friends and neighbors of Robert Berry's (OC) family. Neither Robert Berry (OC) nor his children were members of Little River Presbyterian Church. This religion was brought to America by the Scots and the Scot-Irish. The Presbyterian followers were very devout in their belief and attended their churches. This fact alone leads me to believe that Robert Berry (OC) was not from Scotland, but I think he was English.

Robert and Elizabeth raised ten children to adulthood and he and his wife lived very full and long lives. They were both born around 1730 and Robert died in 1814. Elizabeth must have died around 1816.

As you will see as you read through this book, many of their wives' relatives migrated with our Berry ancestors as they consistently removed to the West. <u>Victor Glenn Berry</u> did an excellent job in his book "Wagons South Wagons West" identifying and tracking descendants of Robert Berry Junior. Most of Glenn's book dealt with William Clarence Berry, who migrated from North Carolina to Alabama and later to Texas. Victor was a descendant of William Clarence Berry.

Victor Glenn Berry had also connected his Fayette County, Alabama, Berry family to Robert Berry (OC) but he had errors in the Orange County Information. Victor Glenn also refers to David Edgar Berry's research connecting our Berry family to Scotland. I am truly sorry that I never met Victor Glen Berry before he died. We could have shared information and his Orange County Information would have been more reliable. I highly recommend his book if you can find one. I have a copy and will use much of the Alabama & Texas Berry family information from it.

I have met a good number of Robert Berry (OC) descendants over the Internet and in person. Many of them have developed family trees and researched their own branch of the Robert Berry (OC) family. Our cousins were at different stages of their research when we first met. By combining our information, we were able to fill many gaps, which continued to improve the reliability of our data. Once Y-DNA testing began in our family, we were able to verify our own family connections without checking every family in America who had a Robert, John, William, Thomas, Henry, Isaac, Joshua, or David Berry in their tree. Almost every Berry family in America used these same given names. This had made genealogy research of the Berry family very difficult before the Berry Y-DNA project was started. Before we started testing DNA, all of us thought that we would eventually trace our families to one Berry. This is far from true, as you will see in the Y-DNA chapter of this book..

We have found that by studying families who lived in close proximity to each other, we could locate parents, cousins, in-laws, children, nieces, nephews, aunts and uncles. This was very true as the first three or four generations of pioneers settled in America. We were able to locate such family groups in Princess Anne County, Virginia; Orange and Person Counties, North Carolina; Fayette County, Cobb County, and Henry County in Georgia; Fayette County, Alabama; Wayne County, Tennessee; Rusk and Burnett Counties in Texas. By the time the fifth generation of a family were pioneering ever westward, the groups of family members became smaller, because some of the older family members had become well established where they were living. It was usually the younger members of the family that pursued new land opportunities. The migrating parties often included a lot of families who were not related to our Berry family.

I created a Web Page, www.berrytree.org, to share our Robert Berry family with descendants and the interested public. I am cognizant that the Web Page will not last forever, so this is my reason for writing this book.

This Indenture, Made the **Twelfth** Day of May in the Year of our Lord, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Fifty Seven BETWEEN the Right Honorable John Earl Granville. Viscount Carteret, and Baron Carteret, of Hawns, in the county of Bedford, in the Kingdom of Great-Britain, Lord President of His Majesty's most Honorable Privy Council, and Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, of the one Part, and Robert Berry Junior of Orange County in the Province of North Carolina Planter of the other Part. WHEREAS, His most Excellent Majesty King George the Second, in and by a certain indenture, bearing Date the Seventeenth Day of September, in the Eighteenth Year of his Reign, and in the Year of our Lord 1744, and made between his most *Excellent* Majesty, of the One Part, and the said John Earl Granville, (by the Name, Stile and Title of the Right Honorable John Earl Carteret,) of the other Part: DID, for the Considerations therein mentioned, Give and Grant, Release, Ratify and Confirm, unto the Said Earl, (by the Name, Stile and Title of the Right Honorable John Earl Carteret, as aforesaid,) and his Heirs Assigns forever, a certain District, Territory, or Parcel of Land, in *North-Carolina*, in *America*: and all the Sounds, Creeks, Havens, Ports, Rivers, Streams, and other Royalties, Franchises. Privileges and Immunities within the same, as they are therein set out or described, allotted, and granted, and confirmed, to the said **John** Earl **Granville**, as aforesaid for One Eighth Part of the Charters granted by King Charles II, in the Fifteenth and Seventeenth Years of his Reign, to Eight Lords Proprietors of Carolina, as by said Indenture, duly enrolled in the High Court of Chancery in *Great-Britain*, and in the Secretary's Office in North-Carolina, Reference being thereto had, will more fully appear. NOW THIS INDENTURE WITNESSETH, That, as well for, and in Consideration of the Sum of Ten Schillings Sterling Money, to the said John Earl Granville, in Hand paid by the said Robert Berry at or before the Sealing and Delivery of these said Presents, the Receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, and also for and in Consideration of the Rents, Covenants, Exceptions, Provisos, and Agreements herein after mentioned, reserved and contained, and by, and on the Part and Behalf of said Robert Berry junior his Assigns, to be paid, kept and performed, he the said Earl HATH Given, Granted, Bargained. Sold and Confirmed, and by these Presents, DOTH, from himself, and his Heirs Give, Grant, Bargain, Sell and Confirm, unto the said Robert Berry junior his

Heirs and Assigns forever, all that Tract or Parcel of Land, situate, lying and being in the Parish of St, Mathews in the County of Orange in the said Province On both sides of Lick Creek Beginning at a White Oak: in Thomas Bradford's line. Then running South 40 cha: to a White Oak: Then West crossing Lick Creek 65 chn: to a Black Oak: Then North Crossing a fork of Lick Creek 40 chains on the said Bradford line to a Hickory: Then along Bradford line Crossing Lick Creek 65 Cha: to the first station. Containing in the Whole Two hundred Sixty Acres: All which said Premises are more particularly described and set forth in Plan or Map thereof, hereunto annexed together with

Yearly, and every Year, unto the said **John** Earl **Granville**, his Heirs and or Assigns, the Yearly rent of Ten Schillings and Five Pence which is at the Rate of Three Schillings Sterling, for every Hundred Acres, and so in Proportion for the less Quantity, at or upon the Twentyfifth Day of March, and Twenty-ninth Day of September, in every Year, by even or Equal Portions; and to be paid at the Court-House for the said County of **Orange** _ _ _ unto the said Earl, his Heirs or Assigns, or to his or their lawful Attorney, or Deputy Receiver for the Time being the first Payment thereof to be made on such of the aforementioned Day of Payment as shall first happen after the Date hereof and the said **Robert Berry Jun**. For himself his Heirs and Assigns, and for either and every of them Both Covenant, Promise, and Agree, to and with, the said Earl, his Heirs and Assigns, and to and with either and every of them, by these Presents, in a Manner and Form following: That is to sav. That Robert Berry his Heirs or Assigns, shall and the Time being, on the Days, and at the Place aforesaid: the said Yearly Rent or Sum of **Ten Schillings and Five Pence** by half Yearly Payments, as aforesaid: Provided always, and Present Grant is hereby expressly Declared and Agreed by and between the said Parties, to be nevertheless UPON THIS CONDITION, vis. That if it shall happen that this said Yearly Rent of **Ten Schillings** or any part thereof, shall at any Time hereafter, be behind or unpaid for the space of Six Months, next over or after any or either of the aforementioned Days of Payment (and no sufficient Distressed can be found on the Premissis, to levy such Rent and Arrears, with the full Costs, Charges, and Expenses in making the same) That then, this present Grant, and Assignments thereof, shall be utterly void, and of none Effect: and it shall be lawful for he said Earl, his Heirs and Assigns, to re-enter into the said Lands, and to re-grant the same, to any other Person of Persons whomsoever, as if the Grant and such Assignment thereof, had never been made. IN WITNESS whereof, the Parties abovenamed, have hereunto set their Hands and Seals, the Day and Year first above-written.

FIDDLETON

Robert Berry (OC) is believed to have named his Granville Land Grant plantation Fiddleton. There are two sources of information where the name Fiddleton is used when referring to this property.

There was a "MAP OF ORANGE COUNTY N.C." which was drawn in 1891 ³⁹ by George W. Tate that placed the name Fiddlenton on the west end of Robert Berry's (OC) Granville land grant property. (See Page 211)

Robert Berry's (OC) grandson, Thomas Person Berry, owned this property when he died, intestate. There was a big court case about the property. His third wife, Elizabeth Peed Bowles, said in a deposition that the "Fiddleton plantation had a large number of fruit trees which were on the land of her widow's dower." Part of the original Granville Land Grant is still owned by some of Robert Berry's (OC) 4th great- grandchildren.

Robert Berry built this house in 1766 near the southern property line of his Granville Land Grant. At the time he built this home, he and Elizabeth probably had five children: Mary Berry, Robert Berry Jr., John Berry, Joshua Berry, and Isaac Berry. Their other five children were probably born in this home. These pictures were taken before 2007 and they are the only known pictures of the plantation house before it was destroyed. The house was donated to the Chapel Hill Fire Department to be burned in a training exercise. The present owner of the property took these pictures just before it was burned to the ground. The chimney is still standing at the original location.

I wish I had known about this house while it was still standing. I have been by it many times in my lifetime but nobody in the family ever talked about who built this house. I am not sure anybody in the family even knew this information. Some boards were taken from this house by the present owner's brother and were used in his home in Greensborough North Carolina. I have never met him or seen the wood. This grand old plantation house was the home for 12 of our Berry ancestors and the activity there must have been equivalent to a small factory. Food had to be available for three meals each day for family members and the 10 slaves. The slaves most likely prepared their own meals in their cabins. This still amounted to about thirty six meals a day to be cooked for the family in this fireplace. Most likely Robert and the older boys had to hunt for wild meat three or four times a week. The younger children would pick wild fruit, berries, and nuts in season. In addition to all this work, cows had to be milked and butter churned. Water and wood also had to be transported from the well and the woods for the kitchen. Many other chores had to be completed every day. This was a very hard life but also a very healthy one.

These are the children who warmed their hands, their feet, and backs by this fireplace. By knowing when Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry's last child Henry was born, we can get a fairly good idea of when their first children were born. Henry Berry was born in 1776⁴⁰. By working backward and allowing two years between the births of each child, here are the results:

NOTE: I may have Isaac and Elizabeth reversed in this list but I think the rest are listed in the order of their births. This would be a total of 18 years from the time Mary Berry was born until Henry Berry was born. If Elizabeth Cate Berry was born in 1733, she would have been 25 years old when Mary Berry was born and 43 years old when Henry Berry was born. These birth years seem very reasonable. The first child, who was Mary Berry, would have been born in 1758. Robert Berry (OC) got his Granville land Grant issued on May 12^{th,} 1757. This would have been a logical time for him to get married and start a family. I have no information indicating that any of the children were twins. We know that Robert Berry (OC) was a single man in 1755. (See Page: 26) I tested this method on my father's family of 14 children and it proved out very well.

The 1800 census was the first year that any attempt was made to identify family members. They listed the number of individuals in one of several age brackets. Robert listed one male between 16 and 25 years old. This would be Henry Berry, because he was born in 1776. Isaac Berry was visiting somewhere else when the 1800 census was taken. Robert listed himself in the over 45 age bracket. Robert was probably 71 years old at the time. On the female side of the census form he listed one female between the ages of 10 to 15. This would have been his granddaughter, Mary Berry, who was 8 years old at that time. Also listed were Elizabeth Berry, age 32, his daughter, and Robert's wife, Elizabeth Cate Berry, age 67, in their age brackets.

In the 1810 Orange County Census, Robert Berry (OC) listed two females. His daughter Elizabeth was listed in the 26 to 45 bracket. By the chart on page 51, she would have been 42 years old. Robert (OC) listed his wife, Elizabeth Cate Berry, as over 45. Her age would have been 77 years old. Robert (OC) listed himself in the over 45 bracket and he would have been about 81 years old. He listed Henry and Isaac in the over 26 and less than 45 bracket. Henry would have been 34 years old and Isaac would have been 44 years old based on my chart.

The ages for all of Robert and Elizabeth's children may vary slightly from the chart above but not by much.

Elizabeth Cate Berry would have been 81 years old when her husband, Robert Berry Sr. (OC), died in 1814. Considering how many women died at childbirth in those days, Elizabeth Cate Berry must have been a very strong and healthy woman to raise 10 children to adulthood and live to the age she did. Many of the women who died at child birth were usually less than 50 years old. My fourth great-grandmother on the Wilson side of my family also raised 10 children to be adults. She lived to be about 90 years old. My Wilson family was also in Orange County in the mid 1700's. The Wilson Family did belong to the Little River Presbyterian Church and many of them are buried there. The Wilson surname is in Clan Gunn from Scotland. It is very true that many of the people who settled in Orange County, North Carolina, were originally from Scotland but I have never found anything to suggest that our Robert Berry (OC) is Scottish. All of my research strongly suggests that he was of English heritage.

In 2005, three of Robert Berry's (OC) descendants explored an area of land that we thought was part of the original Granville Land Grant. Dane Berry, his wife, Bernard Berry, and I located a foundation, rectangular in shape that measured about 25 by 30 feet. We had information that lead us to believe there was a cemetery located in this area. We had not discovered the Fiddleton cemetery that was only about three hundred yards away from the cabin Robert had built for his wife and young family about 1757. We also had not discovered the chimney from his 1766 Plantation home which was no more the three or four hundred yards away to the south. View figures 15 & 16 for the remains of the first family cabin.

Robert and Elizabeth's First Cabin Location

Before Robert Berry built the new plantation house in 1766, he and his family were most likely living in a cabin that he built around 1758..




Figure 19: Rocks from foundation




Figure 20: Pile of rocks from the fallen chimney of first Robert Berry family cabin. GPS reading for this site: 36,13'39" N 79, 01'09"W

You can see a few of the rocks used for pillars that were originally arranged in three rows. (Fig. 19, Pg. 59)

In **Fig. 20**, **Pg. 59**, there is a pile of rocks that we think is the remains of a chimney. This was most likely Robert's second home. Robert Berry most likely built this larger cabin about the time he and Elizabeth Cate were married.

GPS reading for this site

36, 13'39 " N 79, 01'09"W

At the time Dane Berry located this cabin foundation remains, there were three rows of rocks and all three rows were parallel. It appeared to be one row on each outside wall and one row in the center of the building. The site appeared to be about 25 feet wide and 30 feet long. The Chimney appeared to be built on the west wall of this cabin. The foundation rocks seemed to be on a north- south orientation.

This would have been a rather large cabin that would have provided approximately 750 sq feet of living space. Most likely Robert, Elizabeth and their five children lived here between 1759 and 1766. This is probably where Mary, Robert Jr., John, Joshua, and Isaac Berry were born. Lick Creek was about 200 feet due west of this cabin location and would have been a source of very clean water. There seemed to be the remains of a very old trail on the south side of the cabin location. This trail was running east and west and most likely led from Robert's cabin to his west property line where a major road from Hillsborough to Roxboro in Person County is currently located. Highway 157 has been moved about 50 feet north of the original roadbed. Very likely Robert Berry (OC) and the road building crews built this road in the 1770's. This cabin was located very close to the center of the original Granville Land Grant property.

I can only assume that Robert and Elizabeth Berry had many happy memories with their five young children working and playing in this lovely environment. There had to be a lot of wild animals around. I suspect that wild animal meat was abundant and provided an important source of food for the growing Berry family.

I doubt if Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry ever lived in the small cabin that Robert built in the northwest corner of Fiddleton that was mentioned in the Warrant on page 40. I think this cabin was being built very shortly before or after Mary Berry was born. I think all five of the first children were born right here. This would include Mary Berry, Robert Berry Jr., John Berry, Joshua Berry, and Isaac Berry. The other five children were born after 1766 in the new Fiddleton Plantation home.

Robert Berry's Revolutionary War Pay Vouchers

Here is a copy of Robert Berry's pay voucher that identified him as a private in the Continental Line of North Carolina. He was paid fifty three Pounds, eight Schillings with interest to be paid in May of 1792.

Voucher Number 344 on page 61 was issued for 23 Pounds 9 Schillings 6 Pence specie being one fourth of the Account of his pay to Robert Berry, a private of the Continental Line of North Carolina.




Figure 23: Voucher # 53

Robert Berry appeared before the Hillsborough Auditors Office on the 7th day of August, 1782, and presented a claim that was allowed for nine pounds four shillings specie.

Three battles were fought in Orange County, North Carolina, during the revolutionary war. Below is a list of these battles: ⁴¹

February 17, 1781- Harts Mill between Hillsborough and Efland

September 12, 1781- Kirks Farm

September 21, 1781- Hillsborough

Because of his service in the Revolutionary War, all of Robert Berry's (OC) descendants are eligible to join the SAR or the DAR. Both male and female descendants of Robert Berry (OC) have already been accepted in each of these organizations.

After the war was over, the state of North Carolina confiscated land that had been owned by the loyal Tories and granted it to the patriots who had fought for the American Revolution. Robert Berry was granted 293 acres of land by the State of North Carolina on March 13, 1780. The North Carolina state land office opened January 29, 1778, and Robert Berry made entry for this grant on December 4th, 1778. There were many entries made by Robert Berry's friends and neighbors during the twenty-six months that the North Carolina land Office was open.

Robert Berry Court Records in Orange County

Minutes and Abstracts

"The Collet Map⁴² of 1770 stands as the first reasonably accurate record of the permanent geographical features of Burke County. The map, prepared by Capt. John Abraham Collet, a native of Switzerland who served in the British army at Fort Johnston on the Cape Fear River, was based primarily on information gathered by William Churton of Edenton, Churton, who had served as surveyor of the Granville District, died in 1767, the year Collet arrived in America. Gov. William Tryon turned Churton's map material over to Collet, who completed the work." William Churton was the Granville Land Officer for Lord John Carteret.

Robert Berry (OC) won a case against Richard Gibbs in 1757.

September 1758 Orange County, N.C., Court Minutes: A deed of sale from the Earl of GRANVILLE to **Robert BERRY** for 260 Acres of land was proved in open court by the oath of William CHURTON and was ordered to be registered.

John Carteret, the first Earl of Granville, died in 1763. His land office was promptly closed, never to reopen. He died in his house in Arlington Street, London, on 22 January, 1763.

There was a second earl of Granville, but there was no land granted between 1763 and 1778. Many of the battles of the Revolutionary war were being fought during these years. The North Carolina state land office opened January 29, 1778, and closed March 30, 1780.

Robert Berry was excused from jury duty on May term [1777] 115 folio 57 bk3 pg59. He may have been serving in the North Carolina Continental Army at that time.

November term 1777 Orange N.C. Court Minutes:

Issd. Ordered That The Following Persons Work On The Road Under Thomas Rountree To Wit: James Allison, William Mckee, James Murdock, Moses Gwin, John Murdock Sen, John Wilson, Archd Wilson, William Wilson, William Robinson, William Armstrong, Robert Berry, Michl, Robinson, & Danl. Mcmahan. This is the first notice that I have found where the local residents were decreed by court to build roads in the county. I think each of these men was granted land on March 13, 1780. Very likely the state authorities recognized the need for roads as the American Revolution was being waged in the colonies. They may also have stipulated this roadwork as a prerequisite to entering a request for the grant. These state authorities may have been anticipating the coming actions in North Carolina based on the increased activity of the English armies in Georgia and South Carolina.

The last Will & Testament of George Waggoner Dec'd was duly prov'd in open Court by the oath of George Clower a subscribing Witness thereto & ordered to be Recorded at the same time **Mary Waggoner & Robert Berry** Qualified as Executor & Executrix to the same. Ordered that letters Testamentary issue to them accordingly.

Mary Berry Waggoner was married to George Waggoner. George Waggoner wrote his will on April 2^{nd,} 1781, which was only 18 days after the battle of Guilford Courthouse in the Revolutionary War. Due to the fact that Mary and Robert probated George Waggoner's will in the Orange County November, 1781, term court, it is very likely he died from wounds suffered in that battle. The delay in filing the will may have been caused by Robert serving in the North Carolina Continental Army. General Green led General Cornwallis to the Dan River and after Green got his army across the river, taking all available boats with him, the river was flooded by spring rains and the British General could not get across to pursue General Green's army. I have every reason to believe that Robert Berry was serving in that army at that time. All of this activity was taking place within a distance of about 40 miles as the crow flies from Robert

Berry's Fiddleton Plantation. Elizabeth Berry had probably driven all their animals into the woods, and she and the children may have been hiding out there as well.

It was during the span of time between November, 1781, term of court when **Mary Waggoner** was named Executrix, and before the February, 1782, session **Mary Berry Waggoner** married James Kemp and signed the George Waggoner inventory as **Mary Kemp**. George named two young daughters in his will. It is unknown if Mary Berry Waggoner is their mother or not.

Most of the records listed above belong to Robert Berry (OC). Robert Berry (OC) discontinued using the Jr. with his name after his son Robert Berry Jr. became of legal age. The young Robert Berry Jr. posted bond for the James Waggoner estate.

Robert Berry Jr. was the bondsman for Aldridge, Peter & Judith Waggoner 4 Feb., 1786. Robert Berry Junior's son, George Berry, many years later married Susanna Aldridge, Peter Aldridge and Judith Waggoner's daughter, in 1814. Robert Berry Jr. and his family were living in Person County when the 1810 Census was taken.

1790 Orange County Census listed 4 Berry men:

Robert Berry, Robert Berry Jr., Joshua Berry, John Berry.

Robert was involved in many civic activities. He served on the jury in March 1759, November 1777, February 1778, and November 1791. Robert was excused from jury duty on May 1791. I do not know the reason for this.

Robert had deeds entered in the court records on May 12, 1757, September 1758, and November 1791

Robert was a chain carrier on July 15, 1760, November 26, 1762, and March 13, 1780. Robert was involved in law suits in December 1756, September 1758 and May 1791.

Robert Berry was appointed overseer of road in May 1784 and August 1789. He was appointed to a road building crew on August 17, 1786.

Total acreage acquired by Robert Berry (OC) from 1787 until 1800 was 1000.5 acres. Robert began to sell off his property in 1800. Most of his children were married and moving away from home. He had three children who were deceased. He was getting older and probably used some of the money to buy some younger slaves. This would allow him to keep the plantation running. When Robert died, he still owned 600.5 acres of land and 13 slaves.

Robert Berry's 1812 Will, Transcribed

Written April 16, 1812¹

In the name of God Amen. I Robert Berry being of perfect mind and memory calling to mind. That all men are born once to die, do make and appoint this my last will and testament: First will my soul to the Almighty God who gave it me and my body to the grave to be buried in a decent Christian burial at the discretion of my executers, Secondly I will and bequeath to my loving wife Elizabeth four of my negroes the names of which is old Jack and Rose, Frompey and Sall, also my possessions of land her lifetime, I will and bequeath to my Daughter Elizabeth Berry one of my Negroes named Doll, also two cows and calves her lifetime and then for them and their increase to be property of her daughter Mary. I will and bequeath to my son Robert Berry one negroe boy named Solomon, I will and bequeath to my son Joshua Berry one boy named Aaron, I will and bequeath to my son Thomas Berry Deace'd, children one Negro girl named Mariah; I will and bequeath to my son Isaac Berry one negroe woman named Lydia also one horse to the value of thirty dollars and two cows and calves. This my son Isaac Berry's legacy to be left in the care of my son Henry Berry so as for the aforesaid Isaac to have the benefit of it but not so he can sell or dispose of it without Henrys Approbation also this my son Isaac Berry's legacy at his death be divided among my heirs equally provided he has no heirs born after this will is wrote also This my son Isaac Berry legacy to be given to him for to be at his disposal if he comes to his proper reason, if he does not come to hid right reason to be left as above mentioned, I will and bequeath to my son David Berry one negroe girl named Tamer; I will and bequeath to m son William Berry one pound. I will and bequeath to my son Henry Berry two Negroes named young Jack and Nicy and two cows and calves also my possessions of land at his mother's death provided he gives to my son Isaac Berry one hundred dollars fifty to be paid one year after his mother's death and the other fifty in two years after his mother's death. I will and bequeath as much of my property shall be sold as will discharge all lawful debts, and all such to be discharged. I will and bequeath to my daughter Mary Kemp Deces'd heirs one pound. I will and bequeath to my son John Berry Deceas'd heirs one negro girl named Luinda. The remainder of my property I will to my wife Elizabeth to be at her own disposal. I disannul and disavow all other will or wills; I do constitute and appoint my wife and my son Henry Berry my executors to execute this said will. Signed, sealed and perfected the year one Thousand eight hundred and twelve April the 16th day in the presents

When Robert wrote this will he named his wife, all 10 of his children, and one granddaughter, Mary, by name. All 13 of his slaves were also identified by name in his will.

Children: Mary Berry Kemp/Camp, Robert Berry Jr., John Berry, Joshua Berry, Isaac Berry, Elizabeth Berry, Thomas Berry, David Berry, William Berry, and Henry Berry.

Slaves: Old Jack and Rose, Frompey, and Sall, Doll, Solomon, Aaron, Mariah, Lydia, Tamer, Young Jack, Nicy, and Luinda. There were 8 female and 5 male slaves.

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A Study of Robert Berry's Personal Character

As you can tell from the public records listed above, Robert Berry (OC) was a responsible member of the community. I think he also had a great love for his family.

Robert continued to prosper from the time he entered Granville County in 1751 until he died in 1814. He started with a 260 acre Granville land grant in 1757 and owned 1000 acres of land by the year 1800. He raised 10 children to be adults and he owned 13 slaves at the time he wrote his will.

The character of the man really stood out when he wrote his will on April 15, 1812. He went into very lengthy detail to see that the less capable members of his family would be cared for after his death. He made sure that his daughter Elizabeth inherited property, even though she had given birth to a bastard child. Mary Berry, his granddaughter, was the daughter of William Riley and Elizabeth Berry. There was a bastardy bond issued on William Riley in 1792. Robert Berry (OC) also stipulated that Elizabeth's inherited property be passed to his granddaughter Mary upon Elizabeth's death. Elizabeth Berry and her daughter, Mary, also lived with her parents until Mary got married in 1809. At that time Mary Berry, her husband Thomas Berry, and her mother Elizabeth removed to Person County, North Carolina. They were there when the 1810 Person County Census was taken. Robert Berry Jr. was living next door.

Robert Sr. also went to very great lengths to see that his son Isaac, (who was apparently mentally retarded), was well provided for after his death. Isaac was placed under the care of Robert Berry's (OC) youngest son, Henry Berry. Robert very clearly explained in his will what conditions were to be observed in the management of Isaac's inheritance

Robert Berry (OC) served as a private in the North Carolina Continental Army in the American Revolution. He must have decided to take sides with the revolting citizens and not remain loyal to the British government.

The Regulator Movement and the Battle of Alamance may have made that decision for him. This was when Governor Tryon sent troops to the area to put down the Regulator Movement. Some historians believe this was the very first battle of the Revolutionary War. Governor Tryon had been approached several times about the unfair tax collection practices in Orange and other surrounding Counties. The Governor agreed to have a fairer tax collection implemented but nothing ever changed. The longer the situation continued, the angrier the local citizens became.

Robert Berry may have waited until General Cornwallis was approaching Orange County in the spring of 1781 before he decided what he had to do. We have no way of knowing when the decision was made, but Robert Berry (OC) did make the right one.

It is almost certain that Robert Berry (OC) was involved in the Battle of Guilford Courthouse on March 15, 1781. Robert Berry's son-in-law, George Wagoner, suffered mortal wounds in this battle that led to his death a short time later. George Wagoner's will was written on April 2nd, 1781, and probated in August, 1781. Robert Berry and his daughter, Mary Berry Waggoner, were executor and executrix of that will.

Mary Berry Waggoner was married to James Kemp / Camp before February, 1782, when she signed George Waggoner's property settlement. This is known because she signed the property statement as Mary Kemp.

Conditions under which Robert Berry and his neighbors lived from 1751 until 1776 required that they be very self-reliant and independent. As long as quit rents and taxes were paid, they could live their lives much as they wanted to. Dealing with the natural surroundings and

their growing families were probably the most challenging problems in their lives. Robert Berry apparently managed his plantation very well, because he became very prosperous over time. Wild food and other resources were abundant, so most everything he needed to survive was there from the beginning. Making a decision on which side to support in the Revolutionary War, considering the freedom he had experienced, may not have been a very hard choice at all. Robert Berry had been living in North Carolina for at least twenty-five years when the Declaration of Independence was signed in 1776. He can truly be classified as an original pioneer. Robert Berry may not have been completely aware of how great freedom was and how much it would reward him until he had experienced it firsthand. He essentially declared his personal independence as a free man long before 1776.

It is not entirely clear when Robert Berry's neighbors staked out their claims. Lord John Carteret Earl of Granville died in 1761 and the Granville grant office closed. There were no more grants issued in North Carolina until 1780.

I know that Patrick Rutherford was listed in the 1755 Orange County Tax list.
In November, 1777, Thomas Rountree was in charge of roads. John Wilson, Archilias Wilson, William Wilson, Robert Berry, William Robinson, Michael Robinson, and William Armstrong were to work under him.

Many of Robert Berry's neighbors came to America from Scotland. There have been researchers who have tried to say that Robert Berry was from Scotland also.

There was a Presbyterian Church formed very early in the Little River community just North of Hillsborough. The Little River Presbyterian Church was organized in 1761. The Presbyterian movement in America is definitely an institution of the early Scot-Irish settlers. Today, Little River Presbyterian Church has a very large cemetery, but Robert Berry was buried in his own private cemetery in 1814. There are only 4 Berry Graves in the Little River Cemetery and the earliest Berry grave was of James Berry, Company D, 56th Infantry, C.S.A. Little River Presbyterian Church is only seven miles south of Robert Berry's Granville Land Grant property. Very likely Robert Berry was not affiliated with any Church during his lifetime. His descendants who remained in North Carolina were mostly Southern Baptist and Methodist, and many of them were very active in their faiths.

Many of Robert Berry's Scot-Irish neighbors are buried in the Little River Presbyterian Church Cemetery. There is no record of Robert Berry or any of his children ever belonging to this church. These two facts are added reasons for me to believe that Robert's ancestors came from England. I feel certain, if Robert Berry had come from Scotland, he would have been a member of the Little River Presbyterian Church and he would have been buried there. I have ancestors on the Wilson side of my family who are buried there.

On **Fig. 15**, **Pg. 54**, Robert Berry's family cemetery is marked with a balloon and a star in the center. These cemetery pictures were taken in January, 2007. There are 23 graves located in this Robert Berry Family Cemetery. Six of these graves are marked with gravestones identifying who is buried there. The rest are fieldstones without any identifying markings. Robert Berry was probably the first of our relatives to be buried in this cemetery. Elizabeth Cate Berry may be the second grave located here.

Susan A. Crabtree is the daughter of Thomas and Mary (Polly) King. Susan was born on June 4th, 1848, and died on March 28th, 1921.

Mary King is the wife of Thomas King. They are the couple who inherited the Plantation home that Henry Berry was living in when he died in 1855. Mary was raised by the name Mary Ashley but, as it turns out, she was Henry Berry and Fanny Ashley's daughter. There had always been a question in my mind about this inheritance because it did not seem reasonable to will the home outside the family. (See support information in Chapter 12, pages 197-207)

Mary Ashley was really Mary Berry, daughter of Henry Berry and Fanny Ashley. This information was a secret until Susan A King Crabtree died in 1920. On her death certificate, her mother was listed as Mary Berry.

This was the most perfect unmarked stone in the cemetery, as you can see by the other fieldstone markers on this page. **This was most likely the headstone for Robert Berry (OC)**. The reason I think this is because Elizabeth would have wanted an appropriate stone for her husband and would have been able to have her slaves make one. This was the only old stone that seemed to be shaped and crafted by hand to this quality. It is almost certain that Elizabeth Cate Berry was buried beside her husband about two years later in 1814. The next member of the family to be buried here may have been Isaac Berry.

Sallie Lunsford was Thomas Person Berry's first wife. They are my great-great-grandparents. Sallie/Sarah Lunsford Berry was born July 25th, 1811, and died on December 27th, 1870. Sarah and Thomas had four sons. (See page 208) Sarah was 59 years old when she died.

Lucy Brown was Thomas Person Berry's second wife. There was an error made on Lucy Brown Berry's headstone. The headstone was placed on Lucy Brown Berry's grave many years after she died. It was probably placed there by her children. Lucy and Thomas had a son, Daniel, who was born December 23rd, 1880, and Lucy died on January 8th, 1881. Edna H. Berry, the oldest daughter of Thomas and Lucy, was only 9 years old when Lucy died. I have every reason to believe that the young children of Thomas P. Berry thought his middle name was **Passon**. All records in the North Carolina Genealogy Library refer to him as Thomas **Person** Berry. I read somewhere that General Thomas Person had the same problem with the pronunciation of his name. I think that Person sounded like *Passon* because of a *strong colloquial southern accent*. Thomas placed the headstone of his first wife, Sarah Lunsford Berry, with the inscription "wife of Thomas P. Berry". If Thomas had placed the headstone for his second wife, the inscription on Lucy's headstone would have read "Second wife of Thomas P. Berry". Thomas was sick at the time his second wife died, and I am sure he did not feel up to placing a headstone at his second wife's grave.

When Lucy died on January 8th, 1881, Thomas was left with a new son who was only 16 days old. He also had four young daughters ranging from 4 to 9 years old. Thomas Person Berry's third marriage to Elizabeth Peed Bowles was a marriage of convenience. He needed a wife to care for his 5 young children. Thomas was apparently in declining health at the time of, or shortly after, Lucy's death. Thomas Person Berry died only 38 months after Lucy Brown Berry died. There are no headstones for Thomas Person Berry or his third wife located in the Fiddleton Cemetery. They are both probably buried there.

Era's Ending & New Beginnings

As Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry were approaching the end of their lives, their children's families were growing in numbers, creating the need for their own new land & farms. Land was becoming scarce and expensive at home. Grants were being made in other states for service in the wars and new opportunities to own large amounts of virgin land were becoming available in the South and West.

Wagons South Wagons West is a book written by Victor Glenn Berry.⁴³ I think Glenn named the book very appropriately. Although the book was primarily written about only one of Robert Berry Junior's sons and his family, it aptly describes what so many of our ancestors were facing at that time.

Robert & Elizabeth Cate Berry's children started migrating to the south as early as 1782, when Mary Berry married James Camp and relocated in Rutherford County, North Carolina. John Berry may have departed Orange County shortly after he married Martha Stepp on December 16th, 1793 (more about this in Chapter 5). All of the rest of their children remained in Orange County until about 1808, when two of the boys decided that they needed to explore the possibility of acquiring land in the West, as it was called in those days. This meant South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, and Tennessee.

Young men from many other families in Orange County, and other North Carolina Counties, were compelled to move south and west to locate new homesteads. One reason is because they did not inherit land from their fathers. Most young men would live at home until their father died, and after only one of the sons inherited their father's plantation, the rest of the children had to seek their own land elsewhere. It does seem logical that the youngest son in the family should inherit the homestead. This is a way to keep your property in the family as long as possible. This happened in our Robert Berry (OC) family. We do not know if Robert advised Thomas and William to seek new land in 1808. Was it visionary, did they anticipate who their father would will the plantation to, or was it just their Pioneer spirit? It may well have been that Robert Berry's service in the Revolutionary War qualified his sons to be eligible for land grants in Tennessee. We also know that one of Joshua Berry's sons (James Berry See Page 137) was able to acquire land in Tennessee around 1825. We also know that Robert Berry wrote his will on April 16th, 1812, and by then Thomas Berry was already deceased.

There were always good reasons to migrate to the west and it had been going on since settlers first set foot on American soil. Seeking available land was high on the list of desirable things to do. The federal government was making treaties with the Indian Tribes in Tennessee, Alabama, and Georgia. The government was running land lotteries and granting land for homesteading. Many second and third generation young men were leaving the communities where they grew up to stake claims for this new land. Often they would band together and travel on horseback for security and convenience as they journeyed into the undeveloped western wilderness.

Henry Berry, the youngest of Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry's children, was born in 1776, the year of the Declaration of Independence. Henry was the only child to be born in the new nation. All of their other children were born in North Carolina while it was still under English rule. Much of this time Orange County, North Carolina, was considered the Western Frontier.

Five of Robert Berry's (OC) sons relocated to new frontiers. By the year 1850, there were many more of Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry's descendants living in Georgia, Alabama, Texas, Mississippi, Kentucky, Ohio, and Tennessee than there were in Orange County, North

Carolina. This pattern continued for Robert Berry's (OC) descendants for many more years. As the great southwest and the great northwest frontiers were opened, many of our Berry family pioneered those lands, too.

When virgin land was there, it seems our family always had a new crop of Berrys ready to load up the wagons. It was not just our family, but countless other families were experiencing the same pioneering life. I read one time that in Salisbury, North Carolina, which was on the main route south, there would be as many as 1000 wagons a day passing through. This was the same time that Robert Berry Jr. and his family departed for Fayette County, Alabama.

After the land grants disappeared, job seeking continued to instigate movement of our family members. Many of our Berrys migrated north and west, seeking jobs during the early & mid 1930 depression years. My mother and father were married in 1928 and only made a short move from Hillsborough to Raleigh, N.C., which was about 50 miles.

We gathered in Hillsborough, North Carolina, on Thursday, July 19th, and on Friday, July 20th, 2007, we spent the day in the 256 year old city of Hillsborough, North Carolina. William Churton laid out the streets that have never been changed, other than resurfacing them with modern materials. There were two reasons I chose these dates for our Fiddleton Reunion. My mother was born on July 20th, 1908, and Robert Berry (OC) was granted his Granville Land Grant on May 12th, 1757.On Saturday, about 70 of us explored the original Granville Land Grant property. We visited the Cemetery where Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry are buried.

All of the out of state cousins were staying in the Holiday Inn Express in Hillsborough and we had rented the conference room where all could share information and relay our stories to

each other. We also formed groups to visit the register of deeds office to view all of the old deeds and assorted records. The deed books dated back to 1750 and the grooms and brides books were also very popular. There were a total number of 116 Berry family members who attended the reunion dinner on Saturday at the Schley Grange Hall. Many pictures were taken with still cameras and video cameras. We had a golf cart which made it possible for the less mobile cousins to visit the cemetery. We visited Berry's Grove Baptist Church, where many of Robert Berry's North Carolina descendants are buried. John Robert and his wife, Elizabeth Frances Bowling Berry, gave the land to the Church. John Robert Berry is the great-grandson of Robert Berry (OC).

After spending Saturday morning visiting all the points of interest, we motored to the Schley Grange Hall, where we had a dinner of southern pork Bar-B-Q. Schley is about halfway between Fiddleton and Hillsborough. On Sunday, we all said goodby. I had many favorable comments and I think everybody really enjoyed this reunion.

1766 is the date scratched in the mortar between two stones on the rear of the chimney. I have no idea if Robert Berry (OC) scratched this date on the chimney, or if Henry Berry did it after he inherited the Plantation house in 1814. We colored the date with dark chalk so the date would show up better in pictures





Figure 32: 1766 marks on Chimney at Fiddleton

Number of Berry Families Households in America

This chart shows a couple of interesting facts that should be noted.



There were very few Berry families in America until about 1850. The number of new Berry households increased by only 92 in the 10 years from 1790 to 1800. Four of our Robert Berry's (OC) children (Joshua, David, William, and Thomas Berry) account for four of these 92 new Berry households.

In the 1850 US Census, there was a huge increase in Berry households in America. The majority of these new Berry families were coming from Ireland as a result of the potato famine.

From the chart, you can see there were 2182 Berry households in America in 1840. Ten years later in 1850, there are 16,033 Berry households in America. That is an 800% increase in ten years, or about 1400 new Berry households each year. 44

CHAPTER 3

MARY BERRY 1759 -1795 to 1800




Figure 34: Affidavit of Annie Naomi Camp Hill.

Mary Berry was the first child born to Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry and was born sometime between 1757 and 1759. Unfortunately, she was born and married before such records were kept in Orange County, North Carolina. We have located several documents which give us a little peek into Mary's life. George Waggoner left a will that he wrote on April 2nd, 1781, which named Mary Waggoner as his beloved wife. Mary and her father, Robert Berry, were named executors of his will. (See: Fig. 34, Pg. 84).

The battle of Guilford Courthouse was fought on March 15th, 1781. This conflict was only about 40 miles from Fiddleton, and I know Robert Berry (OC) was a private in the North Carolina Line in 1781. I think that George Waggoner was mortally injured in that battle and Robert helped his son-in-law, George, return to his family before rejoining General Nathan Green's troops. The early spring rains had swollen the Dan River, so General Green made a brilliant decision to confiscate all of the boats along the river and ferry his army into Virginia. General Green kept all the boats on the north side of the Dan.

When General Charles Cornwallis' troops arrived at the river, he had no way to attack General Green's army. General Cornwallis claimed victory and turned his troops back toward central North Carolina in search of food and reinforcements. A British statesman named Charles James Fox made the statement: "another victory like Guilford Courthouse and Cornwallis' army will be completely destroyed." When General Green crossed back into North Carolina, he split his troops into two parts and proceeded to lead the exhausted British army all over central and southern North Carolina. The English fully expected loyalty from the planters in western North Carolina. This expectation did not materialize. After a short time, General Cornwallis and his army marched into Virginia, where he finally surrendered at Yorktown on October 19th, 1781.

In the August, 1781, term of Court, the Last Will and Testament of George Waggoner Decd. was duly proven in open court by the Oath of George Clower, a subscribing witness thereto, and ordered to be recorded at the same time. Mary Waggoner and Robert Berry qualified as Executor and Executrix of his will. The court ordered that letters Testamentary issue to them accordingly.

George Waggoner left property to his wife Mary, his daughters Elizabeth, Ann in his will. George mentioned "My daughters" several times in his will, which leads me to believe they were his children by a previous marriage. The will was produced in open court in the November term of 1781⁴⁶ at Hillsborough, North Carolina. Robert Berry was very likely away in the army until General Cornwallis surrendered in October of that year. We know that Robert Berry was back in Orange County in February, 1782, because he signed George Waggoner's inventory sale, and we also know that Mary Berry Waggoner had remarried because she signed her name on this document as Mary Kemp. We know that Mary Berry married James Kemp sometime after November, 1781. This was verified by an affidavit (See Fig. 35, Pg. 85) signed by James Kemp's sister, Annie Naomi Camp,⁴⁷ naming Mary Berry as the daughter of Robert Berry and all of James and Mary's five children. In Naomi Kemp Hill's affidavit, she said that her brother's family lived in Rutherford County, North Carolina. The Power of Attorney written on the 14th day of January, 1815, was signed by all of James and Mary Berry Kemp's children who were named in the affidavit. (See Page 87)

Transcribed George Waggoner's Will April 2nd, 1781

WILL BOOK A, Page 231 Will of GEORGE WAGGONER, deceased In the name of God, Amen. I, George Waggoner, of the county of Orange, planter, being very sick, but of perfect mind, sense and memory, thanks be to God for the same, calling unto mind the mortality of the body, and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die, do make, ordain this my last will and testament, that is to say, Principally and first of all, I give and recommend my soul into the hands of Almighty God that gave it, and my body I recommend to the Earth to be buried in decent Christian burial at the discretion of my Executors, nothing doubting but at the general Resurrection I shall receive the same again by the mighty power of God, and as touching such worldly estate wherewith it has pleased God to bless me with in this life, I give, demise and dispose of the same in the following form and manner. First, I give and bequeath to Mary Waggoner, my dearly beloved wife, one brown mare, bridle and saddle, three cows with their calves, and the use of the household furniture, while she lives with my children in widowhood. I give to my daughter Elizabeth, one brown horse, three cows and their calves. And to my daughter Ann, one horse, three cows and their calves. And to my daughter Ann, one young black mare, three cows and their calves. And the other movables to be equally divided between my two daughters, as also four hundred and fifty acres of land, which I leave the third to my wife, and the said third to raise and support my children during ther minority, and at the death of my wife, her third of the land to go to my two daughters. Out of the above mentioned one hundred and fifty acres of land, I leave my father, Henry Waggoner, one hundred acres, joining his line, and Robert McCaul's line. And Mary Waggoner and Robert Berry, sole Executors of this my last will and testament. And I do utterly disallow, revoke my last will and testament. And I do utterly disallow, revoke and disannul every other former testaments, wills, legacies, bequests and Executors by me in any wise named, willed and bequeathed, ratifying and confirming this and no other to be my last will and testament. In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and seal the second day of April in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty-one. Test: William Forsyth George Clower George Waggoner James Waggoner Produced in open court and duly recorded this August term of 1781.

James and Mary Camp's first child was a boy and was probably born in Orange County, NC. He was likely the first known grandchild of Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry. I thought Catherine Berry was the first grandchild for a long time. We know the names of all of Mary and James Kemp's children, thanks to the affidavit. (See Fig, 35,Pg. 85). The affidavit states that all of James and Mary Camp's children were born in North Carolina.

From this document, it seems that James and Mary Berry Camp removed to South Carolina the next day after Joseph Camp was born. I have no idea why Annie Naomi Camp Hill was giving this affidavit in 1848. This document was a very important addition to our research about Mary Berry. It established without a doubt that Mary Berry Camp was the daughter of Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry from Orange County, North Carolina. There was also a lot of information about her five children. Joseph Camp remained in South Carolina after his sister and three brothers removed to Fayette County, Georgia. Joseph Camp became an attorney and drafted a Power of Attorney for his three brothers and his sister, who were living in Fayette County, Georgia, in1815 after Robert Berry Senior died.

. Mary Berry Camp's children were trying to claim their mother's inheritance with the Power of Attorney that Joseph Camp delivered to his uncle, Henry Berry, in Orange County, North Carolina, on December 29th, 1816. The power of Attorney proves that Robert Berry (OC) died before that date. We know he was alive on April 15th, 1812, when he wrote his will.

Little did they know that the inheritance was probably much less than the cost of the attorney's fee. There was only one pound left to Mary Kemp in her father's will. Joseph Camp apparently returned to Orange County in 1816 on behalf of his siblings to deliver this document. I am sure he was happy to see his uncle, Henry Berry, who was the administrator of Robert Berry Senior's will, but I am equally sure he was disappointed in the settlement the family was entitled to. I have a copy of this document and Henry Berry's signature is on the back of it.

Mary Berry married James Camp in 1781. We have no record of exactly how long James and Mary lived in Orange County before they removed to Rutherford County, North Carolina. From the affidavit, it appears that this move occurred between 1784 and 1785, after their first child, John Camp, was born.

We know from Annie Naomi Camp Hill's affidavit that four of their children were born in Rutherford County, North Carolina. Most likely Mary had given birth to her first child, John Camp, before 1784.

To all men by these presents ----John Camp, Robert Camp, Starling Camp Snr., and Shadrack Humphres the husband & representative of Sarah Humphries formally Sarah Camp have consulted and appointed Joseph and by his presents so commission & appoint Joseph Camp of the State of South Carolina, Greenville District our Power of Attorney henceforth revoking and annulling all other Power of Attorney for given and trusting a special trust in our Attorney to transact for us successfully & in our stead all business matters elective to the estate of our grandfather Robert Berry sen.(deceased) which we claim the rights of our mother Mary Berry since Mary Camp (deceased) giving full power to our said attorney to bring suit or suits for the sum any monies or goods or chattels lands or tenements, acquire any monies & accept for the reasons--- --- undeliverable sums as though we were personally present thereby satisfying & confirming whatsoever our said Attorney shall lawfully do ----- our ------ interest in said Estate. Given under our hand & seal this 14 th, day of Jan 1815 The word mother underlined and assigned In presence of S John Camp seal Hosea Camp J.J.C Robert Camp seal Starling Camp seal Shadrack Humphries seal





Figure 36: Henry Berry's signature on Power of Attorney

In Annie Naomi Camp's affidavit, she stated that all of James and Mary's children were born in North Carolina and after Joseph Camp was born, her brother and his family removed to Laurens, and Greenville District, in South Carolina. (Fig. 39, Pg. 89)

At this point I searched in the 1800 Laurens County, South Carolina, Census and found James Camp had listed two sons under 10, two sons 10 to 15 and himself age 26 to 45. James

Camp listed one daughter who was 10 to 15 and no other females. The young daughter would have been Sarah Camp, who was born after 1784. Mary Berry Camp had already died. The two Waggoner sisters must have stayed in Orange County. Sarah Camp was about 15 years old at that time. Sarah was managing the home and assuming the household responsibilities that her mother would have been doing had she still been alive. According to the affidavit given by Mary Berry Camp's sister-in-law in 1848, the family removed to South Carolina the next day after Joseph Camp was born. She said in her affidavit that they moved close to the Greenville and Laurens County line. We know that Mary was deceased by 1812. This 1800 census places her death between 1795 and 1800. After going over all the available information, I suspect that Mary Berry Camp died in South Carolina shortly after Joseph Camp was born in 1795. Moving so quickly after her youngest son was born may have caused complications from that childbirth. Mary Berry Camp was probably about 36 years old when she died. We know that she could not have been older than 41 in 1800. Mary gave birth to five children in 12 years and that spacing seems very reasonable.

We know for a fact that Mary Berry Kemp died before April 15th, 1812, when her father, Robert Berry (OC), wrote his will. Based on this fact, we know that Mary was fairly young when she died. In the will, she was listed as deceased. Robert left her a 1 pound inheritance.

Mary's brother, William, was also left 1 pound in the will. The reason for the small inheritance for both may have been based on the fact that both children had moved to other states. Mary could not have been more than 53 years old when she died, if she was born in 1759. I think she died soon after her son Joseph Camp was born in 1795.




Figure 38: Location in South Carolina where Mary Berry Camp probably died

This is about all that is known about Mary Berry's life

Listed in the US Census Records from 1850 you will find that:

There are 427 Camp families in Georgia.

There are 160 Camp families in Alabama.

There are 50 Camp families in Texas.

Joseph Camp is in Rusk County, Texas, with his young family in 1850.

He was born in Georgia in 1825.

Joseph Camp 25 born in Georgia.
Ann Camp 23 born in MO
Benjamin F Camp 4 born in Texas
Frances E Camp 0 born in Texas

Since Benjamin was born in Texas, it would mean that Joseph had been in Texas at least since 1846. John Berry, a grandson of Robert Berry Jr., was listed in the 1860 Rusk County, Texas, Census. We know that John Berry's family was in Texas in 1850, but we cannot find where they were.

There were no Berry families living very close to Joseph Camp and his family in 1850. This Joseph is not Mary Berry Camp's son, but he is probably a member of the Mary Berry Camp family.

There were 70 Camp families living in Mississippi in 1850.

There were 135 Camp Families living in Tennessee in 1850

There were 107 Camp families living in North Carolina in 1850

There were 23 Camp families living in South Carolina in 1850

We know a few living descendants of James and Mary Berry Camp.

CHAPTER 4

ROBERT BERRY JR. 1760-before-1850

Robert Berry Junior was born in Orange County, North Carolina, about 1760 or 1761. He lived in North Carolina until after his parents died. He was listed as a revolutionary soldier (See Fig. 41, Pg. 96) and he listed in the 1790 & 1800 Orange County Census. Robert Berry, Jr., moved to Person County and is listed there in the 1810 Census.

In the 1790 Orange County Census Robert Berry Jr., Robert Berry Sr., Joshua Berry, and John Berry were the only Berry heads of household who listed in that Census. Was John Berry who listed in the 1790 Census Robert Berry Junior's brother? I do not know. It is a fact that Joshua Berry and Robert Berry Jr. were brothers.

Robert Berry Jr. has not been found in any1820 US Census. He was granted land on April 6^{th.},1824, in Fayette County, Alabama (See Fig. 45, Pg. 101). Robert Jr. would have been about 64 years old at that time. He listed in the Fayette County, Alabama, Census in 1830 & 1840. Robert Berry Junior was listed in the 70 to 80 bracket in the 1840 census, which means he was probably not born before 1760. Roberts's wife, Mary, was also listed in the 70 to 80 year bracket. Both Robert and Mary apparently died between 1840 and 1850. Neither of them was listed in the 1850 Fayette County, Alabama, Census. This is unfortunate because this would have verified that her name was Mary. The oldest member in our Berry family living in Fayette1County, Alabama, in 1850 was Susan Aldridge Berry. She was 58 years old and listed head of household with her son, James Berry, age 15. Susan was George Berry's wife. She was the daughter of Peter Aldridge and Judith Waggoner.

Peter Aldridge married Judith Waggoner on Feb 4th, 1788, and **Robert Berry Jr.** was their bondsman. Robert Berry Junior's oldest son, George Berry, would grow up and marry Peter and Judith Waggoner Aldridge's daughter, Susana Aldridge, who was born about 1792 in Person County. Judith Waggoner had a sister named Uley Waggoner who married William Stagg January 22nd, 1805.

Nearly all of the Robert Berry, Junior, family migrated to Fayette County, Alabama, around 1820. William Clarence Berry is the only son who remained in Orange County, North Carolina, at that time. William Clarence Berry finally did join the rest of his family in Fayette County, Alabama, after his first wife, Sally Bowles Berry, died in 1833. We know that William Clarence Berry was in Fayette County, Alabama, before 1838. William Clarence and his second wife, Massa Tompkins, had a son born in Alabama that year.

These court documents give us some glimpse of Robert Berry Jr. and his family's life in North Carolina.

Robert Berry Jr. and Mary Camp Berry's first baby was a little girl born in 1785 and they named her Catherine Berry. Catherine Berry married Jacob Pickle in Orange County, North Carolina, on February 20th, 1802. This probably means that Robert Berry Jr. had not moved to Person County by 1802. Robert Berry (OC) sold 200 acres of land to William Stagg in 1807. (See Page 67). Robert Berry Jr. and his family could have been living there at that time and this may be when he and his family moved to Person County. In the 1810 Orange County Census, Jacob and Catherine Berry Pickle were living right next to her Uncle David and Aunt Mary Blalock Berry. They listed 3 sons under 10 and one daughter, also under 10. Jacob was 35 years old and Catherine was 25.

November Term 1791 Orange N.C. Court Minutes: deed Book 4 pg. 114. Issd. Administration of the estate of James Waggoner is granted to Catherine Waggoner⁴⁹ at the same time she entered into Bond with **Robt. Berry Jun**. Secy. in the sum of L 50.

Robert Berry Jr. signed Catherine Waggoner's bond. James and Catherine Waggoner were probably Judith Waggoner Aldridge's parents. I have no idea what relationship she was to Robert Berry Jr. or why he and Mary named their first daughter Catherine Berry.

Robert Berry Junior's oldest son, George Berry, married Susan Aldridge, daughter of Peter Aldridge and Judith Waggoner, about 25 years after her parents were married. Both families were living in Person County by then.

James and Mary Berry Camp's son, John Camp, was born in 1884 and Catherine Berry was born in 1885. These two cousins were the first grandchildren of Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry (OC).

When Robert Berry Jr. listed in the 1800 Orange County Census, he listed in the 26 to 44 age bracket. This bracket means that he was born between 1756 - 1774.

Robert Berry Junior and his family moved into Person County sometime between the 1800 and the 1810 Census. The Person County line is only about a half mile north of his father's Fiddleton Plantation home.

This listing for soldiers in the American Revolution verifies that Robert Berry Jr. also served in that war. A list of Revolutionary Soldiers (Fig. 41, Pg. 96).

There were only four Robert Berrys listed as heads of household in America in the 1800 Federal census. Two of those who were listed are members of our family, Robert Berry Sr. and Robert Berry Jr., who listed in Orange County, NC.

Robert Berry Junior's father died about 1814 and his sister, Elizabeth, and his mother died around 1815 or 1816.

Since Robert Berry Jr. had served in the revolutionary war and his son, George, had served in the war of 1812, land became available to Robert and George Berry⁵⁰ by a Land Lottery in Fayette County, Alabama. Robert Berry Jr. and his entire family removed to Fayette County, Alabama, with the exception of William Clarence Berry. George Berry and his father acquired 640 acres of land there together in 1824. (See Pg. 101). Berry, Alabama, is located where Robert Jr. and George Berry's land was granted. Berry, Alabama, was named for Robert Berry Junior's son, Thompson P. Berry, 1801-1871.

George's wife, Susan Aldridge Berry, was 58 in the 1850 Fayette County, Alabama, Census. She would have been 8 years old when the 1800 Person County, N.C., Census was taken.

You should find her listed as less than 10 in Peter Aldridge's 1800 Person County, NC, Census.

In 1815, George and Susan Aldridge Berry had their first child and named him John Berry. George and Susan may have married around 1814. This is the same year that George's grandfather, Robert Berry, Senior, died. They were probably married after George returned from serving in the war of 1812.

George Berry was listed number 47 in the War of 1812 Person County roster under Captain John Bradshaw. William Martin ⁵¹ was listed in the same roster as number 46. (**See Page 99**) This would not be the same William Martin who came to Orange County before 1755, but he is likely to be his grandson. (**SEE Pages 28**).

George and Susan Aldridge Berry's oldest child was a son. John Berry was about 7 years old when the family removed from North Carolina to Fayette County, Alabama. John Berry acquired a land grant in Fayette County, Alabama, in 1839. He married Mary Howell and started his family in Alabama. We think George Berry was killed around 1837 and the family was granted land in Texas. Susanna Berry stayed in Alabama but John and his family arrived in Rusk County, Texas, sometime before 1850. The family has never been found in any 1850 Census. The land that was granted in Texas was probably a result of George's military service. See NOTE on page 288.

See Fayette County, AL, Marriage and Probate Records p 263 George Berry Estate Henry Berry administrator; Susan Berry, widow; Heirs: John Berry, Henry Berry, James Berry, Moses Ray (Husband of Susan Berry), Mary Brasher (wife of James H. Brasher), George Berry (minor heir). Sept 1851.

John and Mary Howell Berry had 12 children. Only 4 of their children were born in Fayette County, Alabama. The first child to be born in Texas was James Berry, who was born in 1746. A separate book could be written about this family but I will write about only three of their children and list their 1860 Rusk County, Texas, Census:

Their oldest daughter, Sarah Berry, was already married to Francis M. McClure by the time the 1860 Rusk County, Texas, Census was taken.

The picture of Sarah Berry Dippold's grave was taken in 2006 at Galveston, Texas. Sarah Berry was the oldest child of John and Mary Howell Berry and was already married when the 1860 Census was taken. She was born in Fayette County, Alabama, on April 20th, 1839. Sarah Berry married Hiram Howard on November 24th, 1853; she married Francis M. McClure on January5th, 1859; she married Robert A. Taylor on May 18th, 1863; and she married Henry B. Stoneham on August 29, 1868. Sarah Berry married her last husband, Hinrick Dippold, on February 15th, 1880.

Sarah did not have children by all of her marriages, and she spent the last 37 years of her life in Galveston, Texas, where she died on June 5th, 1917.

Francis Marion Berry was born on February 23rd, 1861, and died on January 8th, 1943. Francis was living in Sunray, Moore County, Texas, when he died. Francis was married to Fannie Lily Hudspeth. Francis Marion Berry was the youngest son of John and Mary Howell Berry and was not born when they listed their 1860 Census. This is a picture of his family.

Alexander Howard Berry is an older brother to Francis Marion Berry. He was born in Rusk County, Texas, on August 24th, 1854, and died in Amherst, Lamb County, Texas, on February 18th, 1926. Alexander Berry married Josephine Priscilla Gregory on April 17th, 1877. Josephine was born on July 7th, 1858. The picture below shows them standing in what looks like a peach orchard. See the story (**on Page 229**) about this family when they went to Colorado seeking jobs. They were the parents of six children.

I think that John McRee is a typo and was really John McKee. There were no McRee families in Orange County. There were several McKee families in the county.

Robert Berry Jr. listed three daughters in 1810 Person County Census and we have not indentified any of them.

Catherine Berry married Jacob Pickle on February 20, 1802, in Orange County, North Carolina. This would have made Catherine about 17 years old and Jacob Pickle would have been 26 years old when they married. Catherine and Jacob Pickle were living next door to her Uncle David J. and Aunt Mary Blalock Berry when the 1810 Orange County, North Carolina, Census was taken. Robert Berry Junior purchased 50 acres of land on February 3rd, 1812, from John Minshaw for \$70. This property was on Byrd's Creek, where R. Minshaw (Deceased) had lived. The property was adjacent to Dickens property. This deed was also signed by Elisha Minshaw and witnessed by William Cooke and Robert's son-in-law, Jacob Pickle. John and Elisha Minshaw were most likely brothers. (**Person Co. Book D, Page 331**)

On December 31, 1812, Robert Berry Jr. sold a piece of property for \$90 to Lawrence V. Hargis & Co. This is the same 50 acres that he had bought from the estate of Richard Minshaw (deceased) 10 months earlier. Thomas Sneed and James Farquhar witnessed this deed. There was a \$20 profit made on this land deal, and it probably was not the land he was living on at the time. (**Book D, Page 421**) On the 6th of December, 1817, John Aldridge sold 20 and ½ acres of land to James Farquhar for the sum of \$164. The land was on the east side of Flat River in Person County, NC, and was adjoining land owned by Abraham Moore and William Blalock. The witnesses were John Farquhar and George Berry. (**Deed Book E, 54-5**). James Farquhar was married to John Aldridge's sister, Mary/ Polly Aldridge.

Robert Vanhook, Sheriff, to George Berry (due to execution against Wright Nichols, administrator of William Blalock deceased, for \$106 and this sum recovered by James Farquhar) for 76.32 acres of Blalock being lot # 3 in division of land of Peter Aldridge, deceased on both sides of Flat River and allotted to Catherine Aldridge and was property of William Blalock when sold 22 October, 1819. Witnessed: Parthenia Vanhook, Mary Vanhook. (Person County Deed Book E Page 196-8)

George Berry and Susannah Aldridge Berry, his wife, to John Jackson, for \$300, 61.75 acres North side of Flat River part of tract formerly property of Peter Aldridge adjoining Samuel Evans, James Farquhar. 10 November 1819 Witnessed: Jesse Evans, William McKissack. Susannah Berry examined apart from her husband and freely agreed to conveyance.

(Person County Deed Book E pages 199–200).

This was a sale of Susanna A. Berry's property she inherited from her father, Peter Aldridge, and was completed very shortly before George and Susanna Berry removed to Fayette County, Alabama. Robert Berry Jr. and his family soon were to leave Orange and Person County, North Carolina, forever. The sale of this property is a very good time stamp marking Robert Berry Junior's preparation for his family's departure from North Carolina. Since we cannot find Robert Berry Jr. in any 1820 US Census, we can assume the family was migrating to Fayette County, Alabama, during this time period.

It might be worth noting here that John and Margery Cate were granted land on the Flat River in Person County around 1755.





Figure 42:1800 Orange County, North Carolina, Census.




Figure 43: George Berry & William Martin

William Martin is probably a grandson of William Martin who came to North Carolina in 1751. (See page 28) George Berry is the grandson of Robert Berry, who also came to North Carolina in 1751.

On page 100 you will see Peter Aldridge, Molly Aldridge, and Abraham Aldridge listed on the 1810 Person County Census. There are three families living between the Aldridge families and the two Berry families (Thomas Berry and Robert Berry Jr.). Robert Berry Junior's son, George Berry, married Susan Aldridge about 1814. Susan is the daughter of Peter Aldridge.




Figure 44: Robert Berry Jr. 1810 listing in Person County Census.

When the 1830 and the 1840 Censuses were taken, Robert Berry Jr. and most of his children were in Fayette County, Alabama. William Clarence Berry did not leave North Carolina until after his wife, Sally Bowles Berry, died in 1833.

Map of Key Alabama & Tennessee Counties




Figure 46: Key Alabama & Tennessee Counties.




Figure 47: Land Grants of Robert Berry Junior's family in Fayette County, Ala. Names and dates of land grants in Fayette County, Alabama

Robert Berry Jr. and his family settled in Fayette County, Alabama. David J. Berry has descendants in Cullman, Alabama, today. Victor Glenn Berry, author of "Wagons South, Wagons West", lived in Arab, Alabama. Thomas and Sarah Cate Berry Pigg's descendants live in Cypress Inn, Tennessee, today. It is now believed, based on the 1850 Lincoln County, Tennessee, Census, that my William Berry may have homesteaded there. The county is on the Tennessee-Alabama State line. David J. Berry's family settled just north of Atlanta, Georgia, in the late 1820's. Atlanta is only 226 miles from Fayette County, Alabama, and 249 miles from Cypress Inn, Tennessee. The town of Berry, Alabama, is 113 miles from Cypress Inn, Tennessee. (Fig.47)

Some of the surnames in Fayette County, Alabama, who may be related to Robert Berry (PAC) in Princess Anne County, Virginia, in the early 1700's.

Pioneers in Virginia, North Carolina, and Alabama

Thomas Caraway, who may be a descendant of John Caraway and Ann Kemp in Princess Anne County, Virginia, was granted a track of land located between John Berry and his father, George Berry. The grant was made about 70 years after John Caraway and Ann Kemp were married. Keep in mind that Robert Berry was married to Mary Kemp/Camp and that George Berry is their son. The other two Caraway men listed below, William and Thomas, may also be descendants of John and Ann Kemp Caraway.

David Lovett was granted 80 acres on 6/20/1825. (See Lovett on page 15)

Joseph Carraway was granted 40 acres on 10/21/1834. (See Caraway on page 15)

William J. Carraway was granted 40 acres on 3/30/1837. (See Caraway on page 15)

George Berry was granted 40 acres on 9/20/1839. (Robert Berry Junior's son)

John Berry was granted 40 acres on 9/20/1839. (George and Susan Aldridge Berry's son)

Thomas Cate was granted 38.87 acres on 11/4/1834. (See Thomas Cate on page 47)

Peter Martin was granted 160.35 acres on 9/20/1839. (See Page 245)

Henry Robinson was granted 79.68 acres on 5/18/1824. (See Robinson Pages 22 & 68) James Williamson was granted 321.44 acres on 7/1/1881 (See Williamson Page 22)

Is David Lovett a descendant of Lancaster Lovett who married Mary Caraway in Virginia? (See: Page 15). This is very important information because most all of these surnames can be found on the 1704 Virginia Rent Rolls and are related to Robert Berry's (PAC) wife, Mary Williamson Berry (Pages 29, 30, 31).

Peter Martin, who homesteaded in Fayette County, Alabama, and was granted land on September 9th, 1839, may be related to William Martin who brought slaves into North Carolina from Virginia in 1751.(See page 26) The William Martin who served with George Berry in the War of 1812 may also be related.

On page 10 of Nellie Berry's book, "JAMES E. & ESSIE DAVIS BERRY Ancestors, Descendants & Kinfolks", Thomas Berry's son, David Berry, married Elizabeth Shipman, who was born in 1809. Her parents were Jacob Shipman and Rebecca Pigg. We also learn that Elizabeth Shipman's sister, Rachel Shipman, married Peter Martin in 1827. Sarah Cate Berry married John Pigg in 1815 in Tennessee. (See Fig 83, pg. 168)

With so many of Robert Berry's (OC) descendants living so close to each other, the location of the counties in the map on page 102 is very important for future research.

On the map, page 104, there are numbers that refer to who and where our family were granted land in Fayette County, Alabama.

. The markup of this map was done by Carolyn (Cookie) Paulson and her husband based on information they collected while we were staying in Florence, Alabama, for the 2008 Berry Reunion. The 2008 Robert Berry (OC) reunion was hosted by Thomas Berry's descendants who currently live in and around Cypress Inn, Tennessee.

It must have been very hard on Robert Berry Jr. and his wife, Mary Kemp Berry, as they traveled from North Carolina to Alabama. This was a very long trip and they were both about 60 years old. The distance from Hillsborough, North Carolina, to Berry, Alabama, today is 583 miles. If they averaged 10 miles a day, it would take 58 days to travel. Life in a wagon train was very hard on young people, and the elderly who survived must have been very sturdy people. There were 17 members of the Robert Berry Junior family and probably three or four wagons. The older boys probably had their own horses and herded some cattle and hogs as they made this trip. Indications that other pioneers from Orange County, North Carolina, were in the same wagon train can be based on the 1824 and 1825 land grants. The wagon train may have been quite large. I think William Clarence Berry did not go to Alabama with the rest of his family because he planned to marry Sally Bowles. He was about 17 years old when his family left Orange County, North Carolina, and he married Sally Bowles about three years later, on November 20th, 1826.

Robert Berry Junior's parents were both dead by 1820 and since he had not inherited any of his father's land, moving West made a lot of sense. Robert Berry Jr. and his son George were granted land in Fayette County, Alabama, in 1824. Since Robert listed in the 1830 and the 1840 census in Fayette County, Alabama, and did not list in the 1850 Fayette County Census, Robert Berry Jr. must have been between 80 to 90 years old when he died. Mary Kemp Berry also died between 1840 and 1850.

As you can see from pages 106 and 107, there were a very large number of Robert Berry,

Junior's, children and grandchildren who acquired land over the next 50 years in Fayette County, Alabama. George and Susanna Aldridge Berry's oldest son, John Berry, must have lived with his father and grandfather when the family first settled in Alabama. John Berry was only 7 years old when his parents removed to Alabama. Thomas Person Berry in Orange County was only 14 years old at the time. Robert Junior's son, Thompson P. Berry, was about 21 years old. This was a time of mass exodus from Orange County, North Carolina. So many of Robert Berry's (OC) descendants left by the year 1830 that there were many more Berry descendants in Georgia, Alabama, Tennessee, Kentucky, and Ohio than were in Orange County, NC. Times were hard in America in the 1820's.




Figure 48: Jacob and Catherine Berry Pickle, Robert Berry Junior's daughter

From where and when the children were born, Jacob and Catherine Berry Pickle seem to have left Orange County, North Carolina, about 1812. This is interesting because I still think

they went to Alabama with Robert Berry Jr. and the rest of the family. Jacob Pickle was granted land in 1824, which is the exact same time that George Berry and his father, Robert Berry Jr., were granted their land.

Jacob and Catherine Berry Pickle were living next door to Uncle David and Aunt Mary in 1810 but were not in any 1820 census, because they had already left Orange County, NC. *I have not located them in any 1820 census*.

Jacob and his wife, Catherine Berry Pickle, listed in Fayette County, Alabama, in the 1830 Census. The Pickle family removed to Monroe, Mississippi, and was living there when the 1840 census was taken. They lived in Mississippi for the rest of their lives.




Figure 50: Robert I. Pickle

Pickle, son of Robert and Sarah; the young lady standing is Mary Elizabeth Irvin Pickle, daughter of Thomas and Sidney. The identity of the man holding the banjo is unknown.

From North Carolina to Texas via Alabama.

George and Susannah Aldridge Berry's son, John Berry, married Mary Howell and listed as head of household for the first time in the 1840 Fayette County, Alabama, Census. Two of John Berry's descendants have taken a Y-DNA test and both of them matched other known descendants of the Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry family from Orange County, North Carolina. John Berry, who is the great-grandson of Robert Berry Sr. (OC), was found living in Rusk County, Texas, in the 1860 census. John Berry is the oldest son of George and Susan Berry. He was born in Person County, North Carolina, in 1815. John Berry was 7 years old when his family went to Fayette County, Alabama. (See: Page 94 for a listing of John and Mary Howell Berry's children in Rusk County Texas)

Robert Berry Jr. did not list in Fayette County, Alabama, in 1850. He would have been 90 years old. Robert Berry Jr. and his wife, Mary Camp Berry, both died sometime after the 1840 Census. Both are buried at Pleasant Hill Methodist Church in Fayette County, Alabama. The picture in **Fig 61, page 123** shows graves that probably include the graves of Robert Berry Junior and his wife, Mary Camp Berry. His youngest son, Thompson Berry, and his wife, Rosanna Gutman Berry, are buried about thirty feet away from this area in the Pleasant Hill Methodist Church cemetery. Thompson P. Berry's headstone states that he was born on December 18, 1801, in Orange County, North Carolina. He died on January 8, 1871. Since the unmarked headstones are closer to the road, they are likely to be the first graves in this cemetery. This property may have been on Thompson P, Berry's land and later donated to the Pleasant Hill Methodist Church by Thompson P. Berry. He was a very rich man and the city of Berry, Alabama, was named for him.

Our Trip to Fayette County, Alabama.

On Wednesday, September 17th, 2008, Carolyn Paulson, her husband Bob, my wife Jean Henderson, and I visited Fayette County, Alabama, for a day. On the right is Carolyn (Cookie) Paulson, who is a descendant of Robert Berry Junior and Mary Kemp/Camp. On the left side of the sign is Benjamin Berry Henderson, who is a descendant of William and Hannah Cate Berry. Robert Jr. and William were brothers and sons of Robert (OC) and Elizabeth Cate Berry.

Robert Berry Jr., Waggoner, Aldridge and Kemp Connections:

Robert Berry Jr. posted a bond for Catherine Waggoner to be the administrator for James Waggoner.

"November Term 1791 Orange N.C. Court Minutes: Book 4 pg 114
· Issd. Adminstration of the estate of James WAGGONER is Granted to Catherine WAGGONER at the same time she entered into Bond With Robt. BERRY Jun. Secy. in the sum of L 50."

In 1785, Robert Berry Jr. and his wife, Mary Camp Berry, named their first daughter Catherine Berry. The first daughter is commonly named for her maternal grandmother. This suggests that Catherine Waggoner may have been a Kemp/Camp before she married James Waggoner.

Robert Berry Jr. was also the bondsman for Judith Waggoner when she married Peter Aldridge on February 4th, 1788.

In the 1810 Person County Census, Peter Aldridge's family were living very close to Robert Berry and his family.

In 1814, George Berry married Susana Aldridge, who was the daughter of Peter Aldridge and Judith Waggoner. The Waggoners and the Berry family were always very close and many marriages were consummated between the two families.

Robert Berry Junior was married before records of marriages in Orange County, NC, were recorded. We think he married Mary Kemp/Camp, who was the sister of Mary Berry's husband, James Kemp/Camp. Both of these marriages may connect to George Kemp from Princess Anne County, Virginia. Robert Berry Jr. and Mary Kemp named their first son George Berry.

James Waggoner was likely Catherine Waggoner's husband. Catherine Waggoner was probably Judith Waggoner's mother and Susan Aldridge's grandmother.

All of Robert Jr. and Mary Camp Berry's children were born in Orange County, North Carolina. Thompson Berry's headstone at Pleasant Hill Methodist Cemetery in Fayette County, Alabama, states clearly that he was born on December 18, 1801, in Orange County, North Carolina.

William Clarence Berry and his second wife are buried in Burnet County, Texas.

The cemetery is south of Lampasas.

David Middleton Berry is listed in the 1830, 1840, 1850, 1860, and 1870 Fayette County, Alabama, Censuses.

Robert Berry Junior's family is said to be the first white settlers to live in Fayette County, Alabama. Collectively, they owned a huge amount of land in the county. Thompson Berry alone left about 6000 acres of land to his heirs. The town of Berry, Alabama, was named for him. Since this family was the first family to settle Fayette County, Alabama, I think it is safe to assume that most of the Berrys who listed in 1830 were Robert Berry Jr.'s family. Glenn Berry (*Wagons South, Wagons West*) thought that some of them might be cousins and I think he was right, but I think most of them were children or grandchildren.

You can also see from the 1830 Fayette County, Alabama, Census that two dwellings had been built on the Robert Berry Jr. property or else they bought some adjoining property.

Robert Berry Junior's family grew from the 17 who left Orange County in 1820 to 36 in the 1830 Fayette County, AL, Census. Census information can reveal a lot about the relationship of those living in a community. Many times close neighbors in these early censuses were related by marriage or blood. In the 1850 Orange County Census, the sisters, brothers, cousins, and inlaws lived side by side as you traveled in either direction from Thomas Person Berry's property at Fiddleton.




Figure 53: Robert Berry Jr. in Fayette County, Alabama, 1830 Census.




Figure 54:1840 Fayette County, Alabama, Census of Robert Berry Jr.

In some of our early research, there were questions about William Clarence Berry's parents. For many years we thought that he was the son of Joshua and Nancy Ellison Berry. In the pages to follow, I will attempt to prove that he is in fact the son of Robert Berry Jr. and Mary Camp Berry. I think I make a pretty good case. There were a series of events that misled the early researchers concerning William and Sally Berry. The confusion came about simply because there were two women named Sally who married Berry cousins in Orange and Person Counties. Searching for names of boys and girls who were named for their ancestors is a good tool to use when you research, but it can also mislead you and make research very difficult as you will see in the next few pages.

Research of William Clarence Berry's Parents.

There was an *error* made several years ago by my group of Orange County, North Carolina, researchers. The error was made because of four documents that we used to determine who William C. Berry's parents were:

In the 1850 Orange County Census, Sally Berry ⁵² listed as head of household. This family was living in the same neighborhood with other Joshua Berry family members.

Sally Berry	age 52	born	1798.
Sarah Berry	age 14	born	1836.
Rachael Berry	age 11	born	1839.

Rachael Berry age 11 born 1839.
On March 6th, 1883, Eli D. Berry was appointed administrator of Nancy Berry's estate. (**See Fig. 73, Pg. 147**). Nancy was one of the younger daughters of Joshua and Nancy Ellison Berry. In that report, Eli D. Berry named two of the heirs to Nancy Berry's estate as Rachael Neal and Sarah Jones. The ages of these girls seemed to fit a logical pattern. We knew that William Clarence Berry had married Sally Bowles on November 20th, 1826.⁵³

We knew from the 1840 Fayette County, Alabama, Census that William Clarence Berry had 3 of his older children with him. We did not understand why William Berry had taken only 3 of his children with him in 1835 while leaving 2 daughters and a wife at home. We overlooked the fact that the three children in Alabama were not included in Nancy Berry's estate settlement.

Our other mistake was that we did not know that Robert Berry, who had stayed in Orange County, was Joshua's son and married a young lady by the name of Sally Cates.

After finding out from searching Pat Hutchins family group sheets that Joshua's son, **Robert Berry,** married **Sally Cates** on November 13th, 1816, in Person County, North Carolina, it became clear who Sally Berry with the 2 daughters (Sarah Berry and Rachael Berry) in the 1850 Orange County, North Carolina, Census was. **Robert Berry** died between 1840 and 1850 leaving a widow and 2 daughters.

Now we know that William Clarence Berry had married Sally Bowles and his first cousin, Robert Berry, married Sally Cates. When you finally get enough information, all of the pieces of the puzzle fit together nicely.

We found that William C. Berry had removed from Orange County to Fayette County, Alabama, about 1835, taking his three small children with him:

George R Berry born 1829 age 6 Elizabeth Berry born 1830 age 5 Rose Ann Berry born 1833 age 2

From the Fayette County, AL, Marriage and Probate⁵⁴ Records pg. 47:

William Bowles Estate: "Elizabeth E Berry and Roan Frances Berry, heirs of William C. Berry, who are heirs of the estate of William Bowles, late of Orange County, N C, deceased, requested William C. Berry be appointed their guardian. Dec. 1851."

William Berry was living beside Chesterfield Franklin in the 1830 Orange County Census. He listed a wife, one son, and himself in that enumeration. Their two daughters were not born until after the 1830 census was taken. Chesterfield Franklin was the father of Theodoric Franklin, who married Hannah Berry's daughter, Elizabeth Berry, in 1832. The Franklins also

migrated to Alabama around 1835.

George Rufus Berry was born in Orange County, NC, on Feb 28th, 1829, and died Dec. 25th, 1909, in Burnet County, Texas.

George Rufus Berry married Sarah Catherine Farquhar on Dec 1, 1847. They had six children.

Elizabeth Jane Berry was born on March 17, 1831, in Orange County, NC, and died Sept 22nd, 1893, in Walker County, Alabama. Walker County joins Fayette County, Alabama.

Elizabeth Jane Berry married Albert Galiton Whitson and they had a son and a daughter. **Roan Frances Berry** was born in Orange County, NC, in May, 1833, and died Nov 8th, 1922, in McCulloch County, Texas. Roan Frances Berry married Riley Aley Kizziah on the 23rd of December, 1860. Riley was killed in the civil war in Murfreesboro, Tennessee, on Dec 31st, 1862.

Roan never remarried and went to Texas with her three brothers on December 6, 1875. Roan had one daughter. The daughter's name was Aila Frances "Fannie" Kizziah, born July, 1862. Fannie married Anderson Farquhar "Ance" McCoy on December 16, 1880, in Burnet County, Texas. In Victor Glenn Berry's book "Wagons South Wagons West" he states that Sally Bowles Berry died between 1833 and 1835.

My guess is that Sally Bowles Berry died at childbirth in **May of 1833** when **Roan Frances** was born. This time frame matches when Theodoric and Elizabeth Berry Franklin also left Orange County for Alabama. (See Page 192) William and Person Berry also sold land in Orange County on September 19th, 1833. (See Page 208)

William Clarence Berry and his new wife, Massa Ann Tompkins, had a son, John Thomas Berry, born in Fayette County, Alabama, on July 28th, **1838**, and Elizabeth and Theodoric had a son, Henry Berry Franklin, born in Alabama in **1835**. (See Page 193) Chesterfield Franklin was not found in any census after 1840. This additional information came into our hands⁵⁵ in 2008 which seems to indicate that William Clarence Berry is the son of Robert Berry Jr. and Mary Camp Berry. In the book "*Wagons South Wagons West*", Victor Glenn Berry wrote that "William Clarence Berry might be the son of Robert Berry Jr." who was living in Fayette County, Alabama.

All of Robert Jr. and Mary Camp Berry's children were born in Orange County, North Carolina. Information on the 1850 Fayette County, Alabama, Census; William Clarence Berry, age 47, was born 1803 in North Carolina.

Not a single name from Joshua Berry's children was used in naming the children of William Clarence & Sally Bowles Berry or in the names chosen for the children by his second marriage, either. Joshua and Nancy used a different set of given names from the rest of the Berry family.

It did not make sense for William C. Berry to leave North Carolina with 3 small children and no wife if he were Joshua Berry's son. There would have been plenty of help with his three young children from other members of the Joshua Berry family who remained in Orange County all their lives.

In 1883, when Joshua and Nancy Ellison Berry's spinster daughter died intestate, there was no mention of William Clarence Berry in her estate settlement seen on page 149.




Figure 55: 1830 Orange Co., NC, Census,

In the 1830 Orange County, NC, Census, William listed one male under 5, one male 20–30 and one female 20–30 and was living beside Chesterfield Franklin, ⁵⁶ father of Theodoric Franklin. (See Fig. 55, Pg. 118) This is proof that the two families had close contact with each other. Theodoric Franklin married Thomas Person Berry's half- sister.

Theodoric Franklin married Elizabeth Berry, daughter of Hannah and John Berry **See Fig.100, Pg. 192**). They were married in Orange County on June 30th, 1832, and Elizabeth's half-brother, Thomas Person Berry, and William Bowles signed their wedding bond. Theodoric and Elizabeth's oldest daughter, Temperance Jane Franklin, was born in NC in 1832. Their next child, Henry Berry Franklin, was born in Alabama in 1835.

I think that William Clarence Berry and his three children may have traveled with Theodoric and Elizabeth Berry Franklin and their 2 year old daughter, Temperance Jane Franklin as they migrated to Alabama around 1834.

William Clarence and his second wife even named one of his daughters Temperance Berry. There probably were several other families from Orange County, NC, who traveled with them to Alabama in 1834.

James and John Bowles were granted land in Fayette County, Alabama (See: page104). William Bowles, who is Sally Bowles father, signed the wedding bond of Elizabeth Berry and Theodoric Franklin. James Bowles is probably William Clarence Berry's brother-in-law.

William Berry and Person Berry bought a piece of property from their Uncle Henry Berry on November 23rd, 1830. (Orange County, NC, Deed Book 24, Page 226). I think the William Berry named in this deed was William Clarence Berry. I know Person Berry was the son of William and Hannah Berry. William Clarence and Sally Bowles were married in 1826 and Thomas Person Berry and Sarah Lunsford were married in 1831. I think the two cousins bought this tract of land together so they could start their own plantation.

William Berry and Thomas Person Berry sold that same piece of property to Samuel Wilson and his son, Felix Wilson, at a loss of \$50, on September 19th, 1833, in Orange County, NC. (Orange County, NC, Deed Book 25, Page, 431) This deed was witnessed by Charles Wilson and Robert C. Berry. Charles Wilson is Felix Wilson's brother and Robert C. Berry was most likely Thomas Person Berry's brother. Recent information seems to confirm this.

There was only one William Berry listed in the 1830 Orange County census and the enumeration fits William Clarence Berry's family exactly.

Most likely Sally Bowles Berry died at childbirth when their third child, Rose Ann (Roan) Berry, was born in 1833.⁵⁷ It is possible that Thomas Person and Elizabeth Lunsford Berry went to Alabama with his half-sister, Elizabeth Franklin, and his cousin, William Clarence Berry. If Thomas Person and Sarah Lunsford Berry went to Alabama, they decided to return to Orange County, NC, because their first son, William H. Berry, was born in Orange County, NC, in1836. Even though Thomas Person Berry and Sarah Lunsford were married in 1831, they did not have a child until 1836. They may have been traveling to Alabama and back during this time.

In" *Wagons South and Wagons West*", ⁵⁸ Victor Glenn Berry states that William C. Berry walked with his three children from Orange County to Fayette County, Alabama, after Sally Bowles Berry died. This seems highly unlikely to me due to the fact that early settlers generally traveled in groups for safety and convenience. This would have especially been necessary for a young father and three small children, ages 2, 4, and 6.

William Clarence went straight to Fayette County from Orange County, NC, because he knew that is where his family went in 1822. Most all of them were still living there in 1835. Correspondence was slow and there were long periods when no information was shared at all, but I have been surprised over the years to learn that families kept in touch with each other far more than I ever thought possible under those primitive conditions. News and letters were often carried both ways by neighbors, relatives, or just strangers passing through. They also traveled more frequently than I ever imagined. *Wagons South Wagons West*⁵⁹ was written about William Clarence Berry's family life in Fayette County, AL, and as they moved from North Carolina to Alabama and on to Burnet County, Texas, where he died. Victor Glenn Berry was a descendant of William Clarence Berry. Based on all of these facts, I think that William Clarence Berry is Robert Berry Junior's son.

NOTE: Chesterfield Franklin, father of Theodoric Franklin, was living next door to William Clarence Berry in the 1830 Orange County, NC, Census below.

William Berry was living next door to Chesterfield Franklin in 1830. Chesterfield Franklin is Theodoric Franklin's father. Theodoric married Elizabeth Berry, who also went to Alabama at the same time William Clarence Berry joined his father, Robert Berry Jr., there.

William Clarence Berry was born in Orange County, North Carolina, on October 17th, 1803. His first wife was Sally Bowles, who died about 1833 leaving William with three young children. Rufus was the oldest, and he was only 7 years old. William and his three children went to join the rest of his family in Fayette County, Alabama, about 1835.

William C. Berry married Massa Ann Tompkins about 1836 in Alabama. In the spring of 1870, William C. and Massa Berry moved their family to Lampasas, Texas. William Clarence Berry died on September 8th, 1878, and is buried in the Cauble Cemetery in Burnet County, Texas.

George Rufus Berry 1829-1909

George R. Berry was born in Orange County, North Carolina, to William Clarence and Sally Bowles Berry on February 29th, 1829. After his mother died in Orange County, his father moved with his three young children to Fayette County, Alabama, about 1835. William Clarence Berry joined his father and brothers there. George Rufus Berry married Sarah Catherine Farquhar on January 10th, 1848. In 1854, George was granted land in Fayette County, Alabama.




Figure 59: George Rufus Berry, Son of W.C. Berry

At one point, George R. Berry was elected constable for three years in Fayette County at Berry Beat. George took his family to Texas after the Civil War was over. He left Alabama in a wagon train on December 6th, 1867, bound for Texas. George Rufus Berry is the grandson of Robert Berry Jr.

George Rufus Berry served in the confederate army in Company 1 of the 56th Regiment of the Alabama Cavalry. As fate would decree, he was discharged at the end of the Civil War in Greensboro, North Carolina, which is only 58 miles from where he was born. When he returned home, he was traveling to Alabama from North Carolina for the second time in his life.

When I learned of this, I thought that George might have returned to Fiddleton to visit his cousins. George Rufus was born in 1829 and was only 5 or 6 years old when he left Orange County to go to Alabama with his father. I looked up the names of the Berry family who were still living in Orange County in 1870. Only two of George Rufus Berry's father's first cousins were still alive. Nancy Berry and Thomas Person Berry were the only two members of the Berry

family that George might have remembered in Orange County. There is no way to be sure if George R. Berry even remembered where he was born or if he returned there when he had the opportunity.

In 1850, everybody started catching Texas fever. This inspired another rash of migration in America and again our Berry family had no intention of being left out. New frontiers were opening and our Berry family always seemed to be there when it happened. This time was no different than it had been in the past. Look out Texas, here come the Berrys.


In the year 1870, William Clarence Berry and his family left Fayette County, Alabama, for Burnett County, Texas.

George Rufus and Katie Farquhar Berry had 6 children. Sarah E. Berry married William L. Long; Thomas P.P. Berry married Alberta Taylor; John D.D. Berry married Amelia Ann Walk; James H.H. Berry married Minnie O'Hair; George R.R. Berry married Willie Berry and then Mattie F. Butler; William A.A. Berry married S.L. Rogers.

Their youngest son, William Smith Berry (Black Bill), and his two nephews, William A. A. and George R.R. Berry, became cowboys. They drove cattle to Wyoming and Montana. When William A.A. and George R.R. Berry decided to settle down, they made their homes in Montana. George R.R. Berry later went to Compton, California. ⁶⁰

Sarah Catherine "Katie" Farquhar Berry died in Burnet County, Texas, on January 23rd, 1905. Her husband died four years later on December 25th, 1909, in Burnet County, Texas.

One of Robert Junior's younger sons, Thompson P. Berry, was the owner of a cotton gin, a gristmill, a saw-mill, 14 slaves and 6000 acres of land. The town of Berry, Alabama, is named for Thompson P. Berry. In 1974, there were 4 of his great-grandchildren⁶¹ still living in Berry, Alabama. The last surviving granddaughter died Thanksgiving Day, 1973. Mrs. Willard T. Stoddard (Virgie Berry) died at the age of 92.

Robert Jr. and Mary Camp Berry are probably buried here.






Figure 61: Robert Jr. and Mary Camp Berry's graves

In the picture on the right, (**Fig 61**) Ben Henderson (standing on the left of the Berry, Alabama, sign) is a descendant of William Berry and Carolyn Paulson (on the right side of this sign) is a descendant of Robert Berry Jr., who lived the last years of his life right here.

We were staying in Florence, Alabama, to attend the 2008 Robert Berry Sr. reunion at Cypress Inn, Tennessee. (See Thomas Berry, Chapter 9, page 159) Cookie, Bob, Jean, and I came to Alabama a few days early so we could make a trip to Berry, Fayette County, Alabama.

This was an exceptional day in my life and I feel sure Cookie felt the same way. We were in a genealogist gold mine for us and boy, were we digging as hard as we could. Carolyn and Bob returned to Fayette County the next day and located many home sites of Robert Berry Junior's family. They are responsible for the wonderful map in **Fig 48, Pg. 104.**

Thompson Berry remained in Berry, Alabama, and is buried there, but many of his close relatives, including a couple of his brothers, left Alabama and went to Texas.

Several years ago, Thomas Person Berry's great-grandson, Wiley Harold Berry, told me that some of our folks went to Texas. We now know that some of Robert Berry Juniors folks did indeed go to Texas. In addition to Robert Berry Junior's descendants moving to Texas, Thomas Person Berry's half-sister's family also went to Texas. It is likely that Thomas Person Berry's half-sister, Elizabeth Berry Franklin's, children, who migrated to Texas around the time of the Civil War, are responsible for this information. Elizabeth Berry Franklin had returned to Orange County, North Carolina, after their mother died in 1858, and she was listed in Thomas Person Berry's 1860 Census. This story had to be passed down through my Berry family to my uncle, Wiley Harold Berry. Yet he is the only member of my Berry family who I ever heard speak of this. Elizabeth Robinett was the very first Berry cousin I met on the internet and she descends from Elizabeth Berry Franklin.

Here is a picture of some of Robert Berry Jr. and Mary Camp Berry's descendants who live in Texas and Colorado. This is the Willie Howell Berry branch of that family. A member of this Berry line participated in the Berry Y-DNA project.

CHAPTER 5

JOHN BERRY 1762 before-1812

John Berry was probably the third child and second son born to Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry. John was born in Orange County, North Carolina. The first son was named for his father or his paternal grandfather. The second son was named John for his maternal grandfather. It is known that Elizabeth Cate's father was John Cate, and her mother was Margery Lawrence Cate. John Berry was most likely born about 1762 and would have been a grown man by 1782. We know that John was married and had children because Robert Berry Sr. left a slave to the children of John Berry, deceased, in his 1812 will.

John Berry married Martha Stepp on September16th, 1793, in Person County, which is only a few miles north of Fiddleton. Elizabeth Cate was raised near the Flat River, which is in

the same general area. In some Person County records, ⁶² John Berry's name was found misspelled as John Berrey. There are no known Berreys in the Orange or Person County area that I know about. Since this area is so close to where our John Berry was born, it gives me hope that he may be ours. John and Martha apparently died in 1804 leaving five orphan children in Jackson County, Georgia. In the book "Georgia Intestate Records" by Jeannette Holland Austin, there are abstract records from Jackson County, Georgia, ⁶³ that name their five orphan children. The orphans of John and Martha were named the exact same given names as five of our John Berry's sisters and brothers. There is another Berry family claiming this family as theirs. Their Martha Berry was Martha Collier before she married. I think they are in error.

The names of the five orphan children were Robert, Joshua, William, Polly, and Betsy. Polly is a common nickname for Mary, and Betsy is a common nickname for Elizabeth. Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry's son, John Berry, had sisters named Elizabeth and Mary. He also had brothers named Joshua, William, and Robert.

John Berry is known to be deceased at the time his father wrote his will on April 16th, 1812. All of these factors lead me to believe that John Berry, who left the 5 orphan children in Jackson County, Georgia, was the son of Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry.

Four of Mary Berry Camp's children were living in Jackson County, Georgia, on January 14th, 1815. (See Pg. 87).

There was a John Berry who listed in the 1800 Orange County Census but he was over 45 years old, which means he was born before 1755. This John Berry had a large family and was gone from Orange County before the 1810 census was taken. I do not know who this John Berry is, but he was born before Robert Berry and Elizabeth Cate were married.

I have not been able to locate a Census for 1800 in Jackson County, Georgia. I am not sure that one exists, but it sure would help unravel the confusion about our John Berry, if one could be found. Here are some of the facts that substantiate my theory, but they still leave many unanswered questions about the John Berry who died in 1804 in Georgia.

John Camp, Starling Camp, Robert Camp and their sister, Sarah Camp Humphries, signed a power of attorney in **Jackson County**, **Georgia**, attempting to collect their mother's inheritance from Robert Berry's estate in Orange County. The Power of Attorney was delivered in 1816 to Uncle Henry Berry in Orange County, NC. This document states that their mother was the daughter of Robert Berry. I have a copy of this Power of Attorney. (**See transcription on page 87**).

From the book, "Georgia Intestate Records" by Jeanette Holand Austin, "⁶⁴ we find the names Benjamin Camp and William Cates involved with the estate of John Berry who died in 1804. They were also involved with the guardianship of John and Martha's five orphan children.

John's widow, Martha Berry, was issued a citation on May 12th, 1804," to obtain letters of administration Cum Testaments [illegible word] on the Estate of John Berry late of this county Deceased". This was on page 93 of **Jackson County Wills**, Drawer 163, Box 30.

This is the last time Martha Berry is mentioned involving her children. She may have also died shortly after John Berry did.

Page 160: "September 2 1811 ordered that **Benjamin Camp** do come on the first

Monday in October to the next court of Ordinary for the County & make a Statement of the property that he has in his hands of the estate of John Berry deceased and show he has duly paid of the said estate & {word is either advise or assess} the situation of the orphans of Said deceased."

William Cates and **Benjamin Camp** were involved with John Berry's estate and his orphan children. Since our family is so closely associated with the Cate and Camp families in other places, it seems reasonable to believe John Berry is from our family. Martha Berry does not appear in any other records.

"It is further ordered that the said **Benjamin** Camp be appointed guardian of said orphans who were Joshua Berry, Robert Berry, Polly Berry, Betsy Berry, and William Berry he giving bond of security of the law requiring that he to be bound in the sum of one thousand dollars for his performance."

Unfortunately, the first 10 pages of the Jackson County Will book are missing and it is believed that John Berry's will may have been on page 6.

The ages of the three sons of John and Martha Berry are recorded in 1804 as: Joshua age 7, Robert age 6, and William age 2. If Joshua is the oldest son in the family and was 7 years old, he was born 1797. John Berry and Martha Stepp were married in 1793, which may mean the two sisters, Elizabeth and Mary, might be older than the boys. If a couple was married in 1793 and had a child every 2 years, which was typical, then their first baby was probably born in 1793. The following births would have been in 1795, 1797, 1800, and 1802. This is very close to the ages of the children's ages that we know about and their given names probably imply that they Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry's grandchildren. John Berry's death in 1804 is supported by Robert Berry's (OC) 1812 will. John Berry's heirs inherited a slave named Luinda in Robert Berry's 1812 will.

I have no idea who the John Berry was who listed in the 1800 Orange County Census or what happened to him. There have been no other records about this John Berry located in Orange County, North Carolina.

I suspect that our John and Martha Stepp Berry left Person County soon after they were married and migrated to Jackson County, Georgia. Since Mary Berry Camp's children were known to live there in 1815, I think that our John Berry is the one who died in Georgia in 1804.

I don't know if we will ever be completely certain that John Berry who died in Jackson County, Georgia, in 1804 is our John Berry. I do think it is important to include as much information about him as we have available to us. The names of his children and the names of Camp and Cates men who were helping with his estate seem to indicate that John was related to the Orange County, North Carolina, Berry family. I can only hope that we will find a known male descendant of John Berry with a good archival trail in the future. A Y-DNA test could then

establish that he is either related to our family or he is not. Several attempts have been made to locate a male descendant with no success at this time.

Wm Cates, admtr John Berry estate, sued Thomas Camp over notes due John Berry estate from John Peffer [Pepper?] & Wm Jacobs, amounting to \$63. Cates charged Camp "deviously conspired to turn notes to him, "and sought \$130 in damages. Trial, March Term 1807 Court ruled for Defendant [Camp] \$7.25 cost to be recovered from Plaintiff "his cost most wrongfully sustained." As you see from this chapter, John Berry has proven to be the most difficult son of Robert Berry and Elizabeth to identify and locate. Some of these John Berrys listed below may not even be related to our Robert Berry (OC) family

CHAPTER 6

JOSHUA BERRY1766-1838

NOTE: Much of our early research shows William Clarence Berry as the son of Joshua Berry. Our research was in **ERROR** and is explained starting on **page 116.**

Joshua Berry was probably the fourth child of Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry. He was named for his mother's oldest brother, Joshua Cate. I think Joshua was born around 1766 and I know his wife, Nancy Ellison, was born in1775 based on census information taken in 1850. Joshua Berry is one of the three brothers who stayed in Orange County, North Carolina.

The first record of Joshua was when he listed in the first USA Orange County, North Carolina, Census in 1790. George Washington was President of the newly formed United States of America and Alexander Martin was the governor of North Carolina.

The second record found about Joshua Berry was his marriage bond to Nancy Ellison dated January 28th, 1792. Henry Terrell was his bondsman⁶⁶.




Figure 63: Marriage Bond of Joshua Berry and Nancy Ellison

Joshua and Nancy's first son was named Robert Berry for his paternal grandfather. Robert was born about 1792 and remained in Orange County until he died sometime between 1840 and 1850. Joshua and Nancy Berry had a total of 9 children and 7 children remained in North Carolina. James, their 3rd child, removed to Smith County, Tennessee, and Joshua Jr., their 4th child, removed to Gallia County, Ohio. They had a grandson, Ira Berry, and a granddaughter, Nancy E. Berry Wagoner, who removed to Union County, Kentucky, around 1854 (both are children of Lewis and Sally Tolar Berry). After Lewis Berry died in 1858, Sarah Tolar Berry joined her daughter's family in Kentucky.

Children of Joshua and Nancy Ellison Berry

Robert Berry married Sally Cates, and they made their home in Orange County, NC. **Dicey Berry**, born 1798, married Andrew Murdock on December 16th, 1824, and remained in Orange County, North Carolina.

James Berry, who was born around 1799, married Mary around 1829. James removed to Smith County, Tennessee, before 1840. (See Page 137)

Joshua Berry Jr., born April 15, 1801, married Anna Thorpe and was in Ohio in 1820. Joshua died in Benton County, Iowa, on May 18th, 1879.

Delilah Berry, born about 1802, married John Hightower on September 25th, 1827. **Lewis Berry,** born in 1805, married Sally Tolar on October 13th, 1828. After Lewis died, Sally Tolar Berry went to Kentucky to live with her daughter, Nancy E. Berry Wagoner, and her family.

Nancy Berry was born in 1810 and died a spinster in March, 1883.

Charlotte Berry was born in 1813, married William Waggoner Sr. on August 18th, 1837. They lived their lives in Orange County, NC.

Eli Berry was born on October 10th, 1821, and married Judy Betsey Taylor on December 21st, 1846. They lived all of their lives in Orange County, NC.

Joshua Berry Jr. was just 19 years old when he was granted land in Ohio on June 16th. 1820. He was the first child of Joshua and Nancy Ellison Berry to migrate from North Carolina. Joshua may have met his wife in Ohio or in Orange County, North Carolina. Anna Thorpe Berry was born in North Carolina in 1800. It is a fact that Joshua Berry Jr. and a lot of other members of Robert Berry's (OC) family were leaving Orange County at this time. Joshua Junior's older brother, James, probably left the County about eight to ten years later than he did. Joshua Jr. left about the same time his Uncle Robert Berry Jr. and his family departed for Fayette County, Alabama. I suspect that Joshua Berry left shortly before they made their decision, or he might have decided to go to Alabama instead of Ohio. I can never be sure why Joshua took the route he did. Perhaps he had talked to his cousin, George Berry, who may have served in the northwest during his service in the war of 1812. George had returned home and started his family around 1814 at just about the time their grandfather, Robert Berry Sr., (OC) died. When the will was read, Joshua Jr. may have figured that he was not going to be able to obtain any farmland in Orange County, North Carolina. Many other children and grandchildren were facing that reality after Robert Berry (OC) died. A lot of children and grandchildren would hang around until their parents or grandparents died and then strike out for new frontiers.

These examples of our Berry family heading into the opening frontiers as land became available continued for at least the next fifty years or longer. I think Joshua Berry Jr. may have helped other members of his immediate family decide to go west and north. Most of the other members of Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry's family headed south and then west.

Anna Thorpe was born in North Carolina, so is it possible that the Thorpe family joined up with the group of people from Orange County as they traveled to Ohio? Joshua and Anna Thorpe were married in 1820 and established their new farm in Raccoon Township, Gallia County, Ohio, in 1820. They did what so many other young couples always do. They started their family very soon after they were married. Joshua Jr. and Anna Thorpe Berry and their family lived in Gallia, Ohio, for the next 17 years.

James Thorpe in the chart above is very likely Anna Thorpe's brother. Her father was probably dead and the lady who was listed age 60 to 70 living with James was likely James and Anna Thorpe Berry's mother.

After Joshua Berry Jr. and his family removed from Gallia County, Ohio, sometime between 1837and 1839, they located in Indiana. Their first five children were born in Ohio. All seven of the youngest children in the family were born in Indiana

I do not know where the names Cynthia or Harrison came from unless they were named for some members of Anna's family. Their fourth child, Lewis Berry, was named for his Uncle Lewis Berry who married Sally Tolar in Orange County, N.C., on October 13th, 1828. Uncle Lewis was Joshua Berry Junior's next younger brother. Uncle Lewis and Aunt Sally Berry lived in Orange County, North Carolina, until Lewis died in 1858. After Lewis Berry died, Sally Tolar Berry joined her son, Ira Berry, and her daughter, Nancy E. Waggoner, in Kentucky and lived there until she died. (See Fig. 67, Pg. 141)

From studying the names of Joshua and Anna Thorpe Berry's children, it seems that about half of the names must have been passed down from the Thorpe family.

After living in Indiana about 20 years, Joshua Berry Jr. and his family removed to Benton County, Iowa, around 1856. Joshua Berry Jr. lived the rest of his life in Benton County, Iowa, and died there on May 29th, 1879. He is buried at Mt. Pleasant Cemetery in the Canton Township, Benton County, Iowa. At one time there was a head stone at his grave but it now seems to have been removed.

Anna Thorpe Berry was last located in 1880. She was living with her youngest son, Joseph Berry, in Benton County, Iowa, and died around 1887, most likely at his home.

There is a very enlightening report on Joshua and Anna Berry's son, Lewis Berry, recorded on the Sedgwick County, KS, Gen Web site. Wichita, Kansas, is in Sedgwick County, Kansas. On March 20th, 1851, Lewis Berry married Eliza Hayward. Eliza Hayward was born on November 16th, 1833, and was six years younger than Lewis. Lewis had a very excellent reputation as a strong, well built and very healthy man. He was also a very good businessman and made a lot of money in real estate. At one time, he apparently owned twenty building lots in Wichita, Kansas. He also owned a house and two lots in the small town of Goddard, Kansas, just west of Wichita.

The following information was written by Shelley Rusk Hanson. Shelley is a descendant of the Joshua Berry Jr. line. A descendant from this family line has been verified by a Y-DNA test.

"Harrison Berry was born 31 May, 1854, in Benton County, Iowa, to Lewis and Eliza (Hayward) Berry. He was named after his Uncle Harrison Berry, the son of Joshua and Anna (Thorpe) Berry. He was the second child born to Lewis and Eliza who were united in marriage on 18 March, 1851, in Boone County, Indiana. Lewis and Eliza, along with Lewis parents, Joshua and Anna (Thorpe) Berry and Eliza's father (Abijah Haywood) had moved from Indiana to Iowa prior to the birth of Harrison. They all engaged in farming in Benton County, Iowa, Area."

"On 9 August, 1873, Harrison married Henrietta Havens in Linn County, Iowa. Henrietta was the daughter of Ransom and Olive (Usher) Havens. Harrison and Henrietta made their home in Benton County, Iowa, and had three children"

Tragedy struck the family on 14 May, 1878. According to the newspaper article in the Vinton Eagle: "Her husband was cutting a large tree down close to where they lived, when Henrietta attempted to go near where he was to tell him she was going to a neighbor's, having her babe in her arms and a little girl running along with her, when the tree fell, crushing her almost to jelly, while remarkable as it may seem, the baby was still alive, though

probably fatally injured. The little girl, too, narrowly escaped." Rosa Belle did survive, but Henrietta died instantly and Baby Eliza died within three days."

"Harrison and his surviving children, Fred and Rosa Belle, along with Henrietta's parents, moved west to Carroll County, Iowa, sometime prior to 1880. Harrison left for Sedgwick County, Kansas, to join his parents and many of his siblings who had moved to Kansas sometime between 1876 and 1880. Fred and Rosa Belle were raised by their maternal grandparents, Ransom and Olive (Usher) Havens, and their uncle, Charles Havens, in Iowa."

"December 28th, 1881, Harrison married Sarah A. B. Hammon in Wichita, Sedgwick County, Kansas. Sarah was the daughter of Nic and Mary Hammon (dec.). Harrison worked for the railroad as a watchman and freight checker and remained in the Wichita area until at least 1889. It is unknown if Harrison and Sarah had any children or what became of Sarah. By 1899, Harrison was living in Pueblo, Pueblo County, Colorado, and was a teamster for Pueblo Transfer & Storage Company."

"In February 1900 Harrison married Eveline C. Searls in Pueblo County, Colorado. Eveline was the daughter of Oliver and Lucinda Searls. On January 29th, 1934, Harrison died in Pueblo, Pueblo County, Colorado of arteriosclerosis. He is buried in the Odd Fellows Cemetery."

"Frederick M. Berry was born February 28th, 1874, in Palo, Linn County, Iowa to Harrison and Henrietta (Havens) Berry. When Fred was four years old in 1878 his mother, Henrietta, was killed by a falling tree.

"On April 9th, 1898, Fred married Bertha May Butrick in Glidden Township, Carroll County, Iowa. Bertha was the daughter of Francis Marion and Margaret (Whippie) Butrick.

Fred and Bertha had the following children:

Ethel V. Berry born 1902 Iowa, died May 1985Iowa. Lillian G. Berry born 1905 Iowa, died November 1991 Iowa.

Fred Harrison Berry born 1907 Iowa, died May 1983 Iowa.

On July 13th, 1913, Fred married Sarah Ann (Miner) Kelley in Lake City, Calhoun, Iowa. Sarah's parents and five of Sarah's siblings had died tragically in a house fire in April, 1910, in Ponca, Nebraska."




Figure 65: Fred and Sarah Berry 1925

"Fred, Sarah and children moved from Iowa to Wisconsin some time between 1916 and 1920. Fred was a farmer in Barron and Polk County, Wisconsin, areas.

On the 2nd of October, 1951, Fred died in Amery, Polk County, Wisconsin, of carcinoma of the lung. He is buried in Mt. Hope Cemetery, Tuttle Lake, Wisconsin." Census Information for Frederick M. Berry:

This family line continued to move west as far as California and at least one of the family was a gold miner at Pikes Peak, Colorado, for a time. Berry Train Station, Colorado, is named for this family line. In addition to having an excellent archival trail compiled by Shelly Rusk Hanson, one of Joshua and Anna Thorpe Berry's descendants has also been verified by Y-DNA.

James Berry, Smith County, Tennessee.

Joshua and Nancy Ellison Berry's son, James Berry, was born in Orange County, NC. James Berry was 30 years old when he married Mary (unknown last name) in 1829. Their first daughter, Nancy Berry, was born in North Carolina in 1830. The second daughter, Delilah Berry, was born in North Carolina in 1836. Their third and last daughter to be born in North Carolina was named Mary Berry. Mary was born in 1839. Their first son, James Jr., was born in Smith County, Tennessee, in 1840. He was named for his father. Martha Berry was born in Tennessee about 1841 and their last son, Clay Berry, was born in 1844. Edward Berry, a school teacher, was living with the family in the 1850 Smith County, Tennessee, Census.

James Berry was listed in Smith County, Tennessee, census for the first time in 1840. The ages and names of the family were determined from this 1850 Census. James Berry was able to get a 640 acre land grant in Tennessee because of his grandfather, Robert Berry's (OC), service in the Revolutionary War. Smith County, Tennessee, is almost due West of Orange County, North Carolina, and today it is 459 miles from Hillsborough by way of I-40.

Since we have not been able to locate any living descendants of James and Mary Berry, our information on their lives is very scarce. There are four facts that make me believe that James Berry is the son of Joshua and Nancy Ellison Berry from Orange County, North Carolina.

The three oldest children were born in North Carolina.

James Berry had sisters named Nancy Berry and Delilah Berry

James Berry's mother was also named Nancy.

James and his wife Mary were both born in North Carolina

Ira Berry and his sister, Nancy Berry Waggoner.

Lewis and Sally Tolar Berry's son, Ira Berry, and their daughter, Nancy E. Berry Waggoner, were living in Orange County, North Carolina in 1850.

Ira Berry was 17 years old in the 1850 Orange County Census on **page 140**. Ira was enumerated living with Eli Berry and his young family. James Waggoner and Nancy E Berry Waggoner were living next door. Nancy E. Berry Waggoner was 21 in 1850. James and Nancy Waggoner were married on June 19th, 1849, and in the 1850 Orange County Census, they had a 2 month old son named John. I was unable to identify Ira Berry's parents and they were a mystery to me for many years. In 1850, Eli Berry was only 27 years old and too young to be Ira's father. I thought that Ira had to be a grandson of Joshua and Nancy Berry because of his age. I knew that Nancy E. Berry Waggoner was Lewis and Sally Tolar Berry's daughter, but it did not occur to me that Ira Berry was their son. Ira Berry disappeared from Orange County, North Carolina, before 1860 and I had no idea where he went. In 1858, Lewis Berry died from the flu in a worldwide epidemic. Sally Tolar Berry also did not show up in the 1860 Orange County, North Carolina, census. James Waggoner and Nancy E. Berry Waggoner and their son were also missing in 1860. James Waggoner and Ira Berry may have decided to go to the west in an attempt to avoid the upcoming war. This may not be the reason they made this decision.

It was not until I learned that the actor, Ken Berry, is a member of our Berry family and that Ira Berry was living in Kentucky in 1850 that the pieces of the puzzle began to fall into place. Ken Berry is noted for his acting in "F-Troup", "Mama's Family", and "Mayberry RFD", in the heyday of television sitcoms.

After locating Ira Berry in the 1860 Morganfield, Union County, Kentucky, census, I saw that Ira and his sister were living next door to each other. I also noticed that a Sarah Berry, age 65, was also living next door with Ira's sister and her family. (Fig. 67, Pg. 141) In the 1860 census Ira and his new wife, Nancy Wynn Berry, had a 4 year old son named Franklin Berry, who was born in Kentucky. This information lets me know that Ira and his sister's family must have left North Carolina about 1855. Nancy and James Waggoner also had a 4 year old daughter who was born in Kentucky.

I think Ira and Nancy E. Berry Waggoner stopped in Smith County, Tennessee, to visit their Uncle James and Aunt Mary Berry. I think that Ira Berry was single when he arrived at his uncle's farm. Nancy Wynn, Ira Berry's new wife, was born in Robertson County, Tennessee, and very likely Ira met and married her while he was living with his uncle or as he and the Waggoner family were making their way to Union County, Kentucky. From Carthage in Smith County, Tennessee, to Springfield in Robertson County, Tennessee, is only 84 miles. From Springfield, Tennessee, to Union County, Kentucky, is 142 miles. This is the route you could travel today if you were going from Carthage, Tennessee, to Morganfield, Union County, Kentucky.

Ira and Nancy Wynn Berry are Ken Berry's 2nd great-grandparents. In the 1860 Kentucky Census, Nancy and James Waggoner's oldest son, John, was now 10 years old. They also had three daughters: Nancy Waggoner, age 4; Eliza Waggoner, age 2; and Lucy Waggoner, who was six months old.

Ira and Nancy Wynn Berry had three children in 1860. Their names were Franklin Berry, age 4; Thomas Berry, age 3; and Edward Berry, age 1. All of these children were born in Kentucky.

The name Edward Berry **on Page 137** brings up a question that is unanswered at this time. Ira's uncle, James Berry, in the 1850 Smith County, Tennessee, Census, had a school teacher living with him by the name of Edward Berry from Virginia. Is Edward Berry somehow related to James Berry and our Berry family? I have no further information about Edward Berry.

Ira was 23 years old and his wife Nancy was 21 years old when their first son, Franklin Pierce Berry, was born in Kentucky in 1855. Franklin Pierce Berry⁶⁹ was 23 years old when he

married Sophie Sellers in 1878. (See their Pictures on page 142) Franklin and Sophie are Ken-Berry's great-grandparents. Their first child was Theodore Guest Berry, who was born in 1878 in Kentucky. Theodore Guest Berry registered at the Williamson County, Illinois, Draft Board in World War I 1917-1918. He was 39 years old and he was born on November 30th, 1878. He was described as medium height and medium build with dark hair. His occupation was listed as coal miner. Odo Berry, as Theodore was called, married Verdin (Verda) Hall about 1903 and they had four children listed in the 1910 Williamson County, Illinois, Census. Odo and Verda were Ken's grandparents. Their youngest son, Darrell Berry, was one year old in that 1910 census. Darrell was 11 years old in his parent's 1920 census. In 1930, Darrell and his new wife, Bernice Larson, were living with her parents, George E Larson, age 45, and Ida M. Larson, age 40. George Larson stated in the 1830 census that both of his parents and his wife's parents were born in Sweden. Darrell and Bernice are Ken Berry's parents.

Ken Berry can trace his family back in America long before the Declaration of Independence was signed. His 5th great-grandfather, Robert Berry (OC), married Elizabeth Cate in 1758 in Orange County, North Carolina. Robert Berry (OC) was in North Carolina as early as 1751. This was 25 years before the United States of America was founded. Robert Berry (OC) built his plantation home in 1766, 10 years before the Declaration of Independence.

Our current research indicates that Robert Berry (OC) in Orange County was actually born in Princess Anne County, Virginia, in 1729.

Robert Berry's (OC) maternal line goes back to Ann Foster, who married Roger Williamson about 1640 in South Norfolk County, Virginia. Ann Foster was born in England in 1620. All of our archival research back to Robert Berry in Orange County, North Carolina, has been validated with Y-DNA.

A List of Ken Berry's ancestors:

Robert Berry (PAC) married Mary Williamson in Princess Anne County, Virginia. Robert Berry (OC) married Elizabeth Cate in Orange County, North Carolina. Joshua Berry married Nancy Ellison in Orange County, North Carolina. Lewis Berry married Sally/Sarah Tolar in Orange County, North Carolina. Ira Berry married Nancy Wynn/Winn in Tennessee. I transcribed the Joshua Berry deed on August 25th, 2009, from a copy of the original. The description of the property that Robert Berry (OC) sold his son, Joshua, amounted to about half of the 1757 original Granville Land Grant. There is a slight difference of five chains noted on the west boundary of Robert Berry's property and the deed he made to Joshua. This transfer of property took place in 1811 on February 24th (Deed Book 14 Page 57). The west boundary on the Granville Grant was 40 chains and on Joshua's deed it was 45 chains. This can easily be explained by the fact that Robert Berry acquired the Patrick Rutherford property, which joined his southern boundary, in 1787. Patrick Rutherford had died and his three sons sold the property to Robert Berry on March 2, 1787, (Deed book 4 Page 518) Orange County, North Carolina. In 1811 Robert could have made the western boundary any length he wanted up to about 90 chains.

Below is an application that Eli D. Berry submitted to the county in order to serve as administrator of his cousin Nancy Berry's estate. Nancy had inherited her estate when her mother, Nancy Ellison Berry, died sometime before 1860. Joshua and Nancy Ellison Berry's spinster daughter, Nancy Berry, died in March, 1883. Nancy's brother, Eli Berry, was still alive but Eli may have known that his son, Eli D. Berry, was better qualified to manage the duties of an administrator. Eli D.Berry was only 21 years old at the time.

A list of the heirs is listed here: Dicy Murdock, heirs of Charlotte Waggoner, heirs of Lewis Berry, Joshua X. Berry, heirs of Nancy Ellison Waggoner, heirs of Rachel Neal, heirs of Sarah Jones.

You can see from the X over "heirs of Joshua Berry" that Eli D. Berry did not know how to locate his heirs. Rachael Neal and Sarah Jones were Robert and Sally Cates Berry's two girls. Rachael Berry and Sarah Berry can be found with their mother in the 1850 Orange County Census. Sally Cates Berry was born in 1798, Sarah Berry was born in 1836, and Rachael Berry was born in 1839. I have no marriage records for either girl and no idea where they were living in 1883. You can also see that no reference was made to **William Clarence Berry** in this document. This is further evidence that William Clarence Berry was not Joshua and Nancy Ellison Berry's son. Even though Joshua Berry Jr.'s heirs were living in other states, they were still listed on this statement.

I think that there was a great financial depression in the late 1820's and early 1830's. Joshua Berry must have had some money problems because he borrowed money and used his property as collateral. He ended up having to forfeit his property because he could not repay his loan. (Dead of Trust bk. 23 pg. 126 Orange County NC).

I know that President Andrew Jackson closed the Federal Reserve Bank illegally after he came into office on March 4th, 1829. Times were hard in the late 1820's and money was very scarce. It is possible that Joshua Berry got in debt over his head because of the economy.

Regardless of the reason, Joshua had borrowed money against his property that he could not pay back, which is obvious from the transcribed Deed of Trust below.

After the 1830 census was taken, there is only one more record about Joshua that I have located. There was an article about his death in 1838 in the local newspaper. "Joshua Berry was murdered in a grog-shop by Martin Armstrong who had been drinking heavily and was refused more liquor by Joshua, the owner of the shop.

Martin Armstrong seized Joshua and threw him over the railing of the piazza, which broke his neck/back. Armstrong immediately made his escape. He was last seen heading east on the Raleigh Road."

This article was in the Hillsborough Recorder on Wed,. 10th Oct., 1838. "The murder was Monday last." The prior Monday was October 8th, 1838.

Joshua's widow, Nancy Berry, inherited their property and her unmarried daughter, Nancy Berry, lived with her until Nancy Ellison Berry died sometime between 1850 and 1860. Joshua's widow, Nancy, listed as age 75 in 1850. Her daughter Nancy was listed as age 40 in that census. Nancy's son, Lewis Berry, died in 1858 in the worldwide flu epidemic. There were three of our Berry relatives who died that same year. My 3rd great-grandmother, Hannah Cate Berry, was one of them. Joshua Berry's wife, Nancy Ellison Berry, may also have been a flu victim. Their spinster daughter inherited Nancy's property when her mother died.

Joshua Berry listed in every Orange County, North Carolina, Census from 1790 to 1830. On February 24th, 1811, Robert Berry Sr. (OC) sold the western half of his Granville Land Grant to Joshua Berry for the sum of \$100 (Orange County Deed book 14 Page 57). Joshua's father started disposing of his land in 1800. I suppose he was in failing health because on April 16th, 1812, Robert Berry (OC) wrote his will. James Berry, Joshua's son who later went to Smith County, Tennessee, was a witness on the deed that Robert made to Joshua. The other witness was Charles Holeman, who was married to the daughter of Joshua Cate and was a neighbor of our Robert Berry family. The deed was registered in the February Term of Court, 1812. As far as I know, there was no dwelling on this tract of land. Some of the descendants of Joshua's brother, William Berry, own some of that same property today. Joshua's nephew, Thomas Person Berry, built a home on this same tract of property in 1852.



Patricia Murdock Hutchings 1928 to 2006

Patricia Murdock was married to Philip Wiley Hutchings on November 26th, 1949. They made their home in Durham, North Carolina, but I met Pat through Nellie Berry, who lives in Alabama.

Pat was a descendant of Andrew Murdock and Dicey Berry. Dicey Berry was the daughter of Joshua and Nancy Ellison Berry.

Pat was accepted into the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) through Joshua



Berry and his mother, Elizabeth Cate. I have a copy of the family group sheets Pat did on the Andrew Murdock and Dicey Berry family line. Pat was a great researcher and, like me, both sides of her family were in Orange County, North Carolina, since the 1750's. The same was also true of her husband. Because of this, she said "I am a researcher of family lines, not a genealogist. She said genealogy is too complicated. Pat attended our 2002 Wiley P. and Ida Ann Wilson Berry Reunion for the first and only time in 2002. This picture was taken at the Schley Grange Hall.

CHAPTER 7

ISAAC BERRY-1768-1830 to 1840

Isaac Berry was probably born about 1768. He was the fifth child of Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry. I have no idea where the name Isaac Berry came from in the naming sequence of their children. I have noticed that the 5th child in several of our Berry families were biblical names. Robert may have had an uncle or a distant grandfather named Isaac. The name Isaac was later used in several branches of the family. Isaac was the only biblical name used in naming any of Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry's sons. I guess Joshua is a biblical name, but in this case Elizabeth Cate Berry had a brother named Joshua Cate. All of the other sons were named for Kings or other known family members in the Berry and Cate families.

Robert Berry referred to his son, Isaac Berry's, condition as not being of proper reason. No official records about Isaac are recorded in Orange County. I know that Isaac Berry lived with his father until he died and then he lived with his brother, Henry Berry, for the rest of his life

It is obvious that Robert Berry went to great detail to make Isaac's future secure. Here is an excerpt from Robert Berry's April 16th, 1812, will about his concern for his son.

"I will and bequeath to my son Isaac Berry one Negro woman named Lydia also one horse to the value of thirty dollars and two cows and calves. This my son Isaac Berry's legacy to be left in the care of my son Henry Berry so as for the aforesaid Isaac to have the benefit of it but not so he can sell or dispose of it without Henry's approbation. Also this my son Isaac Berry's legacy at his death to be divided among my heirs equally provided he has no heirs born after this will is wrote. Also this son Isaac Berry's legacy to be given to him for to be at his own disposal if he becomes to his proper reason. If he does not come to his right reason to be kept as above mentioned"

Condition to be met for Henry Berry to inherit his father's property:

"Provided he gives to my son Isaac Berry one Hundred Dollars, Fifty to be paid one year after his mother's death and the other Fifty in two years after his mother's death."

Isaac was probably 44 years old in 1812 when his father wrote that will.

Isaac Berry died sometime after 1840 and before the 1850 census was taken in Orange County, North Carolina.

The only legal document concerning Isaac Berry that I have ever seen is his father's will. There are no other records about Isaac Berry recorded anywhere concerning marriage, land, deeds, will, or any type of court record. I think this indicates that Isaac Berry was never able to function on his own as an adult member of society.

. Isaac Berry was living with his brother, Henry Berry, in 1830. Isaac Berry was not listed in Henry Berry's 1840 Orange County Census.

In 1840, Lydia Berry listed as head of household in the Orange County Census. Lydia was between 30 and 40 years old and had a young daughter under 10. Felix Wilson was living between Lydia Berry and Henry Berry. Felix Wilson was living on land he bought from William and Person Berry in 1833.

In 1850, Liddy (Lydia) Berry was living with Joshua Cate in Person County. We find that Lydia's daughter was named Mary Ann Berry and her age was 18 in that census. This means

that Mary Ann Berry was born in 1832. Was she Isaac Berry's daughter or granddaughter?

Although we have no record of a marriage for Isaac Berry, this evidence now indicates that Lydia Berry may have been Isaac's daughter, his wife, or common-law wife.

Isaac Berry was 64 years old when Mary Ann Berry was born and he was 47 when Lydia Berry was born in 1815. Lydia Berry would have been 17 years old when Mary Ann Berry was born in 1832.

Isaac Berry's daughter or granddaughter:

Mary Ann Berry was born in 1832 and died after 1900. She married Samuel Hunley in Person County, NC.

Because Isaac Berry died between 1830 and 1840 and Lydia Berry listed as head of household for the only time she ever listed in Orange County, I think that Lydia Berry is Isaac's daughter and Mary Berry is his granddaughter. There is no way to tell when Lydia and Mary Ann Berry went to Person County to live with Joshua Cates.

(See Chapter 11, Henry Berry, on Page 189 for more details).

CHAPTER 8

ELIZABETH BERRY 1770-1816

Elizabeth Berry was the sixth child and only other daughter of Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry. I think she was named for her mother, Elizabeth, because her maternal grandmother was named Margery Lawrence Cate. This could also mean that Margery Lawrence Cates's mother was named Elizabeth. Margery Lawrence Cates also had a daughter named Margery. Elizabeth Berry was born about 1770 and was probably the third baby to be born in the new plantation house at Fiddleton. The Plantation home had been built in 1766 and that date is scratched into the mortar between the stones on the back side of the 243 year old chimney that is still standing today. (See Page 77).

There was financial turmoil in Orange County in the form of some corruption in the local government. The Regulator movement was developing in Orange and surrounding counties when Elizabeth was born. I feel that Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry were stable financially and were able to pay the taxes that were assessed. I also think that the local sheriff may not have treated the Robert Berry family as they did a lot of less prosperous farmers in the area. This being said, I do not know if Robert Berry was involved in the Regulator Movement. Many local farmers did come to the aid of the less fortunate farmers in the area.

All of the political problems probably had very little to do with Elizabeth Berry's young childhood. The family had some slaves and the plantation was most likely being run very well. I would guess Elizabeth Berry's four older brothers and her sister Mary were loving and very protective of her.

Elizabeth Berry was 11 years old when her father went off to join the North Carolina Continental Line and when the battle was fought at Guilford Courthouse. These years of war created a very different life for Robert Berry's (OC) family. The hardships were thrust on Elizabeth Cate Berry and her children. Mary Berry had married George Waggoner a couple of years earlier and I think he was serving in the North Carolina Continental Army, too. Mary had a couple of small stepdaughters by George who may have been staying with Mary's family at Fiddleton. There must have been a lot of concern as the British Army, led by Charles Cornwallis, was approaching the Hillsborough area from South Carolina. After the battle at Guilford Courthouse, Mary Berry Waggoner's husband, George Waggoner, was back home, severely wounded, and most likely only survived a few weeks before he died in the summer of 1781. By November, 1781, Robert Berry (OC) had returned home and the War, for all practical purposes, was over. General Cornwallis had surrendered at Yorktown and Robert Berry and Mary Waggoner were taking care of George Waggoner's estate. Mary remarried sometime in the fall of 1781 and when she signed the final papers on George Waggoner's Estate Settlement in February, 1782, she signed her name as Mary Kemp. Mary was also named in her father's will as Mary Kemp.

Mary left home and removed to Rutherfordton, North Carolina. Elizabeth Berry was now the only daughter living at home. We know very little about Elizabeth Berry's teen-age years. Elizabeth Berry was about 21 years old when we find some documentation on her life. She became pregnant by William Riley and Elizabeth filed charges against him on August 20th, 1791. Her daughter, Mary Berry, was probably born later that year or early in 1792.




Figure 74: Bastardy bond on William Riley for Elizabeth Berry.

A letter to William Riley from the court describing the charges brought against him and ordering him to appear before any two justices of the county on August 19th, 1791.




Figure 75: Letter from the court 19th Aug, 1791, about William Riley

Elizabeth Berry's daughter, Mary Berry, was probably born at Fiddleton. Elizabeth Berry and her daughter, Mary, lived with Elizabeth Berry's parents until Mary got married. Mary Berry married Thomas Berry on March 7th, 1809. Mary Berry was 17 or 18 years old when she married. Mary's uncle, Henry Berry, was the bondsman on Mary Berry and Thomas Berry's wedding bond. Thomas Berry may have been a first or second cousin, and this is a case where a Berry married a Berry who was a relative.

There is another case like this that occurred in our family years later. John Saunders Berry (Joshua Line) married Emma G. Berry (William Line) on October 15th, 1884. My mother

always told me that John Saunders Berry was from another Berry family and was not related to our Berrys. They were really 2nd cousins once removed. It is hard to believe that somebody in one of the families didn't know that they were related.

Once again Robert Berry (OC) showed how much he loved his family when he allowed Elizabeth and her illegitimate daughter to live at Fiddleton with the family. In those days, many unwed daughters were not allowed to bring their children born out of wedlock back home. Elizabeth Berry's mother, Elizabeth Cate Berry, may also deserve a lot of the credit in this matter. Robert Berry did demonstrate his compassion for Elizabeth's situation when he left her a slave with instructions concerning her daughter, Mary Berry. In his April 16th, 1812, will, Robert Berry specified that Elizabeth should inherit a slave named "Doll and any increase, be left to her daughter Mary upon Elizabeth's death".

Thomas and Mary B. Berry moved to Person County after they were married and were living there when the 1810 Person County Census was taken. (See Fig. 44, Pg. 100) I think Mary's mother, Elizabeth Berry, moved in with them after Thomas and Mary married. Elizabeth Berry died in 1815. (See Figure 77 & 79 this page.)




Figure 80: Second page of letter from Auburn, Alabama.

Josiah Berry must have gone to Alabama because, many years later, Obadiah Echols wrote a letter from Auburn, Alabama, back to Orange County concerning Thomas and Mary Berry's orphan grandson, Preston Berry. Obadiah Echols wrote to Orange County twice trying to get a copy of Elizabeth Berry's will. The problem was that Elizabeth Berry's will was probated in Person County, so Obadiah Echols probably never received a second copy he requested. (See Figure 79 & 80 on Pages 157 & 158)

This letter was inquiring about the slave named Doll that Robert Berry left his daughter, Elizabeth Berry, in 1814. I have located a man named Joseph C. Berry, who married Virginia F. Echols in Macon County, Alabama, in 1840. I do not know what connection this couple had with Elisabeth Berry's grandson, Preston Berry, but Auburn, Alabama, is in Macon County. I would think there is a good chance that Virginia F. Echols may be related to Obadiah Echols. Joseph C. Berry may be related to our Berry family but I have no other information about him at this time.

CHAPTER 9

THOMAS BERRY 1772 Before 1812

It is almost impossible to write about Thomas Berry without writing about his younger brother, William Berry, at the same time. The two brothers were involved in so many of life's endeavors together.

The Cate family is a central point in both brothers' lives. Thomas and William Berry married two of the three daughters of William and Elizabeth Messer Smith Cate. A case of two brothers who married two sisters. This was not at all uncommon in the early days of our nation. William Berry married Hannah Cate first and Thomas married Sarah Cate a year later: It gets a lot more complicated from here.

John and Marjory Cate are the parents of Elizabeth. Benjamin Cate is John's brother. William Cate is the son of Benjamin Cate and a first cousin to Elizabeth Cate Berry. William Cate married Elizabeth Messer Smith and they had 5 children.

Benjamin Cate

John Cate.

Hannah Cate. 1770 to 1858.

Sarah Cate. Dec. 27th, 1781, to March 7th, 1875.

Charity Cate.

William Berry married his second cousin, Hannah Cate, on August 12th, 1799. Thomas Berry married his second cousin, Sarah Cate, on August 11th, 1800. Both couples listed as head of household for the first time in the 1800 Orange County Census. Each couple listed one son under 5 in their enumeration.

Thomas Berry was the 7th child of Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry and I think he was born around 1772. William was the 9th child and born in 1775. William and Thomas were probably close as they grew up. Since the two brothers married two sisters, their families would have continued to be very close.

Thomas and Sarah Cate Berry had two known children, a daughter named Eleanor and a son named David. These two children removed to Tennessee in 1814 with their mother, Sarah, after Thomas was killed by Indians in Tennessee.

Thomas and Sara's two children were David, born in 1802, and Eleanor, born in 1801. This leaves an unknown son that Thomas and Sarah Cate Berry listed in 1800.

William and Hannah listed one male under 10 in 1800. William and Hannah Cate Berry had another son, Thomas Person Berry, born June 1st, 1808. It is now believed that Robert C. Berry who was born on the 14th of April, 1805, may also be their son. This would still leave the son who was born before 1800 unaccounted for.

When Hannah (Cate) Berry listed as head of household in the 1810 census, she listed four males under ten. **See Fig.81**, **Pg. 160**. There should have been 5 boys in this listing, but one son may have died.

If we believe that David was born in 1802 and had a 2 or 3 year old brother, then Thomas and Sarah would have had three children instead of two.

Since William and Hannah listed an unknown son in 1800, Robert C. Berry and Thomas Person Berry would have had a 10 year old brother. William and Hannah would have had three sons and there should have been a total of five males under 10 listed by Hannah in her 1810 census.

We do not know the two unknown boys' names listed in the 1800 enumeration. Recent Y-DNA information establishes that Robert Berry (OC) had a grandson named Robert C. Berry but his father is unknown. I think he may be the son of William and Hannah Berry.

The fact that Hannah Cate Berry and Sarah Cate Berry were living together in 1810 was brought to my attention in 2005 by Nell Berry. She and John Allen Berry have done an outstanding job with the research of the Thomas Berry family in Cypress Inn, Tennessee.

In the 1810 Orange County Census, Hannah Cate Berry listed as head of household. Since she was living on the next plantation to Robert Berry (OC), I think Hannah and Sarah were living in the old Patrick Rutherford plantation house. Robert Berry (OC) purchased this property on March 2nd, 1787. (Deed Book 4 Page 518 Orange County NC)

William and Hannah Berry may have been living in this house since they were first married. It is not known if Thomas and Sarah were living on the property he sold to John Miller on October 4th, 1806, but if they had been living there, Thomas and Sarah may have moved in with William and Hannah after Thomas sold his two hundred acres.

Robert Berry (OC) sold 200 acres to William Armstrong on October 14th, 1800, Deed Bk. 13 Page 330. I know that William Armstrong bought most of Robert Berry's (OC) 1780 North Carolina Grant. This property lies east of the Fiddleton plantation. By looking at the list of names on the 1810 census, **Fig 81**, I can see that the census taker may have been traveling north from Hillsborough. Since the census taker reached Hannah Berry's dwelling before he arrived at Robert Berry's, it would mean Hannah and Sarah were living in a house that was south of his Fiddleton Plantation. This is exactly where the Patrick Rutherford property was located. (See Fig 13, Pg. 50) It would also mean that the two Rountree families were living on the next plantations south of the old Rutherford property. William Stagg was living south of Joseph Rountree.

Robert Berry sold 200 acres of property to William Stagg for 150 pounds on February 7th,

1807 (Deed Bk: 39 Pg: 396). William Stagg married Uley Waggoner on January 22nd, 1805. Jacob Waggoner was their bondsman. Uley Waggoner is Judith Waggoner's younger sister. Judith married Peter Aldridge in 1786. The land that Robert Berry sold to William Stagg was the same land he bought from John McCulloch on August 13th, 1785, for 25 pounds, 4 shillings, Proclamation money.

If the path of the census taker is as I have described, then Thomas Berry, William Berry, and their families may have been living in the Patrick Rutherford house before the two brothers left to explore the west. The two Cate sisters, Hannah Cate Berry and Sarah Cate Berry, with their children remained there while their husbands were searching for land in Tennessee.

After seeing that their father was selling off some of his property, Thomas and William may have seen the handwriting on the wall. This action by their father may have caused them to realize that they would not inherit any land in Orange County, North Carolina. Robert Berry (OC) may have even told them that he was not planning to leave any land to them.

Hannah and William Berry had a son, Thomas Person Berry, who was born on June 1st, 1808. This means that William Berry was still in Orange County nine months earlier around September 1st, 1807. No matter what caused Thomas and William to decide to search for new land in the west, they probably left for Tennessee in the early spring of 1808.

Thomas sold 200 acres of land to James Miller on October 4th, 1806. This land lay on waters of the Little River and Flat River, according to the Indenture made in Orange County, North Carolina. The timing of this sale is very important because it looks like Thomas was preparing to leave Orange County, North Carolina, and stake a claim for a new homestead in Tennessee.

Thomas and William Berry's father-in-law, William Cate, died around 1802. An inventory sale for his estate was held and the account of that sale was delivered to the August Term of Court in 1803.






Figure 82: Estate sale of William Cate 1803. Many Berry's purchased items.

On **Page 163, Fig. 82,** you will see all of the purchases made by the Robert Berry family at William Cate's Estate Sale. You can also see purchases made by his son, John Cate, and William's wife, Elizabeth Messer Smith Cate. Elizabeth M. Cate is Sarah and Hannah Cate's mother. Pictures of antique items bought at this sale can be seen on **pages 164,165, and 166**.

Robert Berry Senior's wife, Elizabeth Cate Berry, paid 6 Schillings for one Keeler at William Cate's Estate sale. Members of the Robert Berry (OC) family made 23 purchases. Elizabeth M. Cate and her son, John Cate, made 31 purchases. Thomas Berry made 5 purchases and William Berry made 8. Thomas Berry purchased a pair of cards for 2 Shillings 1 Pence. The interesting thing about this is that many years later John Allen Berry, a descendant of Thomas and Sarah Berry, bought a pair of wool or cotton cards at an estate sale of one of Eleanor Reed's descendants in Cypress Inn, Tennessee.

This pair of cards came down through Eleanor Reed Berry's line. There is a good reason to believe these may be the same cards that Thomas bought at his father-in-law's estate sale in 1803. The estate sale of William Cate reads like a Who's Who of the Robert Berry (OC) family: Joshua Berry, Robert Berry Senior, Elizabeth Berry, William Berry, Thomas Berry, and Robert Berry Jr. each bought items at this sale. The items were paid for in Pounds, Schillings and Pence. It is very interesting that they were still using English money in 1803. It had been 27 years since the declaration of Independence was signed and 22 years after the end of the Revolutionary War.

Eleanor Berry Reed's husband, John Reed, was either gone or dead before 1840. Eleanor listed as head of household in the 1840 Census.

The Dwelling numbers are 1042 -1049. As you can see by the dwelling numbers, David Berry, Eleanor Reed, and their children lived very close to each other in 1850. Even If their homes were not close, there were no neighbors living between them.

NOTE: David Berry and his wife, Elizabeth Shipman, are listed with some of their children in the 1850 Wayne County, Tennessee, census. On page 10 from the book written by Nellie Berry, "JAMES E. & ESSIE DAVIS BERRY Ancestors, Descendants & Kinfolks", we learn that Elizabeth Shipman was born in 1809. Her parents were Jacob Shipman and Rebecca Pigg. We also learn that Elizabeth Shipman's sister, Rachel Shipman, married Peter Martin in 1827. Peter Martin was granted land in Fayette County, Alabama, on September 20th, 1839. See on page 288.

You should also remember that Sarah Cate Berry married John Pigg in Tennessee.



Stephen Smith was a witness on another deed from Sarah Cate Berry Pigg to her brother. John Cate, in Maury County, Tennessee, in 1828. There is a folk legend that has been passed down through the past generations of Thomas Berry's descendants to those who now live in Tennessee. As the story goes, Thomas Berry was killed by Indians while he was searching for land to homestead in Tennessee. It is my belief that his brother, William Berry, was also there with him but somehow escaped Thomas Berry's fate. William returned home and reported his brother's death to the family and his father. Robert Berry Sr. (OC) definitely knew that his son, Thomas Berry, was deceased when he wrote his will on April 16, 1812. Robert Berry (OC) left a slave girl named Mariah to Thomas Berry's children in that will. I do not know what happened to their slave. They may have sold Mariah to someone in the family, because I have not found a public record about a sale of a slave by Sarah Cate Berry.

Sarah Cate Berry and her two children, David Berry and Eleanor Berry, removed to Cypress Inn, Tennessee, where many of their descendants still live today. She was married in Tennessee for the second time in 1815 to John Pigg.

After finding a William Berry and his son, Benjamin Berry, living in Tennessee in 1850, it seems logical that William Berry and his son may have returned to Tennessee with Sarah, David, and Eleanor Berry in 1814. William Berry was living with his son, Benjamin Berry, in Lincoln County, Tennessee, in 1850. There are two counties between Lincoln County and Wayne County, Tennessee, where Sarah Berry Pigg homesteaded with her new husband, John Pigg. William and Hannah's first son could have been named for his paternal grandfather, Robert Berry, and their second son may have been named for his maternal great-grandfather, Benjamin Cate. Hannah had a brother and a grandfather named Benjamin Cate.

William Berry in Lincoln County, Tennessee, is the exact right age to be my William Berry. In the 1850 Census of Lincoln County, Tennessee, we find that William Berry is 76 years old living with his wife, Mary, in his son Benjamin's home. William Berry, his wife Mary and

his son Benjamin Berry, age 44, were all born in North Carolina. Lincoln County is 60 miles east of Wayne County, Tennessee, and both counties are on the Tennessee-Alabama line. Benjamin Berry in Tennessee and Robert C. Berry in Fayette County, Alabama, may be the two unnamed boys in Hannah Cate's 1810 Orange County census. (**Fig82, Pg. 160**) The ages of these two boys are not the ages that I would expect, but age data is often wrong on census forms.

How Sarah Cate Berry knew where to locate the land her husband, Thomas Berry, had claimed and how she and her children were able to migrate there is not known for sure. There is one thing certain; they did not travel from Orange County, North Carolina, to Tennessee alone.

In 1812 Hannah Berry gave birth to a baby daughter, Elizabeth Berry, and John Berry has been named the father. Either by choice or by circumstance, William Berry no longer had any ties to his home. All these facts make it seem very likely that Sarah Cate Berry and her two children went with William Berry and his son when he returned to Tennessee.

William Berry never owned any property or appeared on any public records back home after the 1800 Orange County Census was taken. Hannah lived in Orange County all her life. I do not think she ever married again, and in 1850 she was listed in Henry Berry's census. She probably died from the flu in 1858, because there was a worldwide epidemic that year. She was 88 years old when she died and is buried at the Fiddleton cemetery, which is on Robert Berry's (OC) original Granville Land Grant property. There is very little doubt that in 1810 Robert Berry (OC) was willing to let Hannah Cate Berry, Sarah Cate Berry, and their five children live in the Patrick Rutherford house. (More about William in Chapter 11, Page 189).

Thomas and Sarah Berry's son, David Berry, married Elizabeth Shipman about 1826 and they had 14 children. Eleanor Berry must have married John Reed about the same time. John and Eleanor lived in the house pictured in **Fig.86**, **Pg. 171**.

I assume that Henry Pigg was John and Sarah Berry Pigg's first child. Henry Pigg was born in Tennessee, according to this census. This means that the Pigg family was in Tennessee in 1816. This also means that Robert Berry(OC), who settled in the western frontier of Orange County, North Carolina, in 1751, had two grandchildren, David and Eleanor Berry, ages 13 and 14, living in the western frontier of Wayne County, Tennessee, in 1816.

In the 1860 Wayne County Census, David and Elizabeth Shipman Berry had another daughter, Martha, who was born in Tennessee and was 9 years old.

In 1870, only the two youngest daughters, Rebecca age 21 and Martha age 17, were living at home with David and Elizabeth Shipman Berry.

In 1880, David Berry and his wife were living at home with no children listed.




Figure 84: Original headstone of Sarah Cate Berry Pigg in Tennessee. Figure 85: Sarah Cate Berry Pigg's new headstone is on the right.




Figure 86: Restored Cabin of Eleanor Reed

Inside of Eleanor Reed's Cabin

Eleanor Berry married John Reed about 1824 and they made their home in this cabin. Eleanor Berry Reed raised her four children in this house before and after her husband died or was killed. When Sarah Cate Berry and John Pigg first arrived at Cypress Inn, they were probably living in Hickman County. Wayne County was founded from Hickman

This cabin was secured from the inside and outside by a string latch. This is how a latch of this type works. There is a wooden bar about 2 feet long and about the the size of a 2 by 4 mounted on a pivot in the center of the inside of the door. There is a bracket made of wood on the inside door frame. This bracket is located opposite the side of the door where the hinges are mounted. When the bar drops into the bracket the door cannot be opened. There is a string attached to the middle of the bar that is long enough to pass through a hole in the door that is about a foot above the bar and then hangs down outside of the door. If you raise the bar out of the bracket by pulling the string hanging outside the door, the door can then be opened and closed at will. At night you pull the string inside and there is no way to open the door from the outside. When you leave the house you place the string through the hole in the door and let the bar fall down into the bracket with the string hanging on the outside of the door. This would keep animals out of the house and prevent wind from blowing the door open but provided no

protection from any intruders, however.

Ernest John and Roxie Berry's children built this cabin and pavilion and have their family reunions here each year.

This is the Berry cabin and picnic area where the 2008 Robert Berry reunion was held.

Attending for the first time were descendants of four of Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry's eight sons: Thomas Berry, William Berry, Robert Berry Jr. and David J. Berry.

CHAPTER 10

DAVID J. BERRY 1774-1838

David J. Berry was the eighth child and the sixth son born to Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry. The Regulator Movement had already been quieted by the actions of Governor Tryon three years before David was born. David was in his formative years while the Revolutionary War was being waged. David was about 6 years old when his father and brother-in-law, George Waggoner, joined the North Carolina Continental Army. George Waggoner, who married David's older sister Mary Berry, was apparently mortally wounded in the battle at Guilford Court House. It is very hard to imagine what the Robert Berry family had to endure and the effect it may have had on David as he was growing up. The War was over in November of 1781, so David's father returned home and normal activity at Fiddleton resumed quickly. David's sister, Mary Berry Waggoner, remarried in December of 1881 and soon left Fiddleton to relocate in Rutherford County, N.C., which was about 200 miles away. David was seven years old when Mary remarried.

David was surrounded by his five older brothers and his other sister, Elizabeth. There were neighbors who had children about his same age, also. The family had several slaves by this time and activity on the plantation must have been lively. David probably was expected to do some daily chores, such as bring in firewood, collect eggs and duties like this. While food was plentiful and there was a lot of help, I suspect that everybody was taught to carry their share of the load. By the time David was a teenager, I expect he and some of his brothers were hunting wild animals and fowl to supplement the food supply for the family. He was likely required to take on more adult chores, also.

Robert Berry (OC) had planted an orchard of fruit trees on the west part of his Fiddleton plantation, so in the summer and fall much fresh fruit was available. With all of this bounty, I think much of David's childhood was very enjoyable in spite of the war years.

There was a 16 year period between the end of the Revolutionary War and the year that David and Mary Blalock got married. Henry Waggoner signed their bond. Henry Waggoner was George Waggoner's father. Thomas O'Neil was a witness. I do not know who Thomas O'Neil is; he may have been a clerk of court. David Berry was married at the age of 23. David and Mary Blalock were married on February 27th, 1797. Mary Blalock already had an illegitimate daughter, whom they raised with their own children. All of David and Mary Blalock Berry's children were born in Orange County, North Carolina. They even had two daughters who married in Orange County, North Carolina, before going to Georgia. Sally Berry married William Cates on July 26, 1817. Thomas Berry was their bondsman. Winnie Berry married Joshua Norman on September 19th, 1820, and no bondsman was listed for them.

David listed in the 1800, 1810, and 1820 Census of Orange County, North Carolina. David's niece, Catherine Berry Pickle, and her husband, Jacob Pickle, were living next door to David's family in 1810, and the Pickle family did not list in 1820.

In September of 1821, Henry and David Berry of Orange County sold a slave girl named Amy to William McKissack Sr. of Person County for \$350. The witnesses were Thomas P. Evans, Robert G. Cummins, William Lipscomb, and John Cummins. ⁷³ David was the last of Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry's children to leave North Carolina. David's youngest son, Joshua Berry, was born in Orange County in 1824. David and Mary B. Berry listed in the 1830

Georgia census. Joshua's birth may be why David and Mary did not leave N.C. earlier.

David J. Berry died about 1838 and would have only been 64 years old. There are records of David J. Berry's estate where some members of his family are named. There was no mention of Mary Blalock Berry in the estate. After leaving their home in North Carolina, David J. Berry and his family lived in Fayette County, Georgia, Cobb County, Georgia, Henry County, Georgia, and Milton County, Georgia.

William Abraham and Sarah Berry Cates' Children:

Alfred Cates (b. Nov. 24th, 1818) married Mary Ann Nolen on Dec. 18, 1838, in Henry County, Georgia. Mary Ann was born in South Carolina in 1824. This couple had 12 children. At some point after the children were born, Alfred and Mary moved to Cass County, Texas.

Romulus Sanders Cates was born Sept 21, 1819, in NC. He married Lucinda E. Reeves (daughter of Newton Reeves Sr.) on Feb. 27, 1840, in Henry County, Ga. Lucinda was born on Jan. 10, 1822, in Georgia. The family had 12 children .They moved to Winston Co., Ala. Romulus died in Ala. on Jan 2, 1896, & his wife died in Ga. on May 11, 1892.

Martha Cates was born May 20th, 1820, and married Miles N. Hunt on Dec. 12th, 1854. Martha died on Jun 20th, 1859, in Clayton County, Georgia. The date on Miles tombstone is June 29th; the year is unreadable. They had 3 Children. **Mary (Polly) Cates** was born Jan. 10th, 1822, in NC. Her husband was unknown. Mary's two children were James T. Cates & Alexander Cates. She died after 1880.

Elizabeth J. Cates was born Dec 23rd, 1826, in Henry County, Georgia. She died 23 August 1896. She married Joshua M. Berry on Jan. 31, 1854. Joshua M. Berry was born in NC. Joshua M. Yancy Meredith Barton was the 4th child of Mary Berry and Thomas Howard Barton. He was born on April 6th, 1836, in Clayton County, Georgia. He died in Rusk County, Texas, on June 10th, 1886.

He is the grandson of Mary Berry and Thomas Howard Barton.

Yancy Meredith Barton was living with his first cousin, David R. Norman, in Clayton County, Georgia, in the 1860 Census. David Norman's mother, Winnie Berry Norman, was also living with him in the same census. Winnie was also living with her son David in 1840.

I was able to find Winnie living with David in the 1850 &1860 Clayton County, Georgia, census but cannot find her in1870. Robert Marion Barton was in Company E, 30th Georgia Infantry, C. S. A. He surrendered May 10 and was paroled May 18, 1865, at Tallassee, Florida. He was born in Clayton County, Georgia, and moved to Minden, Texas, in 1867.

At the time he applied for his Confederate Pension in Texas (Pension number 30446), his house was valued at \$1,000 and he had other assets valued at \$200 in Rusk County, T exas.

His commanding officer was Captain Joseph Huie. He joined the Confederate Army on September 25, 1861, at Camp Bagley near Fairburn, Georgia. Capt. Huie stated in the Pension Application that R. M. Barton was left sick and was captured in Mississippi in 1863. He was a Private in the CSA.




Figure 91: Robert and Elizabeth Everett Berry's Bible Page





The picture above was taken at the Willeo Cemetery in Roswell, Georgia, where many of our Robert Berry (OC) descendants are buried with their families.

This event was hosted by Jo Patterson and George Pettett. They did such an excellent job with this reunion it set the stage for two more nationwide Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry reunions. I decided while attending this reunion that I would organize one in Orange County, North Carolina, the next year. I knew where the original Land Grant property was because my William Berry descendants had lived there all their lives. Hillsborough was an old town that was established after Robert Berry (OC) homesteaded in the county. This turned out to be a wonderful event with 116 people attending. At the 2007 reunion, John Allen Berry from the Thomas Berry line decided he would host another of these national events in 2008. He lives in Cypress Inn, Tennessee, where Thomas Berry's widow relocated in 1814. This also turned out to be very successful reunion.

In the picture below there are several of David J. Berry's descendants. They made their first visit back to Orange County, North Carolina, in 2002. As far as I know, these David J. Berry descendants are the first of his family to return to Fiddleton since David J. Berry and his family left here in 1828. I know that others in his family have passed through this area, but they had no idea that this was where David was born.

The Church behind this group is Berry's Grove Baptist Church. The land for this church was donated by John Robert and Elizabeth Bowling Berry in 1889. John Robert Berry is the grandson of William Berry, who is one of David J. Berry's brothers. William and David J. Berry are sons of Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry, who first settled this area of North Carolina in 1751.

CHAPTER 11

WILLIAM BERRY 1775-1860

William Berry was next to the last child born to Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry.
William was about 6 years old when Robert Berry (OC) enlisted in the North Carolina
Continental Army in 1781. Shortly after the battle of Guilford Courthouse, the war and it's
fighting soon moved from the State of North Carolina to Virginia and ended very soon after that.

Plantation activity in Fiddleton most likely got back to normal very quickly. Because of his age, William Berry's life was probably not affected as much by the war as the older members of his family. He and his older brother, David, were most likely unaware of the dangers that come with war. They probably played war together but had very little idea of what it was all about. The two young boys knew their father was away and they probably saw George Waggoner come home badly wounded and then die. At their ages, who can tell how much of what they saw and experienced affected the rest of their lives. The war probably had less effect on them than it did on the older children.

William was born about 1775. He was younger than Thomas, proven by the 1800 Census. William was listed in the 16 to 25 age bracket and Thomas was listed in the 25 to 44-age bracket. These brackets mean that William was born between 1775 and 1784 and Thomas was born between 1756 and 1775. Henry Berry, the youngest son in the family, was born in 1776. William was about 24 years old when he and Hannah Cate got married. David, William, and Henry Berry were all very close in age.

In Chapter 9, I wrote about the two brothers marrying two of William and Elizabeth Cate's daughters, Hannah and Sarah Cate. While William Berry married Hannah Cate on August 12th, 1799, at the age of 24, Thomas Berry did not get married until a year later on August 11th, 1800. Both families listed a son under the age of 10 in that census. We know that Thomas and Sarah had a son named David II Berry. William and Hannah also had another son, Thomas Person Berry, who was born on June 1st, 1808. It is now believed we have located a second son. (See Page 191)

When Hannah Berry listed head of household in 1810, she listed 4 males less than 10 years of age.

William and Hannah's sons; 1800 unknown name 1808 Thomas Person Berry

Thomas and Sarah's sons; 1800 unknown name 1802 David II Berry

This would account for the 4 males listed in Hannah Cate Berry's 1810 census except for the fact that Thomas Berry's widow, Sarah Cate Berry, only took one son with her to Tennessee.

I think Thomas and William went to Tennessee sometime in the early spring of 1808. Their two wives remained in Orange County, NC, with the children. I don't think Hannah Cate Berry ever lived with William after he left for the trip to Tennessee. I have no way to determine who separated from whom. As far as I can determine, William most likely returned to

Tennessee with Thomas Berry's widow and two children sometime between 1810 and 1814.




Figure 96: William Berry's marriage bond to Hannah Cate

The events in William and Hannah's lives are so complicated because the facts that we have do not explain what happened to their marriage or exactly when it happened. I think the best way to approach this is to list all of the known facts.

Hannah and William were married in 1799.

William & Hannah listed one male under 10 in the 1800 Census.

They may have had a son born before 1800.

They had a son named Thomas Person Berry born on June 1st, 1808.

Hannah listed head of household in 1810.

She listed 4 males under 10, 1 female under 10, and 2 females 26 to 45

Hannah Cate was born in 1770 and was 40 years old in 1810.

Sarah Cate was born in 1782 and was 28 years old in 1810.

Hannah became pregnant by an undetermined John Berry in 1811.

Hannah gave birth to a daughter, Elizabeth Berry, in 1812.

Thomas Berry was apparently killed in Tennessee while searching for land.

William Berry may have returned home with the news of his brother's death.

Robert Berry (OC) wrote his will in 1812 and listed his son, Thomas, as deceased.

Robert Berry (OC) left a slave girl named Mariah to his son, Thomas Berry's,

heirs.

Robert Berry (OC) left his son, William, 1 pound in his will.

No records have been found in Orange County, North Carolina, about William Berry after the 1800 census.

Hannah's sister, Sarah Cate Berry, married John Pigg in Tennessee in 1815,

Where Hannah lived from 1810 to 1850 is not known.

Hannah Cate Berry's mother, Elizabeth Cate, owned the William Cate property until she died about 1826.

Hannah was living with her brother-in-law, Henry Berry, in 1850.

Thomas Person Berry lived in Orange County, North Carolina, for his entire life. William and Person Berry bought property from Uncle Henry Berry on November 23rd, 1830. (Deed book24 Page 226)

Witnessed by John Carrington and William Armstrong.

William and Person Berry sold property to Samuel Wilson and his son, Felix Wilson, on September 19th, 1833. (Deed Book 25 page 431) Witnessed by Charles Wilson, Felix Wilson's brother, and **Robert C. Berry**. (William & Hannah's son) Thomas Person Berry married Sarah Lunsford in Orange County, Sept. 28th, 1831. William Clarence Berry married Sally Bowles on November 20th, 1826.

William Berry was living next door to Chesterfield Franklin, Theodric Franklin's father, in 1830.

Hannah's daughter, Elizabeth Berry, married Theodoric Franklin on June 30th, 1833.

William Clarence Berry and Elizabeth Franklin left Orange County, North Carolina, with their families around 1834. Both families went to Alabama.

Henry Berry died in 1855 and left some property to Hannah Cate Berry.

Henry did not name Hannah Berry as his wife.

Hannah Berry died in 1858, most likely from the flu.

There was a worldwide flu epidemic in 1857/1858

Theodoric Franklin died the same year in Floyd County, Georgia.

Elizabeth Berry Franklin was at the home of her half-brother, Thomas Person Berry, when the 1860 census was taken.

Thomas Person Berry listed Hannah and William Berry as his parents on the marriage license for his second wife, Lucy Brown, on the 21st of August, 1871. Thomas Person Berry was married 3 times.

Children of William & Hannah Cate Berry

Unknown male 1799 May be Benjamin H. Berry Unknown son 1806 May be Robert C. Berry.

Thomas Person Berry born June 1st, 1808; died April 30th, 1884

The DNA project in our Berry family has validated much of our archival research, but the very latest confirmed participant, **George David Berry**, has raised an unanswered question. At the current time, all indications are that his great-grandfather, Robert C. Berry, is the son of William and Hannah Cate Berry.

Hannah Cate Berry's only daughter, Elizabeth Berry.

Elizabeth Berry was born in Orange County, North Carolina, in 1812.

Elizabeth Berry's daughter, Temperance Jane Franklin, states on her family Bible page that her father is John Berry. (**Fig.99**, **Page194**). There is no record of John and Hannah ever marrying, and we cannot determine if William had separated from Hannah before going to Tennessee or after. I really do not believe John Berry was William Berry's brother. William Berry went to Tennessee with his brother in 1808. Hannah Berry gave birth to Elizabeth Berry in 1812.

Hannah Berry remained in Orange County for the rest of her life. She raised Elizabeth, Robert C. Berry, and Thomas Person Berry by herself, as far as I can tell. They may have been living in the plantation house with Uncle Henry most of that time. Henry must have been well respected by Elizabeth Berry Franklin because in 1835 she named her first son Henry Berry Franklin.

Thomas Person Berry married Sarah Lunsford about a year before his half-sister, Elizabeth Berry, married Theodrick Franklin.




Figure 97: Theodrick Franklin's Marriage Bond to Elizabeth Berry

You will notice that Thomas P. Berry and William Bowles were bondsmen. William Bowles was Sally Bowles Berry's father, and this may indicate that William Clarence Berry was the William who bought land with Thomas Person Berry in 1830.

Elizabeth and Theodrick Franklin's first child, Temperance Jane Franklin, was born in Orange County, North Carolina, in 1832. Sometime around 1835 this couple removed to Alabama. ⁷⁷We know this because their second child, Henry Berry Franklin, was born there in

1835. This is also the time William C. Berry removed to Fayette County, Alabama.

The 1850 Floyd County, Georgia, Census shows the Franklin family returned to Georgia from Alabama before 1838. Their second son, James Franklin, was born in 1838 in Georgia. The family listed in 1850 at dwelling number 64 and family number 64 in Cove Spring, Georgia.

Elizabeth Berry Franklin's return to North Carolina⁷⁸

Theodrick Franklin died in Floyd County, Georgia, in 1858. This is the same year that a worldwide flu epidemic killed unknown numbers of people. Hannah Cate Berry, Elizabeth Franklin's mother, died the same year. Thomas Person Berry's son, William H. Berry, died in 1858. Lewis Berry, Joshua Berry's son, also died this same year. Nancy Berry may also have died in 1858. We are not sure when she died. She was alive in 1850 and was deceased by 1860.

Elizabeth Berry Franklin returned to Orange County, North Carolina, after her husband died. She was staying with Thomas Person Berry when the 1860 Orange County Census taken.

Some evidence indicating William Clarence Berry, Robert C. Berry, Theodoric Franklin and his family all went to Fayette County, Alabama, together at the same time.

William Clarence Berry married Sally Bowles on November 20th, 1826.

Thomas Person Berry married Sarah Lunsford on September 28th, 1831.

William and Person Berry buy land together on November 3rd, 1830

William C. & Sally Bowles Berry have their third child in May, 1833.

Sally Bowles Berry dies, leaving three small children.

William & Person Berry sell their land September 19th, 1833.

Robert C. Berry was witness to sale of land September 19th, 1833.

Theodrick & Elizabeth Franklin have their child, Henry Berry Franklin, in Alabama, 1835.

William Clarence and his second wife, Massa Thompkins, have their first child, John Thomas Berry, in Fayette County, Alabama, on July 28th, 1838.

Robert C. Berry and his wife, Sarah Chappell, have their first child, Miles Berry, in 1840.




Figure 99: Bible page of Temperance Jane Franklin, Thomas P. Berry's half-niece

Elizabeth Berry Franklin was trapped in North Carolina during the Civil War and was not able to rejoin her family until the war was over. John Robert Berry is my great-grandfather and he was 18 years old when Elizabeth Franklin returned home. I had wondered how my Uncle Harold Berry knew that some of our folks went to Texas. This is apparently where my Uncle Harold's information came from. This story was passed down to my grandfather, Wiley P. Berry

Sr., from his father, and then Grandpa must have told Uncle Harold.

Temperance Jane Franklin married Warren W. Davis and removed to Texas sometime between 1865 and 1867. Elizabeth Franklin joined her family in Texas after the Civil War was over and lived the rest of her life there.

This information was copied from an email note sent by Elizabeth Robinett:

"I took this picture of the grave site of E. H. Franklin wife of T. Franklin b. 1812 in Salem Cemetery in Brown County, TX. I think this is Elizabeth Berry. What are the odds of an E. Franklin born 1812 wife of T. Franklin in the same county as Thomas Benjamin Franklin, her son? The cemetery is about 5 miles or so from where he lived".

"Elizabeth died on November 21st, 1885. She was 73 years old".

While Elizabeth Berry is not William Berry's daughter, I think she needs to be included in his chapter. I am not sure what part Elizabeth Berry's birth played in William Berry's life. Hannah and William Berry are my 3rd great-grandparents, and Hannah Cate Berry is Elizabeth Berry's mother. This makes Thomas Person Berry half-brother to Elizabeth Berry Franklin. The major question still remains. Did William Berry separate from Hannah Cate Berry before he went to Tennessee or after? William Berry was about 37 years old and not deceased at the time his father wrote his will in April of 1812.

In the 1830 Blount County, Alabama, Census, I find a William Berry age 50 - 60. John Box Senior was living next door to William Berry's family.

Next door to John Box lived **Thomas Rutherford**, age 50 to 60.

The three sons of Patrick Rutherford who lived on the next plantation south of Robert Berry's family in Orange County, NC, were William Rutherford, James Rutherford, and **Thomas Rutherford**. I have no information connecting **Thomas Rutherford** in Alabama to the one from Orange County. It does pose a good question.

William Berry's wife in the 1830 Blount County, Alabama, Census was at least 10 years younger than he. 80 I could not find William Berry in Blount County, Alabama, in the 1840 Census.

I did find a William Berry in the 1850 Lincoln County, Tennessee, Census.

If William Berry did go back to Tennessee with his sister-in-law, Sarah Cate Berry, he may have settled in Lincoln County, Tennessee. After many years of searching for my third great-grandfather, William Berry, I think he may have been living about 60 miles east of Sarah Cate Berry Pigg and her family in Cypress Inn, Tennessee.

What the 1850 Lincoln County, Tennessee, Census showed is: William Berry, age 74, living in the household of Benjamin H. Berry, age 44. Both men were born in North Carolina. William's wife, Mary, age 65, was 10 years younger than William and was also born in North Carolina.

If Benjamin H. Berry is William and Mary Berry's son, then Mary was 21 years old when he was born. If Mary Berry was his mother, it would mean that William Berry was cheating on Hannah while planning to go with Thomas to Tennessee. Benjamin H. Berry was born in 1806 in North Carolina. My William Berry was still married to Hannah Cate Berry at that time. Hannah and William also had a son born in 1808. It also might mean that William never planned to return home to Hannah. Hannah Cate Berry did have a brother named Benjamin Cate, so it seems possible that she might name a son, Benjamin.

There are only two counties separating Lincoln County and Wayne County, Tennessee, where the widow of Thomas Berry, Sarah Cate Berry Pigg, homesteaded in 1816. Sarah's brother, John Cate, was in Maury County, Tennessee, on January 1st, 1828, to buy Sarah Pigg's 1/5th ownership of their father's plantation. Each of William Cate's five children had inherited a 20% ownership of their father's property in Orange County, N.C. I think their mother, Elizabeth Smith Cate, died about 1825 in Orange County, North Carolina. John Cate apparently was living in Maury County, Tennessee at that time. The family sold the Cate property to Thomas Wilson in Orange County. NC. (See related information on page 167)

I know a large number of William and Hannah Cate Berry's descendants because they are my family. Most of them live in Orange, Durham, Wake, and other North Carolina Counties. Several live in other states. My sister and I have 13 living Berry first cousins who are the grandchildren of Wiley P. and Ida Ann Wilson Berry. Wiley P. Berry had four sisters and two brothers who also have large families, with most of them living in North Carolina also.

CHAPTER 12

HENRY BERRY 1776-1858

Henry Berry was the youngest child of Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry from Orange County, North Carolina. Robert and Elizabeth had been married about 17 or 18 years when Henry Berry was born in 1776. Robert Berry was about 46 years old and his wife, Elizabeth, was probably about 41 years old. Their family now consisted of 10 children-- two daughters and eight sons. They had been living in the new Fiddleton Plantation home for 10 years when Henry was born. Henry's oldest sister, Mary, was about 17 or 18 years old and was already married or about to marry George Waggoner, son of Henry Waggoner. This was the year of the Declaration of Independence and the beginning of much turmoil in the nation. Most of the fighting with the English had been done far away from Fiddleton but a lot of the political action was now taking place about 14 miles away. Two of the signers of the Declaration of Independence lived in Hillsborough, North Carolina, and much of the involvement by North Carolina was being directed and decided in Hillsborough, N. C. This must have been a very anxious and troublesome time for Henry's parents. Many in the state were remaining loyal to the King of England and many were deciding to become patriots. I would imagine that many of the neighborhood men would gather at various locations and discuss the serious issues of the day.

Henry was only 5 years old when his father and his brother-in-law, George Waggoner, joined the North Carolina Continental Army. That same year, the Battle at Guilford Courthouse was fought and George Waggoner was likely very seriously wounded there. The battle was fought on April 15th, 1781, and 17 days later on March 2nd, 1781, George Waggoner wrote his will. George died sometime before the month of August, 1781. That is when Mary Waggoner and Robert Berry became executrix and executor of George Waggoner's will. There is no way that Henry Berry could have understood what was going on, but I suspect that he was asking a lot of questions. Henry's sister, Mary Berry Waggoner, who was now a widow, married James Camp. I know this because in February, 1782, George Waggoner's inventory statement was signed by Robert Berry and Mary Kemp. James and Mary probably married around Christmas of 1781. Robert Berry Jr. married James Camp's sister, Mary Camp, either shortly before Mary married James or shortly after.

There were still brothers of all ages around for Henry to play with or just follow around, asking questions. William was 7 years old and Henry was 6. Elizabeth, his other sister, was 14 years old and I am sure she seemed like another mother to Henry. I think growing up as the baby in a very large family would be a very interesting experience. By the time Henry was grown, most of his siblings were married and having children, so Henry had lots of young nieces and nephews. Some of them he probably never saw but most of them were living very close to Fiddleton. James and Mary Camp removed to Rutherford County, North Carolina, and may have returned home for a visit or two, but I am sure there were not a lot of those trips made in those days.

In the 1810 Census of Robert Berry (OC), we find that there are 3 males listed. 2 of them are in the 26 to 45 bracket and 1 is in the over 45 bracket. This means that Henry and Isaac were both born after 1765 and before 1785. We know that Henry Berry was born in 1776 and that Isaac was older than Henry.

If Henry Berry ever married, we have no record of it. Although Henry Berry never

married, he may have been the father of Mary Ann Ashley, who married Thomas King. When Mary Ann Ashley King's daughter, Susan Ann King Crabtree, died, her husband, John W. Crabtree, stated on her death certificate that Susan's mother's name was Mary Berry. Mary Ashley (Berry) King and Susan A. King Crabtree both have marked headstones in the Fiddleton cemetery located on Robert Berry's Original Granville Land Grant. **See Fig, 26, Pg. 73** to view Mary King's headstone and Fig. **25, Pg. 72** to view Susan Crabtree's headstone.

In the year 1833, Thomas King married Mary Ashley in Person County, North Carolina. In the 1850 Orange County, North Carolina, Census, Fanny Ashley, age 70, was living in the household of Thomas and Mary King.

Henry Berry stated in his 1855 will: "I give and devise to my friend Thomas King and his wife Polly King my tract of land where on I live." (Fig. 102, Pg. 203) Since so many Berry relatives were living in the area, this did not make sense. Why would Henry Berry leave the Fiddleton plantation home place to a friend? Now I know that Henry Berry did leave the Plantation Home to a member of our family.

In 1920 when John W Crabtree filled out his wife, Susan King Crabtree's, death certificate, he knew that Mary (Polly) Ashley was really Mary Berry. Mary Berry is the name he entered for Susan's mother on Susan's death certificate. I think I can see why Henry Berry did not want to admit to his friends and relatives that he was the father of Mary Ashley, who was born in 1809. Henry was living at home with his father and mother at the time. I cannot understand why it would have made any difference to anybody in 1855. This story does not end here, however. Henry Berry was charged to care for Isaac Berry in Robert Berry's (OC) 1812 will. (See Pg. 68). In Henry Berry's 1820 and 1830 Census enumeration, you can see that Isaac was living with his brother. Henry Berry always listed several females of varying ages in each census.

71Susan's death cetificate is very important, because it states clearly that Mary Ashly who married Thomas King in 1833 was really Mary Ashley Berry.

When Isaac Berry died, another piece of this puzzle also appeared. Lydia Berry listed as head of household for the first time with a female child under 10 in 1840. Felix Wilson's family was the only family living between Lydia Berry and Henry Berry. Felix Wilson bought land from William and Person Berry in 1833 (See page 211).

Usually the wife of a deceased husband will list as head of household until the estate is settled. Since there was no estate to settle, it is likely that Henry Berry allowed Lydia Berry to continue living where she and Isaac had been living. Lydia moved to Person County and was living with Joshua Cates in 1850. Mary Ann Berry was 18 years old in that census.

You can see from the 1850 Census listing that Lydia Berry's daughter was 18 years old and unmarried. Later that year she married Samuel Hunley on December 18th. Lydia Berry was still alive in the 1870 Person County Census, but she was not in the 1880 Census. I thought the

trail of Lydia Berry and Mary Berry Hunley ended here but I was wrong.

The 1860 Orange County Census shows the Thomas King family living in the plantation home they inherited from Henry Berry in 1855. It also shows that their youngest son was James King, age 9.

Since I knew that Susan A. Crabtree did not die until 1920, I decided to search the 1900 Orange County Census for members of Thomas King's family. This was a stroke of luck and made me realize that Henry and Isaac Berry might each have a daughter that I never knew about. In 1900, James King was living next door to his sister, Susan Crabtree. Mary Ann Berry Hunley was listed as a cousin in James King's household.

After learning that Mary Ann Berry Hunley had returned to Fiddleton and was listed in the 1900 Census as a cousin to James King, I need to know how they were cousins.

If Lydia Berry was the daughter of Isaac Berry and Mary Ashley Berry was the daughter of Henry Berry and Fanny Ashley, then Mary Berry Hunley and James King would be cousins. Since Henry Berry left the plantation house to Thomas and Polly (Berry Ashley) King, it seems to indicate that Mary (Ashley/Berry) King was Henry's daughter. Henry did not mention Lydia Berry or Mary Berry Hunley in his will. This must mean that either Lydia or Mary Ann Berry was Isaac's daughter. I have no marriage record for Henry Berry or his brother, Isaac Berry.

I think there is a family connection between the Hopkins and Berry families that may go back to Robert Berry (PAC) and the Hopkins family in Princess Anne County, Virginia, in the early 1700's. (See, Page 31).

Henry Berry had inherited the Fiddleton Plantation and he listed as head of household for the first time in 1820.

NOTE: Elizabeth Cate is living 6 houses away from Henry Berry in 1820. Elizabeth Cate is Hannah Cate Berry's mother. I do not know where Hannah Cate Berry and her children were living in 1820. I feel very confident she was living in Orange County, North Carolina. William Cate's wife, Elizabeth Cate, died around 1825. John Cate and Hannah Cate Berry sold their 40% of the Cate Plantation to Thomas Wilson on Nov. 19th, 1825. (Orange County NC Deed Bk: 22 Pg: 7) John Cate went to Wayne County, Tennessee, to purchase Sarah Cate Berry Pigg's 20% share of their father's farm sometime around 1826.

Henry and Isaac are buried in the Fiddleton Cemetery. My third great-grandmother, Hannah Cate Berry, is also burried there. All three of these ancestors are buried there with unmarked field stone head markers. Since Mary Berry King and her daughter, Susan King Crabtree, were buried there, most likely Fanny Ashley and Thomas King are also there. To view some of the headstones that are located there **see page 71.**

Henry Berry was 79 years old when he wrote his will. Henry Berry's will dated December 20th, 1855.

There were several Berry family members and neighbors who bought items at the

Farquhar estate sale. I am related to many of these families through my grandmother, Ida Ann Wilson, who married my grandfather, Wiley P. Berry. Other relatives named in the Farquhar estate sale are Cate, Jackson, Rountree, Woods, Wortham, Brown, Blalock, Farquhar and Nichols. My Wilson family arived in Orange County, North Carolina, in the mi-seventeen hundreds, also.

James Williamson, who attended James Farquhar's estate sale, is the first Williamson I have located in the Orange County area. We continue to find surnames that are the same as families who were living in Princess Anne County, Virginia, in the early seventeen hundreds. They still show up clustered around our Berry family as late as 1820.

On **page 202**, we see two Robinson families living as neighbors to Henry Berry and the Fiddleton Plantation that Henry had just inherited. These same surnames also show up in Fayette County, Alabama, close to our Berry family there in the 1830's and later.

The Robinson name appears in records in many locations where our Berry family lived. (See Pg. 103) There are 11 Robinson marriages recorded in the Grooms' Book in Hillsborough, NC. I do not know of a marriage between the two families. They just seem to be neighbors and good friends.

For many years, I could not connect a family relationship with the Kings, Ashleys, and Berrys, either.

The fact that Liddy Berry and her daughter, Mary, did not appear in any census until 1840 indicates that Isaac Berry must have died between 1830 and 1840. It also indicates that Lydia Berry or her daughter was very likely Isaac Berry's daughter. Henry Berry made no mention of Lydia Berry or her daughter, Mary Ann Hunley, in his will.

The fact that the plantation house was given to Thomas and Polly King in Henry Berry's will indicates that Mary Ashley Berry King was Henry Berry's daughter. The other fact that we recently discovered was revealed when we located Susan Ann King's death certificate naming Mary Ashley King's maiden name as Berry.

Mary Ashley Berry King and Lydia Berry are most likely first cousins.

Thomas Person Berry was the son of William Berry and Hannah Cate. He was married three times and had children by each of his first two wives. I am descended from Thomas Person Berry and his first wife, Sarah Lunsford. She is the daughter of William Lunsford and Edy Brinkley Cozart. Edy's parents were James and Sarah Cozart. The Cozart family descended from Jacques Cossart, who was born in France. This family was the first Cozart Family to settle in America.

Thomas Person Berry and Sally Lunsford were married on September 30th, 1831, and had only been married a year when Thomas P. Berry signed his half-sister's wedding bond. Thomas Person and Sarah Lunsford Berry are my 2nd great-grandparents. Thomas Person Berry's marriage bond to Sarah Lunsford was signed by his uncle, Henry Berry, and Thomas Person Berry himself.

Children of Thomas Person and Sarah Lunsford Berry:

William H. Berry b.1836.

Thomas and Sarah had four boys. They were married in 1831⁸¹ but did not have children until 1836, according to the 1850 census. It is quite possible they could have had children between 1831 & 1836 who were grown and away from home by 1850. If this is the case, most likely they were daughters; they also might have had stillbirths or children who died very young. There are no known records of any children, other than the four sons in the 1850 census from this union.

Thomas P. and Sarah Lunsford Berry's Children n & Spouses:

•William H. Berry, b 1836, married Sarah Frances King August 6, 1857. Sarah King was the daughter of Thomas and Mary (Polly) King. William and Sarah were first cousins once removed.

William H. Berry died during the 1857-1859 severe worldwide flu epidemics.

- •Willie Berry; born 1838. Willie may have died in the civil war. There is no further information about him.
- •John Robert Berry; b 1842, married Elizabeth Frances Bowling Nov. 30th, 1865. John Robert and Elizabeth Bowling Berry are my great-grandparents.
- •James P. Berry; b 1848, married Artelia Wedding Nov. 01st, 1871. Artelia Wedding was the daughter of Joseph and Louisa Wedding.

On the 23rd day of November, 1831, Uncle Henry Berry sold 100 and 3/10 acres of land to William and Person Berry.⁸² I have never been able to determine if William Berry on this deed was Thomas Person Berry's father, brother, or his first cousin, William Clarence Berry. I think it is possible that Thomas Person Berry's father, William Berry, had gone to Lincoln County, Tennessee, around 1814, taking Thomas Person Berry's older brother with him. I am not sure what Thomas Person Berry's older brother was named.

This leaves William Clarence Berry as the most likely co-owner of this tract of land. William Clarence Berry married Sally Bowles on November 26th, 1826. Thomas Person Berry had married Sarah Lunsford on September 28th, 1831, two months before this land was purchased. William and Thomas only retained ownership of this property for about three years.

They sold the same tract of land to Samuel Wilson and his youngest son, Felix Wilson, on 19th day of September, 1833.⁸³ William Clarence and Sally Bowles Berry had three children who were born in Orange County, North Carolina.

Roseann (Roan) Frances Berry was the last child and she was born in 1833. I think Sally Bowles Berry died at Roan's birth or shortly thereafter. William Clarence Berry left North Carolina and married Massa Ann Thompkins either in South Carolina or Alabama before 1838.

I know that my 2nd great-grandfather, Thomas Person Berry, bought land with William Berry on November 23rd, 1830, (deed bk. 24 Page 226) from his uncle, Henry Berry, for \$500 and then sold it three years later on the 19th of September, 1833, for \$450 (deed bk. 45 Page 431). Selling land for less than it cost is not a typical Berry trait. Thomas Person Berry may have bought this land with his first cousin, William Clarence Berry, and sold it when Sally Bowles Berry died in 1833.

For more about this subject see Research of William C. Berry's parents on page 108.

A very interesting development occurred 62 years after Samuel Wilson and his son bought the property from Thomas Person Berry. Thomas Person and Sarah Lunsford Berry's grandson, Wiley P. Berry, married Ida Ann Wilson, who was Samuel Wilson's great-great-granddaughter. Wiley P. and Ida Ann Berry are my grandparents and Samuel Wilson is my 4th great-grandfather.

My grandfather, Wiley P. Berry, owned quite a bit of the original plantation at one time, and I do have some fond memories of visiting his farm when I was very young. My mother told me that she used to play in her great-grandfather, Thomas Person Berry's, old home place.

Thomas Person and Sally Lunsford Berry are buried in the Fiddleton Plantation Cemetery located on the original 1757 Granville Land Grant.

Thomas Person Berry's second wife was Lucy Brown (Lucy Brown was the daughter of Alfred and Martha Brown).⁸⁴ Thomas and Lucy had five children who were very young when their mother, Lucy Brown Berry, died.




Figure 107: Thomas Person Berry's marriage license to Lucy Brown 1871

Thomas married his third wife, who was named Elizabeth Peed Bowles, on December 6th, 1883. This marriage had to be one of convenience, because Thomas Person Berry needed someone to care for his five young children. Thomas Person Berry died about 5 months later on April 30th, 1884.

There was a large court case over his estate, which he left intestate. The orphans' grandmother, Martha Brown, entered a suit against the estate to gain support for the 5 Berry orphans. She stated that the money collected for sale of the remaining Thomas Person Berry property should be used for supporting her grandchildren. Martha Brown stated that the older sons by his first wife had already been given property and the money received from the remainder of the estate should be divided into five parts and not seven parts. She argued that the two grown sons, John Robert and James P. Berry, had already received their inheritance. The orphans eventually won the case.

The marriage license for Thomas Person Berry's second marriage had a place on the form for him to name his parents. It was this document that identified William and Hannah Berry as his parents. This was a great find for me and opened up a verifiable line back to Robert &

Elizabeth Cate Berry as my 4th great-grandparents. There had been some confusion in some earlier research which indicated that Thomas Person Berry was the son of Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry (OC) and not their grandson. This confusion existed because Robert and Elizabeth Cate Berry had a son named Thomas Berry. This family has been difficult to research because so many children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren did have the same given names. Documents like Thomas Person Berry's second marriage license are vitally important in sorting out our family.




Figure 108: North Corner of 1891 George Tate Map showing Fiddleton
This is a section of a map that was origanally drawn in 1891 by GEORGE W. TATE for the BINGAM SCHOOL.

I have drafted some information on this map to pin point where Robert Berry's 1757 Granville Land Grant was located. You will note that George Tate placed the name Fiddleton on the location that corresponds with Robert Berry's Land Grant.

The spot to the left of the name Fiddleton is where Thomas Person Berry's home was located. He built this home in 1852. Thomas Person Berry died 7 years before this map was drawn. Nobody may have been living in his house in 1891, and this may be the reason it was not identified as his home. (A picture of his home is on **Fig. 106, Pg. 209)**

John Robert Berry's home is locate near his name on this map and his son, my grandfather, Wiley P. Berry, was age 12 and living at home with his parents when this map was done. (See: John Robert Berry's home on Page 215)

Wiley P. Berry built his home about where the O in Meridith P.O. is printed on this map. He built his home about the time he was married in 1895. (See: W.P. Berry's home on page 222)




Figure 109: Hannah Cate Berry's Estate Sale




Figure 110: Receipt for Hannah Cate Berry's Casket

Since the census records before 1850 did not list names except those of heads of household, I do not know where Hannah Berry was living in 1820, 1830, or1840. I strongly believe she was living in Orange County, North Carolina, all those years. Hannah Berry's son, Thomas Person Berry, and her daughter, Elizabeth Berry, were married in Orange County in 1831 and 1833. Hannah Berry was definitely living with Henry Berry in the 1850 Census and her age was recorded as 80. This would mean that she was born in 1770. Hannah Cate Berry lived until 1858 and died at the age of 88. Hannah Berry died the same year that a worldwide flu epidemic was recorded. Thomas Person Berry's oldest son, William H. Berry, and Joshua Berry's son, Lewis Berry, also died at the same time. All three of them died in early January of 1858. I feel certain that all of them died of the flu. Theodrick Franklin also died that same year in Floyd County, Georgia, and Elizabeth Berry Franklin returned to Orange County in 1860. As fate would have it and to our great good fortune, she was staying with her half-brother, Thomas Person Berry, when the 1860 census was taken. I have no idea what Elizabeth Berry Franklin was able to inherit from her mother's estate in 1860

William H. Berry had married Sarah King, the daughter of Thomas and Mary King, in 1857. He was married to Sarah only one year before he died. Thomas and Mary King were the couple who inherited the Fiddleton home place from Henry Berry in his 1855 will. (**Fig.102**, **Pg. 203**) William H. Berry and Sarah King were cousins. William H. Berry's widow, Sarah Francis King Berry, married Hezikiah Terry on June 7th, 1860.

When Hannah Berry died, her son, Thomas Person Berry, was appointed by the court to administer her estate. In the following documents we learn that Eli Berry, a nephew of Hannah Cate Berry, built her coffin for \$5.50. (See Fig. 110 on page 213) We also learn on page 212 that Hannah Cate Berry had very little property to pass on to her heirs.

CHAPTER 15

JOHN ROBERT BERRY 1842-1917

John Robert Berry was born on September 25th, 1842, and was the third son of Thomas Person and Sarah Lunsford Berry. He is also my great-grandfather. He fought in the Civil war and was wounded in the battle of Cold Harbor. After the War he returned to Orange County, North Carolina, and married Elizabeth Frances Bowling on November 30th, 1865.



CHAPTER 16

WILEY P. BERRY 1769-1965

Wiley P. Berry was the third child of John Robert and Elizabeth Frances Berry. He was born and lived his life in Orange County, North Carolina. He was always referred to as P. Berry by most of his family. Tragedy struck our family when I was eleven years old. My grandmother, Ida Ann Wilson Berry, was struck and killed by an automobile on May 4th, 1941. Soon after that tragedy my grandfather stopped farming. It is hard for me to realize that Grandma never knew anything about World War II.

There is an interesting story about the marriage of my grandparents. The happy couple was married in Ida's parents' home. Her parents were Charles Eli and Mary Jane Coleman Wilson. Charles Eli Wilson prepared a room for their first night over the kitchen in his home. Many of the newlyweds' friends and family attended the wedding and the celebration that followed at the Wilsons' home. My guess is that the party went on several hours in the kitchen, long after the young couple had retired to their honeymoon room above the kitchen. The couple was apparently married on Saturday, because when my grandparents took their own buggy to church the next morning, my grandmother raised her umbrella and put it behind her head so the family and friends who were following could not see Grandpa kiss her. Times and customs have changed a lot since then. Wiley P. and Ida Ann Wilson Berry were married on June 2nd, 1895.⁸⁵

My grandparents built their home on 100 acres of land John Robert Berry gave them. Grandma did not have a cook stove when they were first married. They had a pot rack that was mounted on the right side of the fireplace. Grandma would hang an iron pot on the hook and swing it over the open fire. This is how she cooked her meats and vegetables. She used a Dutch oven that sat in the hot coals on the hearth to bake her bread. The kitchen and dining room was built separate from the main part of the house. There was a covered breezeway between the two parts of the building. This was done as a safety precaution from the fire hazard of cooking. The kitchen was on the west side of the house and there was a dug well about 10 feet south of the kitchen. This well was in the center of a concrete porch that was covered. This convenience was there so you could draw water up from the well in any kind of weather. The main part of the building consisted of a living room and a bedroom on the first floor and two bedrooms on the second floor. There was a porch that went around three sides of the lower level of the house. On the porch over the well, they had a flat board mounted between two of the posts which served as a shelf. There was always a bucket of water sitting there and an aluminum wash pan on this shelf. There was a towel handing on a nail driven into the post. There were gourd dippers hanging from the post. Every Monday morning, Grandma would build a fire in the yard under a cast iron wash pot filled with water. She would wash their clothes using homemade lye soap. After scrubbing the clothes on a washboard she would rinse them, and hang them out to dry on a clothesline. Grandpa made his living farming and running a small country store. He raised tobacco, corn, and wheat. He raised all of the family's food, trapped small animals and sold their pelts. He never had any debt and was very conservative with his money. He ran for Orange County Commissioner in 1932 and served in that position until 1936.

William Eugene Berry: born September 1st, 1896; died on September 30th, 1984.

He married Pattie Alma McAdams on June 6th, 1921.

She was born November 17th, 1899. She died on April 16, 1993.

Mary Elizabeth Berry: born August 23rd, 1899; died on November 13th, 1957.

She married Brodie Shakespeare Carr September 17, 1925.

Brodie was born June 27th, 1898; died August 24th, 1973.

Thomas Young Berry: born May 11th, 1903. He died of typhoid fever on June 8th, 1925.

Thomas was engaged to marry Hattie Davis in the month that he died.

Sally Malena Berry: born July 20th, 1908; died on March 19th, 2002.

She married Jesse Clyde Henderson on September 22nd, 1928.

Clyde was born September 19th, 1905; died on June 11th, 1984.

Malena Berry and Clyde Henderson are buried at Montlawn Memorial Park in

Raleigh, North Carolina. The GPS reading for their graves:

Woodrow Wilson Berry: born April 3rd, 1912; died May 3rd, 1989.

He married Ora Mae Murray on July 7th, 1936.

Ora Mae was born May 22nd, 1919; died on September 21st, 2002. **Wiley Harold Berry:** born March 9th, 1914; died on June 24th, 2006.

Married Hilda Elizabeth Nichols on December 27th, 1934.

Hilda was born February 18th, 1917; died on August 7th, 2002. **Infant son:** born on September 23rd, 1916, and died the same day.


He is buried at Berry's Grove Baptist Church.

Wiley P. Berry Jr.: born September 1st, 1919; died on August 18th, 2007.

His wife is still living.

Dr. Joseph Ira Coleman was my grandmother's uncle, and my mother said they always called him Uncle Doc. He delivered my mother and her sister and brothers.

Dr. Coleman made his home in Bushy Fork, Person County, NC. Dr. Ira Coleman wrote a paper about his childhood and what he remembered about the Civil War. He was born on 27th of October, 1861, so he was very young when the war started.




He also listed several generations of the Coleman family ancestors in his paper, and I have a complete copy.

My grandmother, Ida Ann Wilson Berry, was killed on May 4th, 1941, by an automobile. She was crossing the road when she was hit. It was at night and the driver did not see her. She died instantly. Grandpa Berry was about one or two steps ahead of Grandma and had Woodrow Berry's oldest daughter, Peggy Berry, in his arms.

Sally Malena Berry Henderson made the dress she is wearing in the picture on the left. She told me that this is what her work clothes looked like when she was a young girl working on their farm. In the center photograph you see Thomas Young Berry. Thomas died of typhoid fever a few weeks before he was to be married. He died on June 8th, 1825. He was the third child of Wiley P. and Ida Ann Berry. On the right is Wiley P. Berry Jr. He attended the 2007 Fiddleton Reunion and died one month later. He was the baby of the family and the last member of the W.P. and Ida Ann Wilson Berry family to die. At least one of W.P. and Ida Ann Wilson Berry's children lived on this earth from 1896 until 2007, for a total 111 years.

The first two grandchildren of W.P. and Ida Ann Berry died in 2011. Peggy Mae Berry Sell was born on July 21st, 1937, and died on April 19th, 2011. Peggy was one of five daughters of Woodrow and Ora Mae Murray Berry. Thomas Eugene Berry Sr. was born on May 3rd, 1928, and died on July 1st, 2011. Thomas was the only son of William Eugene and Pattie Alma McAdams Berry. Joan Elizabeth Bell, who was a great-granddaughter, died in September, 2010. Jamie McLeod, who was a great-granddaughter, died in January, 2011.

In the 1915 picture on the left you have, starting from the left: Harold Berry, age 1; Malena Berry,age 6; and Woodrow Berry,age 3. You can see the covered well in the background. This well was just off the kitchen and dining room of my grandparent's home. At the time of this picture, the floor was made of wood. When I remember this porch, it had a concrete floor around the well. The thing that is remarkable about these two pictures is the direction that Harold, Malena, and Woodrow were looking in each photograph. One would almost think this was planned, but I assure you that it wasn't. I took the picture on the right. Wiley P. Berry and Ida Ann Wilson Berry have no children alive today. They do have grandchildren, great-grandchildren, great-grandchildren, and great-great-grand children. Grandpa's house was located on the Brown Road about three hundred yards west of the road from Hillsborough to Roxboro. Meredith School was located on the Brown Road further west of my grandparents' home. This school is where my mother and all of her siblings attended grade school. One of the teachers from Meredith School lived with my grandparents at one time.

CHAPTER 17

Y-DNA TESTING

At the beginning of the Berry Y-DNA project, all of us thought that, because of the similarity in given names, all Berry families would eventually be found to be related. After testing about 218 Berry males, we now know that there are at least 18 unrelated Berry families living in America today. At the time of this writing, there are 13 matching Y-DNA participants in our Orange County Berry Family Y-DNA project. There are currently 218 participants in this entire Berry Y-DNA project group. There are 14 separate identified families who go by the Berry surname. There is a very interesting story about how the Berry Y-DNA project got started. Our own Carolyn (Cookie) Paulson had located her ancestor, John Berry, living in Rusk County, Texas, in the 1860 census. She had found all of the archival documents from John and Mary Howell Berry down to herself. She knew that her archival trail was solid and was trying to locate John Berry's ancestors. She had tried for many years to find who John Berry's parents were. Cookie knew that John was born in North Carolina. She also knew that he was born in 1815. Cookie and I had corresponded on several occasions about the illusive John Berry. She once told me that she was about ready to accept any Berry from North Carolina who could pass as John Berry's father. Knowing her as I do, she was joking, of course, since she would never approach genealogy in this unprofessional way. Because of her persistent attitude, she looked into what was involved in taking Y-DNA test. She convinced her cousin, participant #8, to take this test and she started the Berry Y-DNA as project administrator. I asked my uncle, W.P. Berry Jr., if he would take a test and he agreed to do this. He was # 18 in the Berry Y-DNA project. On July 20th, 2004, I had an email from Cookie telling me that #8 and # 18 had a matching set of Y-DNA results. She also attached a picture of herself and Joyce Foster, her cousin from the John Berry line. It just so happened that we were having the local Wiley P. Berry reunion that very day. I printed a copy of the picture and made the announcement at our gathering that Sunday. After it was known that John Berry somehow descended from Robert Berry in Orange County, North Carolina, we still could not determine who John's parents were. We did not discover this information for three more years. I located a John Berry family who was living in Fayette County, Alabama, in 1840. He was the right age and this led to us finding that Robert Berry Jr. and his entire family had moved there in 1824. It turned out that John Berry was his grandson and John Berry's parents were George and Susan Aldridge Berry. Here we have to give credit to Victor Glenn Berry's book, Wagons South Wagons West, for helping verify our research. In September, 2008, Bob, Cookie, Jean, and I spent the day in Fayette County, Alabama, and visited a little town named Berry, Alabama. This town was named in honor of Thompson P. Berry, who was a son of Robert Berry Jr. We went to the courthouse and retrieved many records on this branch of our Berry family. I will add that it was a very enjoyable day in my life. I am not sure that Bob and Jean enjoyed it as much as Cookie and I did, but both were very tolerant. You can view the Y-DNA charts on page 224 that list all the markers of 12 of the participants in our Orange County Berry Y-DNA Project. Y-DNA testing is continuing to become more efficient and less costly.

We have a new validated participant since I did the Y-DNA charts on page 224. He is George David Berry, participant #218. (See pages 191 & 228)

The picture on the left is Joshua Berry Jr. He is a grandson of Robert Berry (OC) and was born on the 15th of April, 1801, in Orange County, North Carolina. He died in Benton County, Iowa, on May 29th ,1879. He descends from Joshua and Nancy Ellison Berry.

The picture in the middle is of Wiley P. Berry, who is a great-great-grandson of Robert Berry (OC). W. P. Berry was born on September 8th, 1869, and died on 8th May, 1965. He descends from William and Hannah Cate Berry. William Berry and Joshua Berry were brothers. W. P. Berry was born in Orange County, North Carolina, and he died there.

The picture on the right is of Francis Marion Berry, who is also a great-great-grandson of Robert Berry (OC). Francis was born in Texas on February 23rd, 1861, and died in Sunray, Moore County, Texas, on January 8th, 1943. He descends through Robert Berry Jr., who was the oldest brother of Joshua Berry and William Berry.



We have seen a similar favor between two living male Berry descendants. One lives in Alabama and is from the David J. Berry line, while the other is from North Carolina and descends from both Joshua and William Berry's lines.

We have a young lady from the David J. Berry line who looks very much like a young lady who descends from William Berry.

Descendants of Robert Berry Jr., Joshua Berry, Thomas Berry, David J. Berry, and William Berry participated in the Berry Y-DNA project. We have no male descendants of John Berry, Isaac Berry, or Henry Berry. They all descend from Robert Berry (OC) and Robert Berry (PAC).



CHAPTER 18

SOME BERRY FAMILY STORIES

In the August term of 1803 Orange County Court, William Cate's inventory sale⁸⁶ of personal property was recorded. The Berry family was well represented as purchasers of many items. Robert Berry Sr. and his wife, Elizabeth Cate Berry, both bought items. Their sons William, Thomas, Joshua, and Robert Berry Jr. are all listed on this document. It is very clear why Thomas and William Berry should be at this sale. William was married to Hannah Cate and Thomas was married to Sarah Cate. William Cate was their father. A very interesting purchase made that day was a pair of cotton cards that Thomas Berry bought. This was of interest because of what happened many years later. Thomas paid 2 schillings, 1 pence for the pair of cards.

Thomas and his brother William left their wives, the Cate sisters, in Orange County about 1808 and went to Tennessee searching for some land. Neither of them returned to stay in Orange County and when Robert Berry Sr. wrote his will on April 16th, 1812, Thomas Berry was deceased. William only inherited one pound in his father's will. William Berry must have returned to Tennessee with Thomas Berry's widow, Sarah Cate Berry, to claim the land that Thomas had staked out. Soon after Sarah Berry got to Tennessee, she married John Pigg.

About 170 years later, John Allen Berry inherited a pair of cards from his mother that belonged to his great-grandmother, Mary Pigg Berry, in Tennessee. Are these the same Cards? It is certainly possible that they are the same pair of cards that Allen's 4th great-grandfather, Thomas Berry, bought in Orange County, North Carolina, in August of 1803. There is no reason to believe that Sarah Cate Berry would not have taken these cards with her when she left for Tennessee. After all, the cards were bought by her deceased husband at her father's estate sale. Cards would also be a prized procession because of their function. Mary Pigg Berry was Sarah Cate Berry's great-granddaughter.

NOTE: Cotton cards are two flat thin boards with a lot of sharp spikes driven through them extending through the boards on the other side. These cards had round wooden handles attached them. A person using the cards would hold a card in each hand by its handle and place raw cotton between them to comb the seeds out of the cotton fiber. This was necessary to prepare the cotton fiber for spinning into thread. After 1794 when Eli Whitney invented the cotton gin, the demand for these cards would have been reduced to home use only. I am sure the family would pass these cards down from generation to generation. These cards were also used to prepare wool for spinning.

COVERED WAGONS AND BOXCARS

FROM TEXAS TO COLORADO AND BACK

In 1917, Alexander Howard Berry was 53 years old. Jobs were hard to find, so Alexander and some members of his family loaded up in covered wagons and headed to Colorado, where there were supposed to be some jobs. There were 10 adults and 9 children who made this trek from Texas to Pueblo, Colorado. Below is the story as written by a member of the A.H. Berry family:

"LEONA BERRY, daughter of Alexander Howard and Priscilla Gregory Berry, was born on November 19, 1894, in Indian Territory. Leona Berry married Ben Summers Jan 4,

1911. He died in the 1917 flu epidemic in Colorado. The family heard there was work in Colorado so the A.H. Berrys, their son Willie Howell Berry with son Alec, daughter Hettie and a second son, Willie Howell Berry Jr., born June 2,1917; the Ben Summers family with three children, Newborn, born 1913, J.C., born 1915, and Maggie born 1917; the Hal Johnsons and seven children, Myrtle, Edith, Lula, Matthew, Albert, Will, Etta, and Leola; and the C.L. Johnsons all loaded into covered wagons and went to Pueblo, Colorado. When they arrived at Pueblo, the Hal Johnson and Ben Summers families loaded their belongings into boxcars and continued on to Rifles, Colorado. A.H. Berry was not well and decided to continue on in the wagons. He was accompanied by the Willie Berry family. The C.L. Johnson family stayed in Pueblo. Rifle was across the mountains from Pueblo, and when A.H. and his group reached Salida, Colorado, the altitude was too high and he could not breathe. They backed the wheels of the wagons into the river to turn around as the road was too narrow, and returned to Pueblo. When they arrived, there was a message waiting for Willie from Hal Johnson asking them to wait as they were returning on the same train they had gone on. They had unloaded nothing but the horses. After they returned to Pueblo, the group found jobs and went to work. In a few months A.H. became homesick and wanted to return to Texas. The A.H. Berrys and the Willie Berrys returned to Texas in August, 1918, but the Johnsons and Summers families did not return with them. Those who stayed in Colorado all came down with the influenza and Ben Summers died. So many people were dying that it was almost a week before he could be buried in Pueblo. A few months after Ben Summers death, Hal Johnson and his family and Leona (Onie) Berry Summers and her children loaded their livestock and belongings into a boxcar and rode the train back to O'Donnell. That was December, 1918. When they returned to Texas, they again settled in Borden County. Leona and her three children moved into the house with her parents. On November 27, 1920, Leona (Onie) Summers married Montgomery (Dick) Simpson in Tahoka, Texas."

HUNTING AND FISHING

My grandpa, Wiley P. Berry, was an avid hunter and fisherman. He also had a trap line that he walked every day. I can remember the boards hanging on the west side of his house with small animal skins stretched and turned inside out to cure in the sun. He would catch fox, mink, rabbits and beavers for their fur. This was in the 1930's and people were buying furs for collars on garments and fur neck wraps, which were fashionable in those days. I can remember that Grandpa always had killed three or four turkeys by Thanksgiving each year. This was during the depression years and money was scarce, but Grandpa would always take a hunting trip to Eastern North Carolina each year after farming season was over and he had sold his tobacco crop. His favorite place to go was Lake Mattamuskeet in Hyde County, North Carolina. This lake was about 175 miles from where my grandparents lived in Orange County, North Carolina. The Canadian geese wintered there each year and many serious hunters would gather there in the fall to hunt them.

With this information as a background, I would like to share the story of my fishing trip to Lake Johnson in Raleigh. I was about 12 or 14 years old and Grandpa Berry came to stay a few days with us at our home in Raleigh, North Carolina. I know this was after an automobile had killed Grandma Berry in May of 1941. Grandpa never stayed with us for any length of time until after that fatal night. I was 11 years old when that accident occurred. Anyway, there was a

good size lake about a half-mile east of where we lived. The lake was owned by, and supplied water for, the city of Raleigh. The Raleigh Parks and Recreation department had a boathouse on the north side of the lake. They would rent you a boat and charge a small fee to fish in the lake. Grandpa wanted to go fishing in Lake Johnson, so we rented a boat and paid the fees. We were using cane fishing poles to fish with. I knew very little about how to fish, but as beginners luck would have it, I was the one who started getting bites. Grandpa was telling me to keep the line tight and bring the fish up to the side of the boat where he could lift it out of the water. The fish that were biting were big mouth bass and each time I hooked one I would lose it, trying as hard as I could to do what Grandpa was saying. You can imagine how frustrating this was to my Grandpa and to make matters even worse, he wasn't getting any bites. Needless to say, after about an hour of this, Grandpa rowed us back to the boathouse and my fishing trip with Grandpa Berry was over. This is, and has been, one of my favorite memories of my young life. Grandpa never took me fishing again but that may very well be because he moved in with his oldest son and never spent very long visits with us again. I would really like to think that was the reason.

MAKING BUTTER & MEMORIES

I was about eight years old when Grandma Berry asked me if I wanted to churn some butter. I had never done this before, so I was excited about doing something new. Grandma had a container of milk that had clabbered. This is the natural process where milk is allowed to sour and becomes very thick and rich. The churn was a wooden one with a wooden dasher that could be moved up and down. The clabbered milk was poured into the churn and the dasher was placed in the churn. Grandma then placed a lid on top of the churn. The dasher had a handle like a broom stick that came through the hole in the lid and extended about a foot above it. I was told to move the dasher up and down slowly and continually. This went on for about 30 minutes, and when Grandma came back out on the porch beside the kitchen where I was doing my thing, she looked into the churn and saw a lot of little yellow clumps of butter floating around on top of the buttermilk. She told me to keep churning a little longer and when she looked in the next time, we had much larger chunks of beautiful yellow butter ready to be removed from the buttermilk. Grandma placed the butter in a bowl and let it drain for a while. She poured the buttermilk into a container with a rope tied to the handle and lowered it into the well to keep it cool. She then squeezed the rest of the milk out of the butter with her hands and placed the butter in a butter mold. The butter mold also had a hole in the bottom and a round plunger attached to a push rod. She placed the plunger into the mold and filled the mold with fresh butter. She packed it down very hard so it could take the shape of the carving inside the wooden mold. The next step was when she placed the mold upside down in a plate and pushed the butter out of the mold. The result was a beautiful sculptured yellow cake of butter just ready for the hot biscuits Grandma was cooking in her woodstove.

CHOPPING IN THE MOONLIGHT

My mother told me that her grandfather, John Robert Berry, had an argument with his wife, Elizabeth Bowling Berry, after they retired for the night. Mother did not tell me what the disagreement was about. Apparently John Robert and his wife did not resolve the issue, because he got up out of the bed, put on his clothes, and went outside. It was a clear moonlight night, so he picked up his ax and proceeded to chop down trees in a tract of land he was clearing. He continued chopping down trees all night long until the sun came up the next morning. I suppose he ate a good breakfast and then went back to bed. I have no idea who ran the store the next day. I do remember mother saying that he had an employee who helped him in the store. Most likely the employee did most of the work in the store that day.

DEATH CLAIMS TWO MEN WHEN TRAIN HITS AUTO TRUCK

R. I. Berry Killed Instantly, While J. M. Berry Dies Later-Accident Occurs at Jonesboro.

ACCIDENT IN ATLANTA IS FATAL TO MILLER

Savannah Man Succumbs to Injuries Received When Motorcycle Collides With Truck.

Jonesboro, Ga., October 20 .- (Special.)-Two deaths were the toll of an accident Thursday afternoon shortly after 1 o'clock when Central of Georgia passenger train No. 10. Atlanta to Macon, crashed into a truck at the crossing just north of Jonesboro depot. R. I. Berry, 65year-old Clayton county farmer, was instantly killed, and his brother, J. M. Berry, 58 years old, died late in the afternoon at an Atlanta hospital, where he was rushed a few minutes following the fatal crash.

The aged farmers were driving slowly, reports stated. They going into Jonesboro, but had taken a side road which led up to the main crossing, making a diagonal cut and forming an Intersection with the main highway just where it crosses the railroad tracks.

The passenger train was moving swiftly and struck the heavily-laden truck squarely broadside, hurling both occupants several feet and practically demolishing the truck. The fact that the men were thrown to the side by compact of the locomotive saved them from being run over by the engine.

Killed Instantly,

The older brother was killed instantly as he was dead when picked up a few minutes later by residents of the vicinity who heard the crash and hastened to the scene.

John Berry, the younger, stunned and up to the time of his death at the Atlanta sanitarium was in a semi-conscious state. Physicians from the start held out no hopes for his life, but worked frantically to save him, thinking perhaps he would rally. Death occurred about 5 o'clock.

An accident which in 1917 resulted in the death of three, occurred at the identical spot.

There were said to be no unusual circumstances surrounding the fatal crash. A number of people stated they saw the brothers coming into

town, but so far as is known there is no reason why the oncoming train could not have been seen, as the track is open and visible for about a mile to each side.

The two aged men were pioneers of Clayton county and their death has east a gloom over the entire section. They had for years been among the county's most extensive farmers. At the time of the accident they were carrying a truck load of produce into the city.

Thursday's toll was but another in the list of fatalities which have in the past several years occurred at the same spot. It is said to be a fateful crossing and repeated warnings have been issued from time to time in an effort to prevent accidents.

Funeral services had not been announced last night, although word came from Jonesboro that the funeral would in all prrobability be held some time Saturday. The body of the dead man in Atlanta will be returned to the family home for burial with his brother.

The Berry brothers have for many years been counted among the most progressive and prosperous of Clayton county farmers. They have grown with the community in which they lived and worked and were everywhere held in universal esteem.

J. M. Berry is survived by his widow and three sisters. The older brother, R. I. Berry, was a widower, and is survived only by his three sisters, Mrs. Stallsworth. Miss Mollie Berry and Mrs. E. A. Wooten.

Many of them lost their loved ones and even their own lives as they traveled across the country. They traveled much more than I would have believed.

As I have learned, Orange County was like a hub in the explorations of our new country. Orange County was centrally located on an old Indian trail that was used by pioneers coming from the early settlements all along the east coast of early America.


This is an area where both sides of my maternal family pioneered. Both Samuel Wilson and Robert Berry Sr. were in Orange County in the 1700's. Our Robert Berry was in the Orange County area in 1751, while it was still part of Granville County. By the early 1800's, many of the second and third generation Americans began their migration from this very county. A very large number of them were my relatives and friends of our Berry family.

I figured that a few of my family might have been here as pioneers, but I literally had no idea there were so many of them and that they arrived in America at the very beginning. It never occurred to me that my family were some of the very first to explore and establish so many of the frontiers of America. Our family is a cross section of America that built the plantations, ranches, schools, churches, institutions, served in the wars, dug our coal, built our stores and factories. They were our folks and we have every right to be very proud of them.




Figure 115: Map of counties created from Original Orange County, NC.




Figure 116:1755 tax list page 1

FACTS IN THE LIFE OF Robert Berry's (OC) Family

- **1612** George Kemp was born.
- **1620** Ann Foster was born in England.
- **1620** Mary Hutchinson was born in England.
- 1646 Roger Williamson and Ann Foster were married.
- **1646/1650** Richard, Bartholomew, and Sarah Williamson were born.
- 1650 Roger Williamson died.
- Ann Foster Williamson married John Carraway and they had three children: Mary, Elizabeth, and John Carraway.
- 1670 Richard Williamson married Mary Kemp about this time.
- **<u>1670</u>** to 1680 Richard and Mary's 7 children were born.
- **1680** John Carraway married Ann Kemp
- **1690** Mary Williamson and Robert Berry (PAC) married.
- **1692** Ann Foster Williamson Carraway died.
- **1704** Robert Berry was listed on the Virginia Rent Rolls in Norfolk.
- **1704** Virginia Rent Rolls.
- 1704 John Lawson describes conditions at the Occaneechi Village on the Eno where Hillsborough would eventually be established about 50 years later.
- <u>1728/29</u> Robert Berry (OC) was born in Princess Anne County, Virginia.
- 1730 Robert Berry (PAC) wrote his will and also died.
- Elizabeth Cate's parents were John and Margery Lawrence Cate. John Cate had property on the Flat River in what is now Person County, N.C. His property was not far from the north boundary of Thomas Bradford, whose southern boundary joined Robert Berry's 1757 Granville Land Grant.
- **1746** West portion of Edgecombe County was used to create Granville County.
- First newspaper in the colony, The North Carolina Gazette, was printed at New Bern by James Davis.
- Robert Berry entered in the office of the Right Honorable Earl of Granville on the 6th Day of February, Anon Dom 1752. This Entry was made while Robert's property was still in Granville County and before Orange County was formed.
- When Orange County was formed from the west part of Granville County, it became the most western county in North Carolina for about a year, until Rowan County was established in 1753.
- In May of this year Orange was formed from parts of Johnston, Bladen and Granville Counties. It was named in honor of the infant William V of Orange. It is located in the central section of the State and currently bounded by Durham, Chatham, Alamance, Caswell, and Person Counties. The present land area is 399.84 square miles and the 2000 population was 115,331. The first courthouse was authorized and established in 1754 where the western path crossed the Eno River on the land of James Watson.
 - Childsburg was established in 1759 and was changed to Hillsborough in 1766. Hillsborough is the county seat.
- When Orange County was first formed, the county covered 3500 sq miles with a population of about 4000 settlers. 1000 of these settlers lived in the City of

- Hillsborough. The outlying area had a population of about one person per 1.2 square miles. By 1753, the population of Hillsborough had swelled to about 2000 people, or about .87 person per square mile. Robert Berry's (OC) claim was about one square mile.
- **1752** Corbin Town was incorporated. William Churton was the surveyor and designed the city map.
- March 20th, 1753, the Warrant for Robert Berry's Granville Grant was filed. SCC Henry Gold, Thomas Cate, <u>W Churton</u> surveyor 3 Dec, 1753, "Plat reads surveyed for Robert Berry Jr." Patent Book 14:334
- 1753 Survey for John Cate was done on Dec 4th, next day after Robert Berry's (OC) survey.
- 1754 Corbin Town was renamed Childsburg.
- 1754 The "Great War for Empire" (French and Indian War) broke out.
- **1755** Robert Berry was on the Orange County Tax List this year.
- 1756 Childsburg was renamed as Hillsborough, North Carolina.
- 1756 December Orange, NC, Court Minutes: Robert Berry agt, Richard Gibbs: Thomas Williams security delivered up the Principal, Order'd the Sheriff take him into custody & commit Court Minutes [187]-94bk1 p56
- 1757 Robert Berry was granted a Granville Land Grant on May 12; Court Minutes 14:244/344.
- 1757 March Orange, NC, Court Minutes: John Russell proved his Attendance as Evidence in Suit *Berry* vs. Gibbs. Court Minutes [209]-105 bk1 p63 Phoebe Rand proved her Attendance as an Evidence in Suit *Berry* Against Gibbs. Lawrence Winfield proved his Attendance as an Evidence in Suit *Berry* Vs. Gibbs, John CATE & Margery, his wife, proved her Attendance as an Evidence's (sic) in the Suit Court Minutes [212]-bk1 p6 Berry Against Gibbs for Plaintiff. **Robert Berry** agt. John Robert Berry was then put on a train that would return him to his home. After riding from Elmira, New York, to Hillsborough, North Carolina, he walked the 14 miles from Hillsborough to Fiddleton. My mother told me that he walked all night and arrived home early in the morning before the sun came up. He did not want to wake his parents so he lay down on a log bench across the road from his home and went to sleep. When the warm sun woke him up he went across the road to greet his relieved and happy family. The war was over and he was dirty, hungry, and very tired.

### **Identifying some Smith and Cate family connections:**

Conrad Messer Smith named a daughter, Elizabeth Bates, in his will. It is my belief that a spelling error was made in this will. Elizabeth Bates was really Elizabeth Cates. As far as I know, there was not a Bates family living in the Orange or Person County area. There are definitely no Bates listed in the Orange County Grooms list.

On the 13th of June, 1777, **George Smith** of Caswell County sold to John Cate 76 acres of land for 105 pounds, lying on the Flat River, land that joins John Cate's own property. Witnesses: **Elizabeth C. Berry**, **Robert Smith**, John Cate Sr. (Deed Bk A, Pg 43)

From Nellie J. Berry's book "JAMES E. & ESSIE DAVIS BERRY Ancestors, Descendants & Kinfolks" on page 2, I find that "Robert Smith purchases land at tax sale on Big Harpeth, joining the Berry pre-exemption Tract" in Tennessee in 1802.

William Cate died intestate around 1893 and his 200 acre plantation in Orange County, North Carolina, went to his wife, Elizabeth Smith Cate, and their 5 children, Benjamin Cate, John Cate, Hannah Cate, Sarah Cate, and Charity Cate. When their mother died, each of the children owned 20% of William Cate's property.

Sarah Cate Berry Pigg sold her 20% ownership in her father's plantation in Orange County, North Carolina, to her brother, John W. Cate, in Maury County, Tennessee, on January 1, 1828. **Stephen Smith** was a witness to this deed.

Hannah Cate Berry and John Cate deeded their 40 % of this property to Thomas Wilson in Orange County, North Carolina, on November 19th, 1825. (Deed Bk. 22, pg.007)

This information seems to validate that William Cate's wife was Elizabeth Smith, daughter of Conrad Messer Smith.

Texas and Mississippi:

Several of Robert Berry Junior's grandchildren and great-grandchildren migrated to Texas in the 1850's as Texas was being settled. They are known to be in Lampasas and Rusk County, Texas. The families are Berrys, Howells, Farguhars, Trawicks, and Kizziahs, to name a few.

There were probably two routes from Fayette County, Alabama, to Texas. One was through the state of Mississippi and across the Mississippi River to Texas; the second route was down to Mobile, Alabama, and into Galveston, Texas, by boat.
